Hello Readers

An intermittent Spring is with us, as I write this. Hopefully Summer will be arriving when you read it.

You will see information about the Planning Process on the opposite page. Please follow up the links and information on the detail. This plan will last for 10 years, so it is very important that everyone understands and agrees with it.

We have been informed that the Edinburgh Oban CityLink bus service will no longer operate. It used to pass through Callander. Anyone wishing to take a public service bus trip from Callander to Oban will now have to take a bus to Stirling, then another to Glasgow, and finally one to Oban. This detour would add hours to the journey. Whilst only a few people made the whole journey, the intermediate villages are now badly served. Sadly, yet another example of a reduction in public transport.

However, the Leisure Centre's Carbon Challenge Fund award will include setting up a liftshare website. This will be launched in mid June and allow people to log on and either offer a lift or request one. It is hoped that all the communities in the Teith and Trossachs Ward will participate. If everyone uses the system properly, passengers can be picked up and



dropped off at intermediate stages in the journey. This is an opportunity to offset the poor provision of public service transport. Potential drivers should note that ordinary car insurance is adequate, if they seek only to cover their costs and not try to make a profit from charges to passengers.

It will obviously take time for all interested parties to make contact and gain the benefits. It follows that patience is required. Full details will be made available as soon as possible.

We are pleased to note that the Community Council Public Meeting was well attended, and local opinion voiced. We look forward to a strengthening of local democracy as promised by the Scottish Government.

The LL& T NPA have approved the Lochshore Camping Bye Laws and these are now awaiting Scottish Government approval which, if granted, will result in the law being active by the time you are reading this. Lochside Camping will be restricted to designated areas in the National Park.

We hope that all our readers enjoy the various community events planned for this summer

On BLV matters, you will see from the front wrapper that we are asking for more volunteers to come and join the team, so please give this some consideration. All new volunteers will of course be invited to our summer BBQ, where we say thank you to all those who bring the BLV to your doorstep.

Loch Lomond & Trossachs National Park consultations



The board of Loch Lomond & The Trossachs National Park Authority has approved a six-week consultation on the area's Proposed Local Development Plan, outlining new developments in housing, tourism and supporting infrastructure over the next ten years.

The National Park has undertaken extensive and innovative engagement. This involved reaching out to young people, businesses and partners, using a variety of techniques from 'charrette' style workshops, using drawings to bring ideas to life, to community events and social media.

As a result, Park planning officers were able to get a much earlier and better impression of what communities really need and have produced something that everyone – whether homeowners, landowners, developers, local authorities, or partners - can work towards.

Stuart Mearns, Head of Planning and Rural Development at the Authority said: 'The Proposed Plan really reflects the hopes and aspirations of our communities and brings to life an overarching vision for development in the National Park

Building on the success of our current Local Plan means we are in a strong position to help grow the local economy. There's a momentum building around existing, successful developments in the Park including in tourism and renewable energy and this looks set to continue. This year, we have already seen a 35% rise in planning applications. '

Wide ranging consultations and community workshops were held between 2011 and 2014 to inform a 'Main Issues Report', which was promoted last summer in an extensive consultation called 'LIVE Park'. Feedback from this consultation was used to produce the Proposed Local Development Plan.

Consultation on the Proposed Plan between 18th May and 29th June provides local communities with a final opportunity to review changes made as a result of earlier comments before they are adopted in the Local Plan and provided to the Scottish Government for ratification.

The main differences in the Proposed Local Development Plan from the current Local Plan are:

- Housing developments of up to three homes in areas including Callander now need to be affordable houses or the developer will need to make a financial payment to the provision of affordable housing elsewhere in the local area.
- The affordable housing quota for developments of four or more homes in towns and villages has been changed. It will be 50% in the Loch Lomondside villages; 33% in the Stirling area towns and villages including Callander, and 25% everywhere else.
- New sites for development are identified in places including Callander.
- The new housing policies have been developed in conjunction with the National Park's housing partners to ensure a better range of housing types for everyone, including young people and working families.

Venue 3 – Outdoor Space – Theme of 'Exploring Our Railway Heritage' which will encourage people to walk and cycle along the old railway line. Also encourage people to find out more about railway-related buildings and structures. We are also hoping to have some vintage buses and other vehicles around the town.

The Film Society are also organising a railway-themed Film Festival.The above is subject to change but please keep the weekend of Friday 25th to Sunday 27th September 2015 free.

