Hello Readers

When I wrote this column two months ago, I expressed a hope that Summer would be arriving shortly. In common with most of Northern Europe, we have not had much of a Summer at all so far this year, and time is running out.

However, we still have much to look forward to: the Railway Festival at the end of September and the Jazz Festival at the beginning of October.

We have learned from the Forestry Commission, that the work associated with the removal of the wind fall trees on the Craggs is not finished at the time of writing. By the time you are reading this the path from the car park on Bracklinn Road will have a foot-friendly surface, the mini-quarry just off that path will be landscaped and the two main access paths to the top will be back in use.

We have been urging readers to express their views not only in the *Ben Ledi View* but to the various branches of Government and the National Park. This edition has information on both Stirling Council's local plan, and an initiative from the Scottish Affairs Committee in Westminster, asking for views on their range of topics and the approach they should take. If we don't

answer these initiatives, we can hardly complain about the outcomes.

The Climate Justice Baton is coming to Callander from 30th August to 5th September. The baton was launched at the Eco-Congregation Scotland annual gathering in Falkirk on April 25th by Aileen McLeod MSP, Minister for Environment, Climate Change and Land Reform. It has since been touring parishes, schools and community groups up and down the country, from Shetland to Dumfries.

Margaret Warnock of Callander Kirk's Green Team explains, 'At the beginning of December in Paris, over 190 countries will meet to attempt to negotiate a deal on climate change to limit emissions from developed countries and help developing countries adapt to the impact of climate change and develop low carbon economies.'

Lift Share

The car-share scheme for Trossachs 'n' Teith is up and running.

Individuals can now access the scheme from home or from work and register the details of any journeys they wish to share. The system will then search for others who are going the same way, leaving it to them to make contact and arrange to travel together.

The software behind Trossachs 'n' Teith's system has been provided by the UK's largest car-sharing network, liftshare, which has established more than 1,200 schemes for communities across the UK. Over 400,000 members have registered on liftshare's central database. This means that each user can choose whether to look for car-sharers within their own community, or from the whole liftshare database, thereby increasing the likelihood that they'll find a journey match.

Trish Thompson, Centre Manager, is particularly pleased with the new scheme: 'The Trossachs 'n' Teith Liftshare scheme is a great addition to public transport for the Trossachs Ward area and beyond, giving people a great opportunity to save money and have more flexibility in their travel plans whilst helping reduce the carbon footprint on the environment. All the staff and board members are really pleased that McLaren Community Leisure Centre can bring such a scheme to the local community and would encourage individuals to get involved in the Trossachs 'n' Teith lift share scheme.'

Railway Anniversary 1965 – 2015

Proposed Festival Friday 25th – Sunday 27th September 2015



September 2015 will be the 50th anniversary of the landslide in Glen Ogle that effectively closed the railway line known as the Callander to Oban Railway. The railway was crucial to the growth of Callander as a tourist centre. Thanks to the Greener Callander Group for their contribution of a train planter that is 'steaming' and being much admired outside the toilets in Station Road Car Park.

However, there is still a lot of work to do to obtain the relevant permissions from Stirling Council and to get final confirmation of attendance from some railway groups.

The event will be in three venues.

- **St. Andrew's Church** – Theme of 'Down the Line' which will tell the history of the entire line from Dunblane to Oban. This is where the historical railway societies and model railways will be based. We will also have a speaker to give a talk about the history of the line. The campaign group 'Railfuture Scotland' will also be there to give guidance on how to get the railway back to Callander. Let's look to the future as well as the past!
- **St. Kessog's** – Theme of 'Life on the Railway' which will imagine what it was like to work and travel on the railway, particularly as a Victorian child. This will be a series of fun activities. We are also hoping for a quality, Victorian style market for the Square.
- **Station Road Car Park** – Theme of

'Exploring Our Railway Heritage' which will encourage people to walk and cycle along the old railway line. The National Park mobile information centre will be there. There will be a 1960s bike ride. There will also be vintage vehicles on display such as a 1965 fire engine alongside a modern 2015 equivalent. A 5" gauge mini-railway will offer 'sit-on' rides. We will also have a Black Five locomotive whistle to help re-create the sound of trains as they went through Callander, using the last timetable of the line.

The Film Society are also organising a railway-themed Film Festival featuring unique local archive footage of the railway and a special screening of Buster Keaton's silent classic 'The General', accompanied by pianist Mike Nolan.

