Callander needs visitors to enable the town to survive in a role that is not just being a dormitory town. We need appropriate visitor attractions, appropriately maintained and appropriately signposted. Sadly there remain significant problems. It seems that the many times postponed reopening of the ridge at the Crags is happening now, although the notice still predicts August. The map board that used to be in the Crags car park has not been replaced.

Visitors trying to find the Bracklinn falls on foot reach the Crags car park but there are neither signposts nor that

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map. Locals do their best to direct wandering visitors.

The main path from that car park is in poor shape, with large loose stones forming most of the surface. A layer of fine gravel was laid over only part of the path. There remains a large surplus drainage pipe that is definitely not biodegradable. The hillside looks abandoned.

The Meadows have been left un-mown again, with the reeds gradually taking over.

We all greatly welcome the improvements promised in a couple of years by the HLF Callander Landscape Partnership, and will do our utmost to make that a success.

However, we have to recognise that it is the current problems that are doubtless in the memories that visitors take home with them, and disseminate amongst their friends and relatives, perhaps to our future disadvantage.

Help Shape Callander's Future

Thank you to everyone who took the time to complete the community survey in the last issue of the Ben Ledi View. We were looking for your views for the next five-year Community Action Plan (CAP) for 2017 to 2022 and had a great response to both the paper and online versions. We were also very impressed with the response from pupils at Callander Primary and McLaren High School who sent a large number of forms containing original and thoughtful responses.

At the time of writing we're just starting to compile the results and so far it looks like many of the things that you like and don't like so much about Callander are fairly similar to five years ago. You still love the beautiful surroundings, our friendly and active community with its pubs and local shops, but don't like the busy trunk road, parking problems and empty shops. Improvements you'd like to see include better play parks, more outdoor activities, better signage to the path network and improvements to the local paths.

Open Community and Business Meetings

The surveys contain a lot more detail than we can show here. The full results will be presented at two community meetings on Wednesday 7th September at Callander Hostel, Bridgend; one at 2-4pm and one at 7-9pm. We'll look in more detail at some of the priority areas to discuss and agree how to achieve what the community wants, who should be involved and how to fund the activity. There will also be displays from Callander Community Development Trust and partner organisations on projects they are planning in Callander for you to find out more, comment on or get involved in.

Please do try to come along to see what people have been saying and to influence the priorities for the next five years.

On Tuesday 6th September, Callander Enterprise will host a similar workshop 6.00-8.00pm at the Callander Hostel to focus on the priorities for our business community.

All the feedback from the surveys, September meetings and sessions with High School pupils in August will be presented on Friday 21st and Saturday 22nd October, where we will check priorities again and firm up the key actions for the next Community Action Plan. We'll bring you more details of these sessions in the October-November Ben Ledi View.

What is the Community Action Plan?

The current Community Action Plan for 2012-17 was drawn up through consultation with local people and the 2011 Callander charrette and is an expression of the things that our community wanted to see improved or implemented by all the organisations and groups, public and voluntary, active in the town. It's a way of coordinating the activity and resources and focusing them on what we, the local community, see as important.

Local Government Boundary Commission for Scotland

The Local Government Boundary Commission for Scotland has submitted to Scottish Ministers its Reports and Final Recommendations, for the number of councillors and the electoral ward boundaries in each of Scotland's 32 local authorities.

The Final Recommendations for Stirling Council area presents an electoral arrangement of 23 councillors representing five 3-member wards and two 4-member wards, increasing councillor numbers in the area by 1.

There are no changes to the Teith and Trossachs Ward.

Today's launch is part of the Trust's Digital Participation Project (in partnership with Social Telecoms) which sees a Digital Kiosk installed in the communal area of a number of Trust premises along with iPads for resident use. Callander's Alexandra Russell, a self-confessed technophobe, has been persuaded to take on the role of 'Digital Champion', leading the charge and encouraging others to embrace this new technology. On the one hand Alexandra saw this as ironic given her technophobe status. On the other, she is the ideal candidate to show fellow residents that, with a little help, they too

can learn how to use and eniov this newfangled technology.

Alexandra is fortunate that she is still able to go out,

meet up with friends and participate in the community, but recognises that some are more or less confined to their home. Access to the internet with tools such as email, Skype and social media not only make the outside world more accessible, but can now connect the residents almost instantly to friends, family and a million possibilities.