Wild Flowers

As some of you will have seen, Stirling Council have been preparing two sites in town for sowing of wild flower seeds. The site along the old railway footpath near the Bowling Club was unsuccessful two years ago but will be better prepared this time and will extend the full length of that verge. Both there and between North Church Street and Ancaster Road, the grass will be mowed by the footpaths so that it looks deliberately planted and well-maintained. The concept has been agreed within Callander's Countryside, Scottish Wildlife Trust and communicated to Callander Community Council, although the original suggestion was to sow the central area running up to Ancaster Road rather than the final site by the garden wall. Hopefully, we will see a swathe of wildflowers that will brighten up the town, help our local bees and butterflies and be enjoyed by

all those who pass by this summer!

Police Scotland

ur summer Policing Plan is now in full swing and Operation Ironworks is running as in previous years to focus on the Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park. We have been patrolling with National Park Rangers and officers from the Tayside Division, and officers from the Roads Policing teams in cars and motorcycles have been involved in promoting road safety on the main A84/85 trunk roads. Local officers have been carrying out speed checks in Callander. It is always disappointing when we catch speeding drivers and more disappointing when some of the offending drivers are local! We have also managed to secure some visits from a Traffic Warden who will be in town a couple of days a week.

Operation 'Quarterlight' has been running nationwide to tackle criminals who target vehicles to break into or steal. We would urge vehicle owners to take care to lock vehicles, even in your driveway, and not leave valuables on show in the car. If you see a vehicle or person that you think is suspicious, please phone at the time by calling 101. This allows your local officers to speak to the people you have seen and find out who they are and why they are visiting Callander

Police report on anti-crime kit

Special crimefighting kit delivered to hundreds of local homes may have helped prevent housebreakings in the area. At the end of September last year police delivered 236 SmartWater kits to homes in the Killearn area.

Produced by SmartWater Technology Ltd each kit contains a solution that is brushed onto a homeowner's possessions. Almost impossible to remove but only detectable under UV light it then retains DNA evidence from anyone who touches it, providing a definite link between a criminal and a crime scene in the event of a burglary.

At the end of January an evaluation of the system in Killearn showed no housebreakings in any of the areas where the system had been delivered or offered. Two housebreakings had taken place in nearby streets.

A previous study of convicted criminals saw 74% of them claim that the presence of technology would deter them committing a crime.

The evaluation of the Killearn scheme was presented to the Council's Public Safety Committee yesterday (Tuesday 12th May) and Convenor, Councillor Martin Earl, said: 'A housebreaking is one of the most upsetting crimes any of us can suffer and anything that deters such activities has to be welcomed. I'm pleased that this trial seems to have been a success and hope that it continues into the future.'

The SmartWater kits were provided to homes free of charge, having been bought by Police Scotland at a reduced rate through a Home Office approved supply scheme. Assistant Chief Constable Wayne Mawson said: 'Following a successful pilot of SmartWater Technology Ltd in Edinburgh back in February 2014, where the test area observed more than a 50% decrease in housebreaking, Police Scotland commenced a roll-out of the campaign across other areas of the country, including Killearn. The region was selected following detailed engagement with the local community who had identified housebreaking as a policing priority. Police Scotland is committed to tackling housebreaking and acquisitive crime and will utilise all resources at our disposal to keep the public safe and bring offenders to justice.'

Right to Reply

The paragraph above was taken from the minutes of the February meeting of the Callander Community Council in which we are criticised for the 'failed' survey we attempted to carry out on the work done on the St.Kessog's side of Ancaster Square. The Editors did not and still do not think our article was negative. It was a genuine and legitimate means of trying to get some discussion going in the paper. We did in the following month publish the result of the survey, which was so small that it did not indicate anything. The result was negative to the work done, and a few subsequent letters since received were also negative. This we reported, but this was not **our** view but the view of the few Callander readers who responded.

What do you think?

The Ben Ledi View is a volunteerrun paper which, as you will notice from our advert on the front page, is extremely short staffed; we do not have reporters or photographers rooting out the important matters of Callander life (although we would like to), and therefore we have to rely on word coming to us. If we had been approached about publishing details of the consultation I know we would have tried to help. John Nelson

Note: At the most recent Callander Community Council meeting, attended by about 40 residents, only two people were against the improvements in Ancaster Square. Most favoured proceeding with getting planning consent to cover the square, but the bus stop arrangement was not popular, with people objecting to the tailbacks caused by the buses and the seats not being near enough the bus stop. Questions were also raised as to why the bus stops were opposite each other.