The above outline is subject to change. Further details will follow via 'InCallander' website, Stirling Observer and other information outlets. Watch out for a souvenir festival programme which will be available in September and events branded with the Railway Festival logo.

Callander Community Council

The National Park consultation on the Draft Local Plan was recently concluded and we had numerous meetings with the planners to discuss this. Overall, the Community Council was very satisfied with the Plan and understand that any plans are long term and individual site developments would still need to go through the planning process.

We had numerous comments about the proposal for Station Road car park, everyone commenting that Callander needs this to be a car park with provision for coaches and lorry parking and the public toilets. Improvements to the quality of the car park would be preferable, including better information and signs. The site at Balgibbon also brought a lot of comment from the community with the main objections being the poor access to the site, potential flood risk and damage to the glacial moraine. Our response to the National Park reflected these comments from the community.

We have been alerted to the

deterioration of the old Eagle Hotel, the building on the corner of Main Street and Bridge Street. While we have no details about the extent of the problem, it is unsightly in a central part of the town. We are very supportive of local residents who have contacted Stirling Council and the National Park to see if the owners can improve the building.

Residents in Leny Feus and Ardnacreggan Road are concerned about the planned extraction of timber from the Trean Woods. The initial plan from the Forestry Commission was to use small lorries down Ardnacreggan Road, taking the timber to Kilmahog where it would be transferred to larger logging lorries. We agreed that the road is not suitable for this and the Forestry Commission are now looking at alternatives.

The planned cycle route through Coilhallan Woods has been discussed with us and the route has now been modified to stay well away from the houses next to the woods.

The footbridge over the River Teith

from the library to the primary school is an important link in the town but there are now questions about whether we should start planning to replace it. A better quality bridge would be a great benefit to Callander; however, there is a lot of planning needed and the design and construction costs would be large. We are therefore looking at a long term plan for its replacement possibly in 5 or 10 years time. *Richard Johnson*

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Stirling Council

The Stirling Local Development Plan was adopted in September 2014 and covers the period to 2024 – but work has already begun on a new plan that will replace it.

The plan, which covers the Stirling Council area excluding those parts in the National Park, guides the future use of land and the appearance of towns, villages and rural areas, indicating where new development should happen and where it should not. It also includes policies and guidance used to assess planning applications and ensure high standards of architectural and environmental design.

The Council is required to review and update the plan every five years. To comply with latest Scottish Government advice there is, however, a need to identify more sites for housing which means the normal review timescale has been brought forward. The opportunity is also being taken to review and update, where necessary, other parts of the plan.

The Main Issues Report sets out options relating to housing land, proposing land for a further 488 to 788 homes over 18 proposed new sites; wind energy, specifically a 'spatial framework' for wind energy developments which will guide the location of new wind farms; and other issues which are mainly minor changes to existing policies to reflect updated Scottish Government Guidance.

The Council will be welcoming views and comments on the Main Issues Report over the 10 week consultation between 3rd August to 9th October 2015. The Main Issues Report and related documents are already available to view on the Local Development Plan webpage: www.stirling.gov.uk/localdevplan

The Scottish Affairs Committee is seeking views on its programme of work. What should we do and how should we do it?

The Scottish Affairs Committee wishes to involve the people of Scotland in its work, from Scottish Parliamentarians to the business, academic and voluntary sectors and members of the Scottish public, we want to hear from you. We want to know what issues you think we should be examining during this Parliament and the best ways for us to go about that work.

Chair's comments

Pete Wishart MP, Chairman of the Scottish Affairs Committee said: 'I am delighted to have been elected chair of the Scottish Affairs Committee. Under my chairmanship I want the Committee to engage directly and regularly with the people of Scotland. I want to hear what issues you think the Committee should be looking at, as well as suggestions for how the Committee can best tap into the incredible upsurge in political engagement that we are witnessing across Scotland.

Our call for evidence is not restricted to those based in Scotland. Whether it be the effect of Government policies on areas either side of the border or the devolution settlement in general, the Scottish Affairs Committee is interested in hearing from people and organisations based across the United Kingdom on what issues we should be covering.'

Here are some suggested areas we are keen to hear views on but you do not have to restrict your comments to these.

Ways of working

What are the best ways for the Committee to engage with organisations in Scotland and the Scottish public?