To those who said 'I'm too old to learn new things' Gail Gourlay of Trust Housing makes the point that it's not necessarily about learning new things, but rediscovering old things. Fancy visiting the foreign land where a dear friend once lived? Cue virtual maps,



and within minutes residents can explore places throughout the world. Love jigsaw puzzles, reading, watching old movies playing

games? Fancy seeing the grandchildren on a regular basis but they live too far away? Now residents of Trust Housing in Callander can do all this and more.

Suddenly even the reluctant few are eager to explore the vast possibilities that digital technology presents.

Champion Digital Alexandra describes this new technology as a 'pleasure boat that is going to exotic places' and thanks to the Digital Participation Project residents need not be 'stranded on the deserted shore, sadly waving [their] hankies.'



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John's soapbox

emocracy is dead. I am not talking about big democracy, as the

recent referendum showed, although even here I have my doubts at times. I am talking about the small democracy of living in a town like Callander. What brought this to mind? Wheely Bins!

without Stirling Council, consultation that I heard of, go on correct me - but if it happened it bypassed me - decided that we should have four, yes 4, wheely bins, plus one box. I don't want four wheely bins. As I have a driveway on my house I do actually have room for four wheely bins, which is more than a lot of people have, but I don't want my drive to look like an annexe to the Lagrannoch Recycling Centre. Many households will find four wheely bins virtually impossible. I know special arrangements are going to be made for people living in flats etc. but the point is that this has again just been foisted on us. Stirling Council say consultation with Community councils took place, but according to the Stirling Observer of the 8th April a number of Community Councils dispute this, saying that at the time the outlines were so vague and they were told no details were available (I don't know Callander Community Council's views on this).

Now don't get me wrong, I am totally in favour of recycling. I recycle as much as I can and it always has surprised me that Stirling Council did not recycle other types of plastic. This will apparantly be sorted with the new system. I am totally for recycling and would like to be recycled myself, when the time comes, by being put in a field with a nice fruit tree above me. Cox's or Victoria Plum would be nice.

What I am against is a total lack of consultation. And this is not just about wheely bins. It's all over. A town like Callander has different needs from a city like Stirling.

Stirling Council has 22 members of which 3 represent Callander, therefore if we need something done for Callander, not only do we have to

convince a majority of the other 19 but we run up against the bureaucratic attitude of - well if we do it for you then they may want the same - and we cannot afford that.

The reorganisation of local government in Scotland that took place in 1975 which abolished burgh councils saw the end of Callander Town Council and was the first step on a slow but relentless terminal illness for local democracy.

What we got in its place was an advisory group - Callander Community Council - with no real funds and no real power, with various trusts and partnerships doing their own thing.

I call for a return of Callander Town Council, with its powers and funds to help Callander to flourish again.

RBS are closing their branch in Callander. I don't bank with them, so doesn't affect me, however it does affect quite a few in the town. When RBS found themselves in difficulty a few years ago the UK government had to bail them out with our money, to the extent that we own 82% of it, yet when we would like something - like a branch to remain open - there is no empathy. Big business is all give and take - we give, they take.

On the shop front nothing has really changed, the empty are still empty and no sign of a change on the way. However, an interesting thing about the Charity Shops is that as you know they pay no rates. However, rates are collected by zones and each zone has to meet a target of income based on the average rent in that zone, a crazy scheme - but that is apparantly how it works. If a Charity takes over a shop in a zone they don't pay rates, but the zone has to meet its figure - so where does it come from? From the other shops in the zone, so the other shops are subsidising the charity shops. At least that's how it was explained to me. I know - I couldn't believe it either, must be wrong - if you know differently let me know. The free rates are given as 80% laid down by the Scottish

Government and 20% at the discretion of the local council. I call on the Scottish government to review their policy and Stirling Council to charge the 20% and give it as relief to the shopkeepers who are struggling at the moment. As I have said before, the current rates system is unfit for purpose.

I understand that there is to be a meeting in the Callander Youth Project on the 7th September to talk about the Callander Action Plan and at which Stirling Council Officials will attend to talk about the City Deal. See page 3 for details. This should not be missed. There also will be a meeting sometime in October to discuss the outcome of the Charrette.