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Local history 9

Secret Callander's - nuclear bunker

t doesn't look much, just concrete block and metal structures with green flaking paint, but a short distance past the Bracklinn Falls car park is Callander's Nuclear Monitoring Post, manned between 1963 and 1991.



Concealed underground is a reinforced concrete bunker some 6m by 2.5m. Through a metal hatch a ladder leads 4.5m down to two rooms. One contained a chemical toilet and the larger monitoring room was furnished with table, chairs, shelf, cupboard and bunk beds to sleep two people. The table, shelf, cupboard and bed frame are still in the somewhat waterlogged bunker along with some communication equipment.





Since the early 1950s there was a real threat of nuclear war from within the Soviet Union so after a successful trial of a prototype in 1956, the UK government ordered 1,563 underground bunkers to be built across the UK,and these to be manned by the Royal Observer Corps (ROC). The ROC was the volunteer organisation that watched the skies during the Second World War, reporting and tracking enemy aircraft. In the event of war, lives could be saved away from impact zones, given enough warning. The ROC with their existing communication system were to report details of nuclear bursts and fallout and relay back through larger Group and Sector control bunkers. This information would then be used to decide how best to protect civilian life.

Callander's post is one of 275 built across Scotland, each between 7 and 10 miles apart mostly in rural areas.



Many bunkers were built alongside existing aircraft observation posts built above ground and already manned by the ROC. Callander's is one of the few remaining still visible. These aircraft posts were built in two sections, the entrance door led to a small roofed section for shelter and storage with a sliding door into the open section which housed the post instrument and chart on top of a wooden mounting.



Nuclear bunkers built were underground due to the minimal protection from nuclear fallout in the existing overground monitoring posts. They were of standard design, a few were built in reverse due to local contractors misreading the plans! There was no mains water, electricity, gas or heating. Lighting was powered by a 12 volt battery with a petrol generator on the surface for backup. Ventilation was unsophisticated, the air coming down from outside was unfiltered. The only communication was by way of a simple Tele-talk system to nearby posts and

the local headquarters. Each post contained several monitoring devices to detect radiation and a sensor on the surface to measure the force of nuclear blasts. Conditions inside would have been uncomfortable, cold, cramped and damp. The 3 personnel, mainly unpaid volunteers, may have had to remain inside the relative safety of the bunker for many weeks after fallout due to the harmful effects of radiation. During peacetime the post-crew would meet weekly for training, maintenance and to test the equipment.



Even into the 1980s the UK government were encouraging the utility companies to build concrete bunkers to house engineers and ensure a level of services in the event of war. One such concrete room was incorporated alongside underground cabling in the Post Office Telephones building alongside Callander's present Post Office. With the break up of the Communist Bloc the ROC was disbanded and the nuclear monitoring posts closed in 1991. The Home Office offered the bunkers back to landowners and many were put up for sale. They initially cost around £5,000 to build and have since been sold for up to £25,000. The Glasgow-based selling agents expected them to be used as anything from bothies to storage areas. There has even been interest expressed in turning some into bat roosts.

So when you see the insignificant metal structures in the concrete up the Braeleny Road, remember those people who manned those cramped, cold, damp bunkers and whose training might have meant the difference between life and death for many of us. *Marion Wilson*

Strasbourg – Euroscola

On 2nd March we had the amazing opportunity to travel to Strasbourg thanks to the Callander Rotary Club. The main event was to participate in the Euroscola Day in the European Parliament on Thursday 5th March.

We arrived at the airport at 5am on Monday morning, where we met the 25 other Scots with whom we would be spending the week.

Tuesday was undoubtedly one of the best days. After a morning workshop starting preparation for the Euroscola day, we got the opportunity to put our French skills into practice during a survey on Scotland and Europe in the streets of Strasbourg.

On Wednesday we took part in the 'famous' Strasbourg Challenge, in which we were put into groups and left to our own devices to find out from the locals about a particular theme: gastronomic; historic; tourism; European. We spent Wednesday evening preparing questions and points of discussion for the Euroscola Day.

After rising early on Thursday morning, we arrived at the European Parliament dressed in kilts and tartan, one boy even boasting bagpipes. We entered the debating chamber to join 500 other young Europeans from 23 EU countries. Each group had a pair of representatives to introduce their country to the Parliament. I (Sophie) had the honour of presenting the United Kingdom in a speech in French and Spanish, in which we discussed how we had been selected for the trip, and the fact that despite the belief nowadays that the UK wants to leave the EU, we are proud to be Scottish, British and European.