How should the committee engage with organisations across the United Kingdom and on what issues?

Where should the Committee meet and what type of meetings (e.g. formal evidence sessions, informal discussion

panels, etc) would be useful?

How can the Committee make sure it engages effectively with the work of the Scottish Parliament and Scottish Parliament Committees?

Issues

What issues should the Committee be examining during this Parliament and why?

These be can narrow issues suitable to a single day's examination as well as larger issues such as aspects of welfare policy or devolution – please note that the Committee does not look into individual cases. Issues can be immediate or longer term.

What aspects of UK Government policy are not working, or could be made to work better, in and for Scotland?

Should the Committee consider the impact of the devolution of powers.

What are your views on the effectiveness of the Scotland Office? What could it do better?

Film Society returns to St Kessog's

The Film Society is excited to return to St Kessog's (Clanranald Trust HQ) for the new contemporary season programme, with a great selection of movies. We kick off on 10th October with award-winning *The Theory of Everything*, the extraordinary story of astrophysicist Stephen Hawking. Another BAFTA and Oscar winner follows on 24th October; filmed over 12 years with the same cast, *Boyhood* is a story of a boy who literally grows up on screen before our eyes.

Selma chronicles the epic march by Martin Luther King from Selma to Montgomery that culminated in President Johnson signing the Voting Rights Act of 1965. In comedy sequel *The Second Best Exotic Marigold Hotel*, Sonny prepares to expand his Indian hotel for the elderly and beautiful. The thriller *Gone Girl* is about a man who reports his wife has gone missing, then comes under suspicion as his portrait of a blissful union begins to crumble. *Testament of Youth* is a powerful coming-of-age story based on WWI memoir by Vera Brittain, classic testimony of the war from a

woman's point of view. *Far From The Madding Crowd* is the Thomas Hardy story about the independent and headstrong Bathsheba Everdene who attracts three very different suitors.

The first of four foreign movies is *Kumiko The Treasure Hunter* in which a Japanese woman goes in search of a satchel of money buried and lost in the film *Fargo* that she believes is real. In *Ida* a young Polish woman sets off with a relative in 1962 to learn out about their Jewish roots and tragic family story. The French Canadian film *Mommy* is about a passionate widow and her unpredictable 15-year-old ADHD son. *Wild Tales* from Argentina is a collection of short stories about distressed people, some explosive.

Our classic programme screens at The Waverley Hotel on Friday nights at 7.30pm and all include a cartoon or short before the main film. We start in November with a WWI adventure *The African Queen* (1951). A hard drinking river trader (Humphrey Bogart) and a prim missionary (Katharine Hepburn) are forced to take a hazardous river journey together. *Monsieur Hulot's*

Holiday (1953) is a hilarious comedy, accidents and misunderstandings follow him wherever he goes.

The 1953 *Titanic* tells the story of a couple trapped in a doomed marriage and the events of the fateful voyage. In *Footlight Parade* (1933) James Cagney playing a stage director who tries to outdo himself with spectacular musical numbers. The last film is *The Hunchback of Notre Dame* (1939) with Charles Laughton as the mis-shapen bell-ringer Quasimodo.

Membership fees remain at £22 for the contemporary programme, £10 for the classic or you can join both for £25.

Alex Harvey was a pupil at McLaren High School during the mid 1970s. A year or so after Alex left school he was sadly killed in a motor bike accident near Lochearnhead. He had been in school shows and was at that time working at what was then The Ancaster Arms Hotel in Callander.

His then employer Neil McArthur, and the Ancaster Hotel staff, decided that to commemorate his life an award be made to the cast member who had contributed the most to the success of the show either in terms of performance quality or direct on-stage assistance in any other way. This award was to be made by secret ballot at the interval

among the cast and back stage team. It has now been handed over thirty seven times in front of the last night audience since 1978 when it was first awarded.

The 2015 winner of the Alex Harvey Memorial Award was Poppy Smith who had assisted by choreographing several of the dance routines for Back to the 80s as well as being a principal character, Miss Brannigan, in the show! This award has continued to maintain its high status among the members of McLaren High School pupils as being a huge mark of respect for the winner by their peers and is long cherished by the recipient. After the performance has ended and votes of thanks are delivered, the climax of the final evening is The Alex Harvey Memorial Award.

Liz Youngson Memorial Award

Liz Youngson was a teacher at McLaren High School for nearly four decades before she retired. Sadly her intended life of leisure was short lived as she passed away in the November of that same year.