One Sunday recently, my wife wandered down town to find a very quiet town. She did the round of the charity shops as is her wont and was in one, which will remain nameless, and overheard a conversation between a customer and staff member in which the staff member was bemoaning the fact that the town was so quiet. They finished off with the statement that 'Callander is finished' - Let's hope they

t had been our intention that in this issue, we would begin a series of articles about people who can influence what is happening in Callander, so that you know who they are and what they do.

We had hoped to kick this off with an interview with Sheila Winstone, Town Co-Ordinator. Unfortunately despite a number of requests for a chat/interview, Sheila is extrememly busy and we could not arrange a date to meet.

Therefore we apologise for this article being unavailable. However we will persist and interview someone for the next issue.

The changing face of Main Street...

Afew years ago I was asked to write about the wartime exploits of that great local character Bobby Wardrope. During many visits to his home armed with notepad, pen and voice recorder, I looked forward to hearing his recollections, not only of his escapades during the war, but also of his days growing up as a young boy in Callander.

On one of these visits, the bones of an idea popped into my head. I thought it would make an interesting article to ask Bobby to compare the Callander Main Street of today with that of his time around the 1920s and 30s.

Our journey through Callander Main Street of that era begins in Station Road, where the newly opened Callander Physiotherapy was once a Fishing Tackle maker's shop. Around the corner, Menzies used to be the Office of the Inspector of the Poor and the office of the Inspector of Taxes. Part of Menzies was the Commercial Bank.

Next door, the Old Bank restaurant was MacDonald the Drapers and above



was Duncan's Temperance Hotel. The Crown Hotel at the height of Callander's popularity was said to have served 5,000 meals a day when the trains decanted their hordes of eager tourists and day trippers at the station. Heading further along there was a Linen Draper's and D&J MacEwen family grocers for whom Bobby worked as a youth.

MacEwen's, who originated in Stirling and expanded into many small towns in Stirlingshire and Perthshire, played a prominent part in the growth of Callander. On his retiral, Daniel MacEwen, who ran the Callander branch and lived in 'The Kraesult', was awarded a special commendation and inscribed silver plate by the Burgh of Callander at an award

ceremony. In the text of the official recognition document it was interesting to note the Burgh Council's description of Callander at that time – 'The rise and progress of Callander from a rural hamlet to one of the best known and most popular of Health Resorts'. Above MacEwen's was the Temperance Hotel and next door was the Post Office before it moved to Ancaster Square.

On the other corner of Cross Street was McGregor's Hotel, later changed to the Star Hotel. When I arrived in Callander in the mid 1980s this was the Ancaster Hotel. There was a Jeweller's



where Kokosnoot is and Farrens the Chemist was a Plumber's. Andrew Baird Opticians used to be a Grocer's, the Royal Bank a cottage and on the corner stood a Barber's and Tobacconist.

Across Ancaster Square, this section of Main Street included an Ironmonger's. Grocer's, Stationer's, a couple of cottages, an old house and a Draper's shop. Crossing Main Street and heading back down towards the Meadows, we discover that the Waverley Hotel was still there, followed by a Draper's later to become a Tea Room. Following this was a Baker's and a Fancy Goods shop. John Glen's shop lay empty for some time. Next door was Wm Glen Tailor's. PDSA was an Ironmonger's, Burgh Coffee House was a Butcher's and Trossachs Woollen Mill was a Dairy and then became Café Rex.

Heading back across the other half of the square, Main Street Bakers was a Fancy Goods shop, next was a Shoe shop, a Bookshop and the Bank of Scotland was still the same Bank. On the corner was the Eagle Temperance Hotel.

The last block before the Meadows consisted of a Saddler's business where Shanti lies empty, a Stationer's occupied

the empty Paeony Gift shop and a Baker's stood where Creative in Callander now is. Down the close next to Callander Meadows restaurant, there was a Plumber's workshop. After this were some cottages, a Fishmonger, a Cabinetmaker and some more houses. Amongst other notable businesses was Callander's own newspaper the Callander Advertiser incorporating the Killin Times, which had its office in Main Street. This was a sister paper to the Stirling Observer and other local titles owned by the Stirling business of Jamieson & Munro.