Carrying medication in hand luggage

If your travel company requires a GP letter to cover medication being carried in hand luggage, please ensure you provide at least 2 weeks notice to the Practice so that we can organise your request.

Unfortunately these requests are non-NHS services and will have a nominal fee attached. Outwith consultations our GPs are extremely busy with house visits, daily review of patients' results and secondary care letters, prescriptions, requests for medical information for e.g. insurance companies / solicitors and, not least, administration required as part of our contract with Forth Valley Health Board. Hopefully this will explain why our doctors cannot do requests such as 'letter of fact' for airlines there and then - we do need a little notice. As always, we are grateful for your co-operation.

Holiday medication

Please ensure you order your repeat medication the week before your holiday. We still receive requests marked 'urgent due to going on holiday the following day' and this puts increased pressure on the staff, the doctors and the pharmacies to turn around the request in such a short time scale.

Did you know your local pharmacy can deal with many health problems.......

Insect Stings Advice - basic treatment covers washing the affected area with soap and water; put a cold flannel on the area; raise the part of the body that has been stung to prevent swelling and avoid scratching the area. If the sting is painful or swollen you can also wrap an ice pack in a towel and place on the swelling; take painkillers, such as paracetamol or ibuprofen or visit your local pharmacy for cream to prevent itching and antihistamine tablets to help reduce swelling. If the redness and itching gets worse or does not clear up after a few days, consult your doctor.

Sunburn Advice - as summer approaches, the reminder is that protecting your skin from the sun using sunscreen is better than treating it. However, should you suffer from sunburn the advice is to cool the skin with a cold flannel or by having a cool shower or bath. Drink plenty of fluids, avoiding alcohol as this will dehydrate you further, and apply an aftersun cream (available from your pharmacy). Calamine lotion can relieve any itching or soreness. Paracetamol can be used to help any pain and control fever and ibuprofen can reduce inflammation and lower a high temperature.

Work and Strokes

At least a quarter of strokes happen to younger people, yet according to the findings of a Stroke Association poll, not enough of those who can and want to work are getting jobs. This is due to a lack of understanding of the impact of stroke.

To mark Action on Stroke Month 2015, the charity surveyed people in the UK who were in employment and had a stroke. The results showed that:

- A third of people (31%) who left their job following a stroke felt unable to remain as their employer did not understand the impact of their stroke.
- Over half (53%) said their employer didn't understand the impact of their stroke.
- Over a third of stroke survivors (36%) said that their employer did not try to make the changes they needed to return to work.

The charity also surveyed small and medium sized businesses in the UK regarding their attitudes to the impact of stroke on their staff. It found that:just one in 20 (7%) employers recognised thinking difficulties as a symptom of stroke.

When asked why businesses might be reluctant to employ a stroke survivor, two fifths (42%) said that they would have concerns about the impact of a stroke on an employee's ability to carry out their role. Half (50%) had not heard of the Government's Access to Work Scheme.

Over a third of stroke survivors (36%) said that their employer did not try to make the changes they needed to return to work

If you are a small business or just want more information on the effects of a stroke and would like advice and practical support to help stroke survivors return to employment then The Stroke Association's guide for employers helps prepare employers for a survivor's return to work.



A day in the life of a volunteer at Glen Finglas



A typical day at the Woodland Trust's sparkling new Visitor Gateway at Glen Finglas Estate (near Brig o'Turk), starts by checking that it is presentable for the day ahead – the touchy/feely boxes and leaflets are filled, the crayons and paper for rubbings on wet days are out, the water bowl for dogs is filled and of course everything is working – including the toilet! Then a quick run round the Lendrick and Little Drum car parks checking they are clean and they also have leaflets a-plenty - now ready for the onslaught of visitors!

Although we have great pictorial displays and leaflets I find our new electronic wide touch screen invaluable to show the end-to-end

30 miles of The Great Trossachs Path that we cover. This east-to-west path links the main north arteries of the West Highland Way at Loch Lomond to the Rob Roy Way at Callander (cycle route 7). The screen is designed to be used by anyone and offers the ability to zoom down into individual routes that people may wish to walk or cycle. We have a special interactive walk with touchy/feely boxes (in summer) for children, easy / hard / long / short / historical walking / cycling routes all complete with beautiful scenery to match! We have even added to each route the distance, whether it is hard / easy and of course a 'guesstimate' of the time it will take.