. During her time at McLaren she devoted herself not only to her subject, Business Studies, but to many other activities. One of these was as props person and general administrator for many school shows, too numerous to list. She had left instructions in her will that an award be made in her name,

So the school decided that her award be directed to the person who made the greatest contribution 'behind the scenes'. This might include lighting, sound, stage crew, makeup, props or could even be a cast member who had a dual role both on and off stage.

This year the first recipient of this new award was Kirsty Crawford who, not content with being an important character on stage, Kirk (one half of the comedy double act Kirk and Alfie), but she also led the makeup team too. The award was also made by secret ballot among all cast and back stage team members at the interval.

Both award ballots were supervised and counted by two front of house adults and verified by the incoming head girl, Grace Malloch.

Callander's award-winning Youth Work charity joins over 200 organisations who have achieved Living Wage accreditation which means all employees and subcontractors are paid at least the Living Wage of £7.85 an hour.

The Living Wage is calculated according to the basic cost of living in the UK, which is set independently and updated yearly. It's estimated 18% of the Scottish workforce earn less than the living wage. Recent research has shown the benefits of implementing the Living Wage could include a better working environment, greater staff engagement and a reduced level of absence.

Chris Martin, Managing Director of CYPT, said: 'We are proud to be one of the first youth work projects in the UK to become a Living Wage employer and see this as an opportunity to be a positive influence in our sector. As an employer of young people in the local area, we know that this is the right thing to do. Not only does it benefit our employees but also the communities they live in.'

In Scotland, the Living Wage Foundation works with the Scottish Living Wage Accreditation Initiative which is operated by the Poverty Alliance. There are currently over 1,400 Living wage employers in the UK.

My Rwanda experience



A kitchen garden

ten weeks we worked with one of Tearfund's partner organisations, RDIS (Rural Development Inter-diocesan Service), working on various projects.

A lot of our time was spent in Nyagisozi, a village just outside Muhanga set right in the hills, with houses constructed from mud bricks scattered along the village's steep, winding paths. One project we worked

old boy called Peter from Nyagisozi village. This was impressive for many reasons. Firstly, Peter has a serious heart condition that resulted in him having to travel all the way to India to receive treatment. It also meant that he had to leave school at a young age. In addition, Nyagisozi village - where Peter lives - is quite a long distance from the school where the lessons were held. This is the boy who told us, 'When I become rich, I'm going to buy myself a bed.'

(Peter's current bed is constructed from mats made from woven grasses supported by mud bricks). Despite the problems Peter faces, his determination to learn English is inspirational.

One day, we asked the village leader about what the main problems are in the village. She told us

Over six thousand miles away, in central-east Africa, there is a country called Rwanda. Like Scotland, there are many hills, lush greenery and at certain times of the year, a lot of rain. However, your experience walking along a street in Rwanda would be very different from walking along Callander Main Street. Rather than seeing people carry their shopping bags in their hands, you would see them balancing things on their head. Rather than seeing prams, you would see women carrying their babies on their backs with carefully wrapped, vibrant materials. You wouldn't walk for five minutes without being met by awkward stares and hearing murmurs – or even shouts - of 'Muzungu' (term used for a white person). It takes something to get used to being in such a different country, though after recently spending ten weeks in Rwanda, its culture and ways of life have become second nature to me.

I was volunteering with Tearfund, a charity that works through local churches and communities to eradicate poverty. Tearfund is one of many charities that work with ICS (International Citizen Service), a government-funded organisation that brings together young people aged between 18 and 25 to fight poverty in overseas and UK communities.

I was part of a team, consisting of 8 volunteers, four of whom were from the UK and four (including our team leader) were from Rwanda. We stayed in a district called Muhanga, which is about a 45-minute bus journey from the country's capital, Kigali. Over the

on involved the construction of energy-efficient stoves for different families in the village. This was a massive improvement on the original stoves they used, which were simply open fires. The stoves we built require less wood; meaning less time

was needed to search for wood. They also produce far less smoke, which is both better for the environment and for the health of those using the stove. The other project we worked on in this village involved the construction of kitchen gardens. These are important because they allow people to grow a wider variety of crops all year round, providing the ingredients for a more balanced diet.