The Callander Hydropathic Hotel, now the site of Callander Holiday Park on the Invertrossachs Road was an imposing building that attracted wealthier tourists looking to sample the invigorating Trossachs waters and specialised health treatments on offer. The hotel burned down twice before re-emerging as the Palace Hotel, Bobby recalled an occasion which saw Callander's biggest ever fire when one evening the hotel was accidentally set alight. As with every major incident, local people rushed to the scene to offer their help and assistance. On this occasion, a handful of eager locals found their way into the cellar and the outcome resulted in Callander's very own version of 'Whisky Galore'. The Old Eagle Hotel/ Golf shop, which sits on the corner of Main Street and Bridge Street has been an eyesore for a long time - made worse now that the shop is empty. It is highly visible and does not help Callander's image of a lively and vibrant town.

We contacted the National Park (as Planning Authority) on your behalf and asked them what was happening. The reply was, 'The National Park is aware and concerned at the continuing deterioration of the building. This category C listed building, located in the Callander Conservation Area is at the centre of on-going discussions between the National Park, Stirling Council and the owners with a view to resolving the situation and securing the repair and re-occupation of the property.'

'The National Park has powers to secure the repair of listed buildings through the serving of various statutory notices but it is always preferable to resolve building repair issues through negotiation with the owner wherever possible. Discussions are still on-going with the owners of The Eagle regarding the future of this property so we remain hopeful that it will not be necessary to go down the statutory notice route.

Stirling Council also has powers to secure the repair of the property through Housing, Environmental Health and Building Standards legislation.'

We hope they hurry up!

Landscape Partnership update



The Callander Landscape Partnership programme is made up of more than 20 projects that we plan to carry out in and around Callander with funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF). The projects are grouped into four themes: restore, research, engage and explore, each with a team of people working together to make sure that projects are fully thought through and ready to go back to the HLF for further approval next year.

One of our projects this summer will be surveying Little Leny Meadow, ahead of plans to reinstate a traditional meadow management regime, with help from Plant Life and Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park Authority. We aim to put in place a regime of grass cutting and mowing that emulates the historic management of the meadow, thereby promoting growth of a wider variety of grasses and wild flowers.

Little Leny Meadow is one of the most northerly examples of a wet hay meadow and an important habitat for unusual plants, which in turn support a wide variety of invertebrates making this project important in terms of understanding biodiversity and the impact of wetter winters on species diversity.

We also hope to provide better access and interpretation to the meadow and beyond to the Buchanan Graveyard, although negotiating the wettest parts of the meadow will present some challenges!

Callander Crags path reopening

ince the extreme weather event of December 2013, Forestry Enterprise Scotland have been working through a programme of works to clear the resulting storm damaged trees at Callander Crags.

In 2015 a short section of approx 250m of the tree clearance works. located directly on top of the Crags was completed by specialist rope and winch access. Subsequently further machine works took place to clear the majority of the windblown trees on the east of the site. Essential path repairs were then carried out enabling this section of the main path to be re-opened.



Due to the difficult site access it has not been possible to remove the remaining trees by machine, therefore the decision was taken to source a specialist Arboricultural contractor to cut and clear by hand the remaining windblown trees directly adjacent to the path on the west ridge of the Crags. After this work is completed we are aiming to re-open the full trail loop by the end of July 2016.

We would like to apologise for the time it has taken to re-open this section of the path; it has not been straight forward due to the complex nature of the storm damage and site access. At present it has been necessary to leave the timber in-situ as we look at the management options for site access.

Watch meteors over Callander on August 12/13

opefully we will still have warm weather in August, which is an excellent time for observing the night sky - warm nights and the sky gets darker much earlier than in recent months.

August is the month that the Perseid meteor shower arrives - it reaches its peak just a few days after you receive this issue - on the night of August 12th-13th

If the skies are clear then you are likely to see around 80-100, possibly even up to 150 meteors an hour. They leave trails which usually last a few seconds and this shower is also known for producing some very bright meteors.

Meteor showers are produced when the Earth crosses a stream of comet dust and the particles that rain down through our atmosphere are usually no bigger than 5mm across while the streak of light we see is the

tiny particle burning up 100km above

The Perseids are debris from Comet Swift-Tuttle, also known as the Great Comet of 1862.

