We have some good news to report on page 3 of this month's edition, the opening of the Callander Play Park. After three years of hard work from many individuals and organisations in the community the children of the town have a play area they can really enjoy. Let's hope the current good weather continues for them!

June also saw Callander's Citizen of the Year awarded to Mark Nicols. Congratulations to Mark, who received the award for his contributions to the community when the pandemic hit. During lockdown, Mark provided meals for delivery to a range of people in different parts of Callander, as part of the Support Scheme. He has recently been organising the Thursday Craigard Club meals at the Callander Youth Project (CYP), for older members of the community.

Two positive developments for the tourist sector have been announced recently. The Bracklinn Falls should have a replacement bridge by early 2023. The new bridge is going to be a simpler structure than the last one, which fits in well with the landscape of the falls. It's also is going to be built to last, up to 120 years is quoted. It's going to be made of "weathering steel" which doesn't need painting or regular maintenance thus helping to protect

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the Keltie Water below it. Also, the refurbishment of the iconic steamship that graces Loch Katrine, the Sir Walter Scott, is due to be completed by September this year, complete with its new eco-friendly boilers! Sailing on the 122-year-old boat across Loch Katrine is one of the tourist highlights of the Trossachs and has been sorely missed this last couple of years.

I personally take great pleasure in seeing the Callander Jazz and Blues festival sponsor this month's edition. For me the festival is one of the many reasons that makes this small town special. Drawing fans from all over the country, it makes the first weekend in October a special experience with 50 live performances in 11 separate venues. I'm looking forward to it already!

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Opening of Camp Place Play Park, Callander

The sun shone on Sunday 19th June for the re-opening of Callander's Camp Place Play Park. Breezy enough to keep away the midges and dry the grass but not enough to send the gazebos flying. At last, after a three-year project, Camp Place Play Park was ready for opening and Mark Nicols, Callander's Citizen of the Year, cut the ribbon.

The project really started in 2019 when Callander Community Council decided that the planning gain fund held by Stirling Council from the Robertson Way development needed to be supplemented if it was to make the substantial improvement that the play park needed.

With the help of Stirling Council, and with Callander Community Council driving the project, an additional £100,000 was raised, which, together with

the planning gain of about £58,500 gave a substantial sum with which to plan the park. The development included play equipment with inclusive facilities to enable children, irrespective of any physical and mental challenges they may have, to find something to enjoy in our play park. Plus Forth Valley was helpful in helping with our design choices. A recent UK government publication from 2021 emphasised how much inclusive play design is needed.

If you have visited the park recently, you will know it has undergone quite a transformation and now includes a wide variety of equipment, both new and some pre-existing. Even the oldest equipment – the swings, have had new life breathed into them by being painted in a variety of bright colours – so they almost look like new again!

On our opening day, which was also Fathers' Day this year, there were stalls to enjoy, including a Swap or Buy toy and book stall run by the Primary school, who also provided some fun games including wellie throwing. The Brownie home-baking proved very popular, as did the face-painting. Callander P7 drew some amazing anti-litter posters which were put up around the play park and the message worked, as the final litter collection was small. Rotary Club ran some fun games, including Splat-the-Rat and Potty Dotty and also had a drawing competition. Both the posters and the drawings were judged by Callander Rotary Club and prizes given.

Trossachs Search and Rescue brought their amazing dog, and some heart start equipment, the football and rugby juniors were well represented and were also displaying their plans for future development of the sports clubs. Forth Valley Orienteers also had a stand – they have held several very popular sessions in the last few months in Callander.

A generous offer came from a kind local Camp Place resident who mowed all the play park that morning, so everything was perfect for the event.

Lots to do, plenty of sunshine and smiles, happy children, happy parents, especially the dads and grandads who came along, so a very happy day was had by all. It was great to see our community coming together and just informally enjoying their local park and picnicking in the sunshine.