The rest of the work we did was teaching. I taught the beginner class with another volunteer called Aline who was fluent in the local language, Kinyarwanda. One memory that stands out was when Aline and I received a new class member – a 17-year-

that one of the main problems is the lack of rain due to climate change, affecting the crop yields. It made me realise just how unfair it is that people in a country that is one of the most eco-friendly in the world suffer from the results of the polluting activities of other nations. I feel even more determined to minimise my own carbon footprint and encourage others to do the same.

To have been part of the worthwhile work of RDIS, work that really makes a difference to people's lives, has been a real privilege. Somebody put it well when they said, 'If you think something small can't make a difference, try going to sleep with a mosquito in your room.'

Drinking fluids is essential but avoid alcohol as this will dehydrate you further. Aftersun cream and calamine lotion can relieve any itching or soreness. Paracetamol can be used to help any pain and control fever and Ibuprofen can reduce inflammation and lower a high temperature.

Please ensure you order your repeat medication the week before your holiday. We still receive requests marked urgent due to going on holiday the following day and this puts increased pressure on the staff, the doctors and the pharmacies to turn around the request in such short time scales.

Cook's Corner

August/September

GOOEY LEMON CAKE

Ingredients:

4 eggs
150ml sunflower oil
150ml soured cream
1tbsp lemon juice
Zest of 1 lemon
200g SR flour
50g raisins
200g caster sugar

Icing:

4tbsp icing sugar
3tbsp lemon juice

Method:

Preheat the oven to 180c, 160c fan, gas no. 4. In one bowl, whisk the 4 eggs, beat in the 150ml sunflower oil, 150ml soured cream, 1tbsp lemon juice and lemon zest. In another bowl, mix the 200g SR flour, 50g raisins, 200g caster sugar.

Gradually add the egg mixture to the flour mixture, folding in until even.

Bake in a prepared 20cm loaf tin until golden brown.

Icing: Heat the icing sugar and the lemon juice together until simmering.

While the cake is still hot, prick the top with a fork and pour the icing over. Turn out when cool, serve in slices.

Nuthatches, otters and much, much more with the SWT!

If you are interested in our wildlife then the Callander Scottish Wildlife Trust programme of talks should definitely be added to your diary.

On 8th September David Bryant will be speaking on 'Birds of Central Scotland: Forty years of change'. Even over eight years in Callander we have noticed changes in bird populations, one positive one being the northerly migration of nuthatches into local woods - a pair even nested in one of our SWT nest boxes.



They usually plaster mud around natural nest holes to tailor the entrance but it was interesting to see that, although the hole in the box was not altered, they had sealed the lid of the nest box with mud. In June the six chicks were ringed, and we'll put up more boxes for next year in the hope of getting some returnees.



Four other boxes had blue tit and great tit nests, but in two solitary wasps had built nests underneath the lids; one brood had already fledged but

the second box had a very sad nest of abandoned chicks.



While not a welcome tenant, the wasp's nest is quite beautiful, made of paper-like chewed vegetation and housing a few cells for the larvae. These Eumenine wasps are also known as potter wasps due to the shape of their nest – they could be called lampshade wasps!



In October the speaker on 'Otter Ecology and Conservation: the Work of the International Otter Survival Fund' is Dr Paul Yoxon, from Skye.

Note that the date has been changed to Thursday 22nd October 7.30pm. This is a charity set up to protect and help 13 species of otter worldwide; it supports projects to protect otters, ensuring they have a healthy environment and works closely with organisations concerned with wildlife crime. You can help by reporting sightings, dead or alive, at this website: http://www.otter.org/Public/AboutOtters_OtterWatch.aspx.

Many of us rarely see otters although they are now present in all the UK's major river systems. They travel overland between water courses and,

like other wildlife that is active between dawn and dusk, road traffic injuries are a real concern. So please keep an eye out for animals crossing local roads and keep to a speed that allows you to avoid them. While hedgehogs, rabbits and red squirrels may squash quite easily, a big otter, badger or a roe deer could have more serious consequences for vehicles and drivers too.



In spring a large dog otter was killed on 'the long straight' of the A81. It was retrieved then stored in a freezer until taken to Edinburgh University Vet School for examination by students. Its death was not entirely in vain but a healthy, mature male would have been infinitely better!

The talk on 10th November is 'RSPB's All Nature Programme: Not Just Birds' by James Silvey (RSPB), known to some from his involvement in the Trossachs water vole re-introduction programme. On 8th December will be 'John Muir Trust: Giving Wild Land a Voice' on the work of the conservation organisation.