So what do you need to do to see this summer meteor shower?

Firstly you need a dark sky to enjoy the show so keep away from house and street lights if you can. You should give yourself at least an hour to spot the meteors - the best time to see them is after midnight but some will show up much earlier too.

The meteors will tend to appear from one place in the sky but you don't need to worry where that is, as they can be seen anywhere above you. It's a good idea to observe the meteors from the comfort of a reclining chair or a sunbed.

Remember, all good things come to those who wait. Find a good spot and watch and wait - good luck!

Red squirrels and pine martins

e may have passed the longest day but the good news is that it brings us closer to the new season of SWT Wildlife talks; the excellent programme is on the SWT website http://scottishwildlifetrust.org.uk/localmember-group/callander/.

On 13th September we have Emma Sheehy, a Research Fellow at Aberdeen University talking on 'Interactions between Pine Martens and Squirrels' This includes setting up survey sites to record the number of visits to feeder boxes by squirrels and pine martens, using camera traps and sticky pads on feeder boxes. One of the tetrads is in Callander Woods where a very cute trio of young pine martens was filmed. The Saving Scotland's Red Squirrels Project also completed spring surveys in Callander and Coilhallan Woods, results available later in the year. Everyone can help by reporting sightings of any red or grey squirrels on http://scottishsquirrels.org. uk/squirrel-sightings/.

This year's first Balsam Bash on the River Teith was in July with another opportunity on 21 August, meet outside Callander Medical Centre at 10am. This is our fourth year and there is definitely much less than in the past but new patches still need attention. It is a pity to remove such an attractive flower, especially one enjoyed by bees and making good honey. However, it seeds prolifically, crowds out our native plants and diverts the bees from pollinating them.



Giant hogweed - Don't touch!!

This is one of the easy ones to remove with no nasty side-effects but if you encounter giant hogweed do not handle it as the sap can lead to nasty burns in sunlight.

Also if you come across Japanese Knotweed do not chop it down as any small pieces root and spread it further: it is best tackled by spraying with herbicide. It is actually illegal to allow any invasive non-native flora and fauna to escape into the wild.

Flood protection update

urther to the 'Flood protection improvements on the horizon' report which appeared on page 13 of the BLV's April-May issue, Stirling Council have just agreed with their consultants to take forward a two stage brief for the Callander flood protection scheme looking at a preliminary design followed by a detailed design.

The council intend to undertake the ground investigation works in The Meadows towards the end of the summer/start of autumn 2016, although they have have yet to put out a tender for the work.

A desk-based assessment will require to be undertaken first and then investigation on the ground will follow. The works will not be hugely disruptive but the council want to avoid the height of the tourist season.

The council's intention would be to discuss plans with the Callander Flood Advisory Group and the Community Council, followed up by a public meeting once more detail is available.

Following this stage, a preliminary design should be available which will give the Callander community a better idea about what the flood protection scheme in The Meadows will look like.

We will keep readers up to date with developments.



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



BLV Book Club review

The Lubetkin Legacy

by Marina Lewycka (Penguin, 2016)



was delighted to receive this month's book review copy of The Luketkin Legacy Marina Lewycka. Gleaming new, hot-off-thepress, with its aesthetically-

pleasing cover (pinks, purples, pigeons) and a contemporary subject, Britain's housing crisis. Excuse the pun, but this sounded right up my street. I couldn't wait to get started.

BLV readers may be familiar with Lewcyka's writings, most famously her first novel, A Short History of Tractors in Ukrainian. This book could be described as the first of its type, giving a humorous account of life in Britain for first and second generation eastern Europeans immigrants. The characters were comedic caricatures surviving the cultural melting pot of south-east England. Lewcyka's writing was clever and entertaining

The Lubetkin Legacy looked like it

would tick those same boxes. Set in north London in the 21st Century, the action focuses on a high rise block of flats built in post-war Britain by architect Berthold Lubetkin. Lubetkin was a reformer, an architect with a social conscience. He didn't simply design buildings but had a vision to design and build homes in spaces that would harbour communities and work towards creating cohesive societies where all classes felt valued and respected.