There is a dry board for observations – today it was 'beware of the cows with their calves' on one section, the other day it was 'deer spotted'. Now I'm just waiting to hear of a glimpse of our black grouse!

Being part of the community, I try to answer visitor questions – today's were: 'Where can I get a good bacon buttie and a coffee?' and 'can I take my bike on the boat to Stronachlacher?' Both questions are easily answered: 'in Brig o' Turk', and 'yes you can, but book early!'

We also have to deal with 'things that aren't quite right' – today it was the mess left after a loch side party that seemed to go wrong. As I cleared up I found a burnt out tent, melted torch and half-drunk bottles of booze - indicating a hasty retreat! There was also a small tree down across one of the paths, which was soon cleared up.

Such is a typical day at our sparkling new Gateway centre – what else would you rather do? That's easy – go on one of our many walks or cycles!

Moths, Hares, Squirrels and Owls at the SWT AGM!

The Scottish Wildlife Trust AGM in April was followed by four short presentations.

In 'Moths of the Trossachs' Arthur Jones' photographs clearly showed that moths are not all small, brown, jumper-eaters but can be as attractive as butterflies. While Scotland has only 35 species of butterfly, moths are far more numerous, notionally categorised as macro >20mm wingspan (800) and micro moths <20mm (1500).



Between March and September a wide range of species emerges, mostly seen at night but some are day-flying. Monthly highlights included; red-green carpet, emperor (day), hooktips, beautiful carpet, northern eggar (day), poplar hawk, garden tiger, beautiful snout – check them out!

Paul McDonald, Project Officer with SWT's Saving Scotland's Red Squirrels, gave a project update. N American grey squirrels easily out-compete our smaller native reds for food and territory. They also carry squirrel pox virus (SPV) to which they are resistant but infected reds die within 2 weeks. Worryingly, it has now been found in Glasgow and Plean Country Park.

Control of grey squirrels is controversial but effective, although soon undone once stopped. While a vaccine for reds is feasible, it is

unaffordable and difficult to deliver. The majority of the UK's red squirrels are in Scotland, mainly north of the Highland Boundarv Fault. making Callander an important frontier. Everyone can help by reporting grey and red squirrel sightings on the new website, posting squirrel-related articles on Paul's blog, or by offering practical help like making

wooden feeder boxes. Would anyone be interested in setting up a local red squirrel group to co-ordinate such activities? Report sightings on http:// scottishsquirrels.org.uk/squirrelsightings and/or contact Paul on pmcdonald@scottishwildlifetrust.org.uk.

Barn owls are one of the most easily recognised and popular British birds but, unfortunately, prone to large variations in population due to weather and fluctuating populations of field voles, their principle food source. Mike Steward has been putting up nest boxes and monitoring barn owl populations in Central Scotland since 1990, starting with just 4 breeding pairs and reaching a peak of 74 pairs in 2010.

The winter of 2009/10 was the coldest for 20 years but with little snow so owls could continue to feed, plus a peak in voles, allowed good broods to be raised. In contrast, 2010/11's winter was not as cold but had prolonged periods of deep snow that protected what voles remained after numbers had crashed. This was disastrous with a huge number of owls starving to death, leaving only 24 breeding pairs in Mike's boxes and none in FCS's 35-40 boxes. Since then there has been a slow recovery; from 24 to 33 breeding pairs between 2012 & '13, to 58 in 2014 plus over 168 chicks due to high vole numbers. Mike is predicting owl numbers will dip in 2015 as voles crash but both will increase again in 2016 to a record high in 2017, IF we don't get severe winters with long-lying snow!

Kevin Duffy's talk on his recent Mountain Hare surveys coincided with a press announcement that 10 conservation organisations had issued a joint petition for a 3-year ban on culling of mountain hares. This would stop



local extinctions and allow a scientific assessment of the impact of tics, known to affect grouse chicks but with unknown impact on final grouse bags. These tics are known to be carried by hares but also by co-located sheep and deer.

This was a rare opportunity to see how hares are caught in applebaited cage traps spread over a wide moorland area. 100 traps spread over 4 grids of 25 meant an 8 mile route over difficult terrain to check them once every 24 hours. If conditions like heavy snow would be detrimental to trapped animals, the traps are locked open. Caught hares are weighed, measured, sex determined and a small, numbered metal tag fitted on the ear. At the start in October the hares were largely brown but became whiter as days got shorter and temperatures fell. By recording the number of tagged hares returning to traps, a statistical method is used to assess the size of the local hare population and future surveys will provide trends.