Before then, on 16th August 10.00-12.30am, we would welcome help to remove invasive Himalayan Balsam along the Teith in Callander. The last three years' work is definitely paying off, with much less as far as the Turning Pool. This second session will give a chance to get the last few before they disperse thousands of seeds.

The rift in the sky



Look for the three Summer Triangle stars of Deneb, Vega and Altair and you will easily locate the 'Great Rift'.

You have probably heard of the Great Rift Valley in East Africa but did you know that another Great Rift exists which is visible from Callander?

Outside on a dark late summer night take a look at the band of stars crossing over the night sky - the Milky Way. You are looking edgewise into our galaxy's disk. Look closely and you'll notice a long, dark lane dividing the bright starry band of the Milky Way. This is known as the Great Rift.

The Great Rift in the Milky Way is easy to see provided you have dark skies. Remember you aren't looking for a bright object in the sky, you are looking for the dark lanes running the length of the Milky Way.

The Great Rift begins just above the constellation Sagittarius in the south and if you follow the Milky Way up you will see a dark area in the middle just before you get to the constellation Cygnus, the constellation in the shape of a cross.

The Great Rift and the Milky Way pass through the Summer Triangle of bright stars (Vega, Deneb, Altair) but

you will know when you see the Great Rift because it looks as if the stars have been erased from this part of the sky.

Binoculars are perfect to scan the Milky Way and the Dark Rift. You will be able to view many interesting star forming regions, star clusters and millions of stars that will capture your attention.

But what is the Great Rift? It is caused by the star forming regions in that part of our galaxy. The newly forming stars in this area are spewing out lots of dust and gas into space that doesn't allow light to shine through.

The dust and gas is blocking our view, much like closing the curtains at home blocks your view of the garden. As the dust and gas disappear over time the stars will light up the area and the Great Rift will cease to be.

However, for the next few million years it will remain a dark patch in our night sky, so why not take a look at the rift in our night sky?







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What Do You Think?

In this issue I would like to talk about an topic raised by a letter in the last issue of the Ben Ledi View. This letter, for those that can't remember what was in the last issue's letter page, and there can't be many who don't, I will recap. It was the letter from a visitor who had arrived in the Meadows car park about 10.00am on a Monday morning to find the rubbish 'bins overflowing, rubbish piled up against bins and walls, as well as the car-park area and surrounding grass areas covered in rubbish' and having found this, they decided not to stop in Callander and moved on. Since then I have wandered down to the Meadows on a couple of occasions and found no real problem. However, none of these occasions were a Monday morning and, with the weather we have had recently, none were after a weekend of sunshine, heat, and back to back visitors' cars coming into the town.

Do we have a problem? Callander depends on visitors. It is only the town it is because of visitors and whether you like it or not Main Street would be verging on a ghost town if it wasn't for the visitors who frequent the variety of shops we have. If one visitor has been put off stopping for an hour or so in Callander because of litter, then how many others have – and one is one too many.

I understand that Colin, our magnificent road sweeper (or whatever the pc description is nowadays – cleansing operative possibly?), was upset by this letter, and may be fuming at the start of this article, but if there is a problem it cannot be laid at his door; can he be there 7 days a week from dawn til dusk? No one expects that.

Do we have a problem? Or was this a single over the top reaction to an



isolated incident? I personally think that if we have scared off one visitor it is possible that we do have a problem and we should look at it. For the vast majority of the time the litter situation is in my opinion handled extremely well by Colin and the rest of the team.

Living on the main street I often find sweet papers and wrappers in my hedge, especially just after the schools have come out and the pupils have made their merry way home via the sweet shop, and regular Saturday and Sunday morning exercise for us is to retrieve the odd beer can from the same hedge, however this is not a great problem. Britain has for many years had a reputation of being the dirty man of Europe because of our litter, but this has improved dramatically over the years, and although the problem is not solved it is much improved. Yes, we still see people dropping litter and throwing litter from car windows, but not as often, and the cleansing team do a good job cleaning this up. However I do not think this is the main issue. The problem, if there is one, would appear to be that if we have really good weather (remember what that was like) the visitors flock into Callander, the car parks are mobbed, and the infrastructure cannot cope with the amount of rubbish they want

to dispose of – and the vast majority would probably like to dispose of it responsibly.