Fast forward 65 years and we live in very different times. Our main character, Bertie, is a between-jobs actor, who in his 40s, newly divorced and homeless, found himself living back with his mother in the council flat that was his childhood home. Now seven years later when his mother suddenly dies, with the onset of new government policy, he is now 'over-occupying' the flat and housing officers are sniffing around his door at the possibility of a 'spare' bedroom.

Unfortunately, after my initial excitement at receiving the book, as I read on, I found myself failing to see the funny side. The book superficially covers a myriad of real contemporary housing issues – overcrowding, buy-to-let, dodgy landlords and the bedroom tax. Unemployed Bertie is facing the real possibility of homelessness, and therefore makes

the desperate decision to conceal his mother's death from the prying local housing officers. Events escalate, quickly becoming near-farcical but, unfortunately, I struggled to crack a smile.

Maybe it's the timing of Lewcyka's novel, but I expected a more considered account of a desperate situation with a sprinkling of her usual wry humour. Instead, the book read like a rejected Fawlty Towers script.

Sorry Marina, but this, in my view, was way off target.

The next BLV book club review will be *The Glorious Heresies* by Lisa McInerney.

Another season of great movies!

I ow's the time to sign up for Callander Film Society's next Season. We have 11 contemporary movies, many awardwinning and some you wouldn't get to see in most cinemas, shown in Clanranald Trust's theatre in St Kessog's on Saturdays. The classic programme has five screenings on Fridays at The Waverley Hotel. Membership for the contemporary programme is £22, the classic is £7 or join both for £27 - that's less than £2

The season kicks off on 8th October with the winner of 2016 best film Oscar. Spotlight is about the Boston Globe's investigative team delving into decades of child abuse claims against the Catholic Church. It's followed by The Revenant which won Leonardo di Caprio best actor BAFTA and Oscar for his performance as a man consumed by grief as he navigates a vicious winter to find redemption.

Room is a unique and touching exploration of the boundless love between a mother and her child when Jack discovers the outside world. Bridge of Spies, directed by Steven Speilberg and starring Tom Hanks, as a lawyer who finds himself thrust into the centre of the cold war when sent by the CIA to negotiate the release of an American airman. A remarkable love story is told in The Danish Girl, inspired by the lives of Lili Elbe and Gerda Wegener, played by Eddie Redmayne and Alicia Vikander, as they navigate Lili's groundbreaking journey as a transgender pioneer. Anomalisa is an animated black comedy about a motivational speaker bored with his life. The Big Short with Christian Bale and Brad Pitt is a thriller set in the world of banking as a global collapse is imminent and Eye in the Sky features Helen Mirren as a UK-based officer in command of top secret drone operation to capture terrorists on Kenya.

The first of three foreign movies is Son of Saul, a harrowing story of a Hungarian Auschwitz-Birkenau prisoner forced to assist the Nazis when he finds what he takes to be the body of his own son in a camp crematorium. Mustang is about a group of schoolgirls in a small village in northern Turkey as summer begins and The Brand New Testament is a comic fantasy from Belgium.

Each classic screening includes a cartoon or short before the main film. We start in November with Bette Davis in All About Eve (1950) playing an aging theatre star who befriends an adoring fan and soon discovers the young woman is taking over her life. Les Diaboliques (1955) from France is full of suspense when the body of a cruel headmaster murdered by his wife and mistress disappears. The New Year starts with The Scarlett Empress (1934) with Marlene Dietrich starring in the story of Catherine the Great's rise to power in 18th Century Russia. *Intermezzo* (1939) is the love story between a famous violinist and his musical protégée and we'll also show The Forth Road Bridge documentary from the 1960s. Finally Key Largo (1948) is the star-studded thriller about a gangster holding a group of people captive in a Florida hotel during a tropical storm-





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Cook's Corner

August/September

ROASTED ROOT **VEGETABLES** with RASPBERRY VINEGAR GLAZE Serves 4

Ingredients:

- · 1.5kg mixed carrots, parsnips, beetroot and celery (in whatever proportions you like)
- · 2 sprigs thyme
- 75ml olive oil
- · 25g butter
- · 2 red onions, peeled and cut into wedges
- 1 bulb garlic broken into cloves, skin on
- · 3tbsp raspberry vinegar
- Seasoning