We haven't stopped yet: there are still 4 wheelchair accessible picnic tables to go in, plus a repainted bench, hopefully at least one other litter bin, the rotten logs are kindly being replaced by Cambusmore Estate, and we are hoping to brighten up the path from the pedestrian access to the enclosed area with

thermoplastic images on the tarmac. As you and your family use the play park, if you have any ideas on future improvements or extras, please let us know using the email campplaceplaypark@gmail.com Next task – the BMX/bike track!

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

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Callendar Community Council (CCC) Summer Update From June To August

June 13th: Scheduled meeting - live

The June meeting was held as a live event in the Callander Youth Project (CYP). This was the first time since April 2020 that the CC members and members of the public had been able to meet together in the same physical space. Something that had, before that, been 'normal'.

We were glad to have three members of the public with us and we all considered the effect of space on discussion, involvement and availability. The ease of direct communication in a live meeting was generally felt to be a strong positive factor; the practical problems for many people of attending it were recognised as an equally strong negative aspect for others.

The outcome? A commitment to ensuring future hybrid meetings can combine the best features of both. Careful thought is being given to ensuring there is equal accessibility for both those participating online and in person.

Space, acoustics, meeting protocols, technical equipment - all will be checked, rehearsed, discussed- and tried out before and at the 15th August meeting. Come and join us and add your own voice and personal experience. The aim is to find a new, post-Covid 19 format that will work for everybody into the future.

Revised meeting schedules 2022-2023

Another item discussed at the meeting was the number and frequency of our scheduled meetings. The Secretary had researched the practice of other Community Councils and had discovered Callander was the only one to have 12 meetings in a year! One Council only has 6, the Stirling Council minimum. We agreed 9 was a practical number. Our aim is to ensure that dates during school holidays can be avoided.

Another result of this research was the suggestion that moving our meetings to the third Monday of the relevant month would also avoid school and other holidays, as well as removing the date clash with a neighbouring Community Council. It was agreed to adopt this schedule for 2022-23.

Local Place Plan (LPP)

Everyone will be aware that the LPP public consultancy closed on 30th June, with the results posted on https://callandersfuture.uk/consultation_results

These show the percentages of 'agree', 'don't agree', don't know' responses.

The Coordinator has described the next stages in an article in this issue. There is much to discuss and to prioritise with the various official bodies and local groups (including CCC and Callander Comminity Development Trust (CCDT)) in order to build on these aspirations for the community future.

Citizen of the year 2021: Mark Nicols

It was a pleasure to make this award to Mark Nicols as he formally opened the rejuvenated Camp Place Play Park on 19th June.

Mark had won this award for his outstanding work with various sections of the community, and this was an ideal opportunity to present the certificate to him. The award recognised his cross-community contribution:

St Kessog's update

Thank you to those who showed their support for the re-opening of St Kessog's, in the recent LPP survey. The results indicated that 84% of those participating (357 responses) thought Callander should have a community hall and that "as the landmark building in our Main Street, St Kessog's provides a natural gathering place for the community." This proposal will now be incorporated into Callander's Local Place Plan and submitted to the National Park and is consistent with the replies we received from our open invitation for support we made to you in August/September 2020.

Yes, it's taking a long time...but yes we are confident that it's going to happen.

To this end our new group of volunteers has been meeting and working on the application to set up the charitable trust "Friends of St Kessog's". We have now submitted this and when it is approved, they will become the trustees, whereas in subsequent years there will be elections.

Communication is always a difficult thing to get right and we are trying, but clearly we are not reaching everyone - there was a letter in a recent issue of the Observer, from someone in Callander saying they did not know what was happening to St Kessog's and thought there was a lack of public information.

The BLV has included an update on St Kessog's in every issue over at least the last year (thank you BLV editors). These articles included architect's floor plans, a description of the building, how it will be used and organisational information. We have put similar articles online on the Callander Discussion Forum and a while ago we even leafleted every property in Callander. But we will keep on trying, maybe with some drop-by sessions in the Square so we can listen to your thoughts on your community centre.