The first question is do we have a problem? If the answer is yes, how do we solve it? I do not have an answer – with the cutbacks in local government spending it is unlikely that an increase in emptying the bins, especially at weekends, would be on the cards. Would more bins help? At the moment there are a lot in the Meadows and we don't want it to look like a home for litter bins. One suggestion put to me was that the fast food shops, as they appear to supply most of the wrappings discarded as rubbish in the town, pay a levy to pay for the bins to be emptied more often during the season – is this feasible? I don't know – and that's where you come in.

Let me know – Do we have a problem with litter or have I just written this article about nothing (newspapers can be quite good at publishing non-stories)? If we have a problem what are the possible solutions?

Secret Callander - Spitfire crash



It could have been worse!

Was it a bird, was it a plane or was it Superman?

Yes, it was a plane and possibly a superman to crash in Callander with no loss of civilian life.

On the 4th September 1941 Sergeant David Colbourn Johnston was flying over the west of Callander in a Spitfire, a common sight during the war. Sgt. Johnston was part of No. 58 Operational Training Unit RAF which was formed in December 1940 at RAF Grangemouth to train day fighter pilots using Spitfires and Masters.

Eyewitnesses, children aged 9 years, standing near the junction of Cross Street and Main Street, were watching an army band play in the early evening. They watched the plane flying low and then crashing into the ground opposite the school. There was fire and intense heat - a passing lady,

Miss Dot Ferguson, reputedly had her hair and eyebrows singed. People were saying 'Nobody could live in that'. Unfortunately this was true as D. C. Johnston died at the scene.

Another eyewitness, William Macfarlane aged 5 years, was playing in the field behind the school with his elder brother, 7 year old Norman. From the wall they saw the plane coming down and just missing their home in Bridgend. William 'thought it had maybe crashed into a building but it had come down in the space between'. 'The only damage that was done was a crack in the gable. It was a fluke.' In an interview with a Callander Primary School pupil he recalls his brother falling off the wall into a bunch of nettles and his running to the corner of the school where a teacher had picked up a piece of metal from the plane, consequently burning his hand.

The official accident report states

Sergeant D. C. Johnston from Birmingham incorrectly performed a right hand roll and crashed into the ground in Callander close to the River Teith. He was buried at Grangemouth Grandsable Cemetery.

What was remarkable and arguably an heroic act was how the plane could crash into such a small space behind a high wooden gate between Bridgend Hostel and the nearest house. Was it good luck or expert flying which enabled the doomed pilot to keep the Spitfire between these buildings and stop short of the gate, thus avoiding the road. Perhaps the gate saved Miss Ferguson's life? Why not take a look from the primary school grounds, look at the narrow space where the Hostel is and decide for yourself - luck or Superman?

In another plane related incident on 3rd June 1943, pilot Sergeant Thomas Hetherington was flying his MK1 Spitfire from RAF Grangemouth on a low flying exercise close to Lake of Menteith. It was rumoured that he was showing off to land girls working in the fields on the north side of the lake when his wing touched the water and sent the Spitfire crashing into the lake.

Hetherington escaped unhurt and was later reprimanded by Group Captain Cyril Wallace. It is thought that the valuable Merlin engine was rescued from the wreck but the plane itself remains undiscovered in the lake.

A different story in the Mathieson Cup where Callander beat Glenvale, Linlithgow Rose, Forth Thistle, Kincardine and Barhill to reach the final. On the night Callander defeated Sunnyside Thistle 2-1 after superb goals from Alisdair Smith and Alistair

McPherson saw Callander lift the trophy.

At the Player of the Year Awards Callum Smith won the Top Goal Scorer Award after scoring 34 goals. Gavin Loch picked up the Referees Man of the Match Award. Richard Neumann won the Ewen MacGregor Memorial Award. Alisdair Smith won the Goal of the Season Award after a superb strike against Kincardine. Gavin Loch and Andrew McLaren were awarded for reaching 100 appearances for the club. The biggest two awards on the night saw Callum Smith pick up Player of the Year and Chris Halladay pick up Players Player of the Year.

This year's annual select game saw the select team take Callander Thistle all the way by only losing 5-4 in a highly entertaining match.

We would also like to congratulate Scott McIntosh and his Callander Thistle 2002s after beating Milton 3-1 in the Richard Taylor Cup.

Dental Care