Method:

- · Heat the oven to Gas no.5, 200c, fan 180c.
- Peel the root vegetables and cut into large chunks. Cut the celery sticks into large chunks.
- · Put them into a roasting dish with the thyme, pour over the olive oil and mix well to coat the vegetables.
- · Add the butter in small pieces over the top and season well.
- · Roast for half an hour, then add the onions and garlic cloves.
- Turn the vegetables and baste them, ensuring that everything is well covered and browning evenly.
- · Roast for another half hour, then splash in the raspberry vinegar, mixing well.
- · Cook for a further 10 minutes, or until the vegetables are cooked through, coated with a shiny, caramelised glaze.

Lungworm (Angiostrongylus vasorum) not one of our usual dog worms

We have had our first case of this lungworm in a dog confirmed by testing. Every dog owner can help reduce the spread of this worm by:

Early diagnosis and treatment, which relies on you noticing the following signs in your dog:

- Getting unusually tired during their normal exercise or a reluctance to exercise.
- · Getting unexpectedly "out of breath".
- · Coughing.
- Prolonged bleeding from minor wounds.

 Any other sign associated with bleeding elsewhere in the body.

Preventing infection and spread of the worm by:

- Stopping your dog from eating slugs and snails (carriers of the immature worm). This includes removing dog toys from the garden that could hide small slugs and snails that your dog may accidentally eat when playing.
- Picking up your dog's faeces when on a walk or in your garden. This includes from the long grass as slugs and snails can still find dog

faeces there!

Using certain worming products.
 These products are prescription only medications so you will need to be registered with a vet to get them.

Why am I telling you all this? Because unlike other worms that we normally see in this area this one, if left untreated, can result in the death of the dog. Before you panic, please remember we only have one confirmed case and there is a lot you can do to prevent this worm from spreading. If you need more advice, please contact your vet.

Obituary of Thomas Swan Simpson, formerly of Callander and McLaren High School

Captain Thomas Swan Simpson (7th April 1920-26th May 2016) died peacefully in Strathmore Hospice, Forfar, aged 96. He was one of four children born to the late John George Simpson and Marion (Mysie) Steel Simpson (née Swan). Their father was the manager of the Bank of Scotland in Callander from 1926 until



his retirement in 1950 and was Provost from 1954 until 1960. Tom and his brothers, Innes and Harold (both deceased) and sister Agnes (Nancy) Naesmith Simpson, now of Musselburgh, grew up in Callander and attended McLaren High School where Tom excelled in sports, art and academic studies and was Dux Ludorum in 1938.

After leaving school, Tom joined Renfrewshire police constabulary; then, in 1940, enlisted in the 9th Batallion Seaforth Highlanders. In 1942 he received his commission into the Indian army and was assigned to the 4th Battalion (Outram's) of the Rajputana Rifles, based in Delhi. He rose to the rank of Captain, served

in Egypt and in Italy where the battalion saw action in the devastating Battle of Monte Cassino.

Tom left the army in 1946 and then studied Design and Craft at Edinburgh College of Art, where he met the late Yvonne Margaret Walker, a student of glass engraving and stained glass, whom he married in 1949.



They had three children: Diana, Lindsay and Moira. Tom had a successful career teaching art in secondary schools in Scotland and Canada, and enjoyed amateur dramatics with Cupar Operatic Society and singing with Angus Choral Society. The family lived in Vancouver, Canada from 1957 until 1962, then returned to Scotland where Tom taught at Morebattle School near Kelso, Bell Baxter Senior High School in Cupar, Fife, and Alva Academy in Clackmannanshire from where he retired as Principal Teacher of Art.

He lovingly cared for Yvonne during a prolonged period of illness until her death in 1993. In 1998, he married Avril Wright (née Gibson), whom he leaves as a widow. He was the much-loved father of his three children, two grandchildren, Daniel and Nicola Palmer, and four great-grandchildren, Kai, Dane, Codie and Jake Palmer, all of whom, with the exception of Lindsay, live in South Australia.

The funeral service took place at Parkgrove Crematorium in Friockheim on Friday 3rd June. His ashes will be interred in the family plot in Callander.

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
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