Ghosts of the night

or skywatchers in Scotland, summer nights remain bathed in bright twilight which prevents observing anything in detail other than the Moon and planets. However, all is not lost as summer nights bring with them a different kind of phenomena ghostly 'night-shining' clouds

Noctilucent (Latin for night-shining) clouds are very different from normal weather clouds and can only be seen during the summer months when the sun is below the horizon. If there are noctilucent clouds around, you will see wisps of golden, white or 'electric blue' clouds bright against the darkening northern sky.

Noctilucent clouds are found high in our atmosphere hovering near the edge of space, 80-85 km high (50-53 miles). They are comprised of extremely small ice crystals that form on fine dust particles including dust from meteors. They always appear in the northern hemisphere between late May and early August and can sometimes be seen above the western, northern and eastern horizons about an hour after sunset until around 1 a.m. in the summer. They will quickly reach a peak brightness, then fade slowly until the sun has passed its lowest point below the horizon. Then they will brighten again in the pre-sunrise sky. Morning displays can often be more dramatic than evening ones.

Weather clouds occur much lower in the atmosphere than noctilucent clouds (ten times lower) and don't catch the sunlight and so always appear silhouetted against the evening twilight.

You will know you are looking at a noctilucent cloud due to its structure and form. They often have largescale billows or waves, which are uncommon in weather clouds. Also, if you observe the sky for a few minutes and note which way the clouds are drifting, noctilucent clouds will almost always move from east to west and for a time they will get brighter. From Callander, typical wind patterns will take weather clouds from west to east - the opposite of noctilucent clouds.

If you see them this summer you are likely to be mesmerized by the beautiful structure and colours these clouds can produce.

Ben A'an update

he programme to undertake essential The programme to conserve the landscape for everyone got underway in Autumn 2014 and is on course to be completed by December this year.

Forestry Commission Scotland has successfully completed the first phase

of the conservation project which has seen the removal of trees from around a power line and public road on the lower section of the hillside. The next steps will be:

- · Tree felling further up the hillside in Spring and Summer which will require the popular Ben A'an hill path to be closed until the end of December. Access will be maintained using a temporary dedicated hill-path diversion that leads to the Ben A'an summit from the Ben Venue car park.
- The path will be reinstated once the work is completed in December and timber removed from the site

The felling at Ben A'an is being undertaken as part of a wider Land Management Plan which aims to reshape the forest and reintroduce a greater range of native trees to the Ben A'an area such as oak, birch, aspen, rowan and hazel. This is part of The Great Trossachs Forest Project, launched in 2009, which aims to restore 16.500ha of Scotland's native woodland.

National Park reveals plan for future development of Callander

Our new Proposed Local Development Plan is all about how development can make the National Park a great place to Live, Invest, Visit and Experience. It is referred to as a 'Proposed' Plan as we are inviting comment before we 'adopt' it.

This Plan, which guides new development and sets out the planning policies which will be used to determine planning applications, covers the period 2017 until 2027. Once adopted, this Plan will replace our existing local plan and will be updated regularly (every five years) so it is kept up to date.

We have considered a wide range of information in preparing this Plan. This includes our own research and work with partner organisations such as Stirling Council. There has been extensive engagement with the community and its businesses and landowners; going back as far as the Callander 'Charrette' in 2011.

We also gathered a lot of feedback last year from our consultations on the Main Issues Report and the subsequent Additional Sites Report. This has all shaped this Plan.

What else do I need to know?

A number of documents accompany this Plan providing additional and more detailed guidance – this includes the **Draft Callander South Masterplan Framework.** Comments are also invited on this draft. 

In the End of Seasonal postal shoot John Gardiner came 3rd in competition 1 and 2nd in both competition 2 and 3 - well done John!



Railway memorabilia

This coming September marks the fiftieth anniversary of the closing of Callander Railway Station. The line was one of the many victims of Dr Beeching's plans for rationalising British Railways. At the time, Government policy was based upon the premise that roads would suffice for all transportation.

The line opened in 1858 with five trains per day in the summer and two in the winter terminating at Callander. In 1870 a new company, the Callander and Oban Railway extended the line as far as Glenoglehead and eventually reached Oban in 1880. The station building dated from 1870 and its site is *continued on next page*





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
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