Callander's Place Plan – Update

The final public consultation closed on June 30th and the results can be found, online, at: https://callandersfuture.uk/consultation_results

Thank you to everyone who took the time to participate. All 35 of the proposals received majority support and will therefore go forward into our Place Plan submission to the National Park. We received input from an estimated 23-25% of all Callander households.

By the time you read this a list of priorities will be established, along with recommendations as to which body will be responsible, who will deliver the proposals and who should be consulted. This will allow everyone with an interest to understand the steps needed to complete each project.

As planned, I will be stepping down once I have delivered the Place Plan to the National Park. Callander Community Council and Callander Community Development Trust have accepted my suggestions to implement the proposals set out in the Place Plan.

These are:

- 1. That the existing Callander Partnership (which includes the Park, Stirling Council, our ward councillors, our MSP, social enterprises as well as Callander Community Council and Callander Community Development Trust) should function as the steering group providing oversight and overseeing delivery of the proposals in the Place Plan.
- 2. That an experienced Community Development Officer should be employed to act as a project manager and to support community liaison. Funding applications for this role been submitted to Scottish Government and Stirling Council.
- 3. That the Place Plan should be 'owned' by the community rather than one or two local organisations. This means that any action taken should, first and foremost, be in the interests of Callander residents and businesses.

Thank you, again, to everyone who participated in our surveys, focus groups and face to face discussions.

Dental health in dogs and cats

Dental disease is very common in cats and dogs. Surveys show that after the age of three years, about seven out of ten pets have some kind of tooth disorder.

It starts as plaque, a sticky film of saliva, food particles and bacteria that covers the teeth and causes discolouration, smell and inflamed gums (gingivitis) and in some patients results in pain, ulceration and bleeding. The disease can be reversed or controlled at this stage.

If left unattended the plaque can build up on their teeth and harden to form a brown substance called tartar, starting at the base of the tooth along the gum line, in the grooves and then it can gradually build up until it covers the whole of its surface and extends under the gum line to cause periodontal disease.

Periodontal disease is a more severe form of dental disease that causes irreversible changes: gum recession and loss of bone; exposure of the roots of the teeth progressing onto loose teeth, tooth loss and or tooth root

abscess and infection of the jawbone. There is also the concern regarding bacteria getting into the blood vessels in the mouth and spreading via the bloodstream round the body, causing damage elsewhere in the body.

So, there are a wide range of signs to look out for depending on what is happening in your pet's mouth, from smell to the pain resulting from advanced dental disease which may cause difficulties in eating. If your pet dribbles excessively or sometimes the saliva is flecked with blood, has blood on their chew toys or shows signs of pain or discomfort such as head shaking and pawing at its mouth, reluctance to eat biscuits or to chew things, then it may have problems with its teeth.

How can you help your pet when comes to dental disease?

- 1. Check your pet's teeth and mouth regularly for signs of dental disease
- 2. Visit your vet if you are worried about your pet's teeth/mouth and at least once a year for a dental check (this can be part of their vaccination health check).
- 3. Act on early signs of dental disease. It may seem over the top to go ahead with a dental procedure under general anaesthetic if your pet does not seem affected by teeth problems but remember that early-stage disease is completely reversible and as disease advances, it becomes harder and harder to treat.
- 4. Proactive dental care at home. This includes regularly checking your pet's teeth and mouth and taking steps to keep their teeth clean. Brushing your pet's teeth daily with a pet specific toothpaste is the single best way to keep them free of dental disease but there are also products to soften plaque, washes to neutralise bacteria, dental diets, dental chews and dental toys to help slow up the progression of disease if brushing is not possible.

Speak to the nurses here at Riverside Veterinary Clinic in Callander; they can advise you on all the ways you can keep your pet's mouth healthy.

Deepbluedirt

oor Chris is still recovering from a broken neck from a crash on his bike on the tracks built up the Stank, below Ben Ledi in June last summer.

So our sailing season hasn't started yet, we've been recuperating back in Almerimar; a small town which has a comfortable yet cheap marina tucked away on the Andalusian coast. We are hunkered down on a pontoon shared with a mixture of cruisers, old school salty spanish sailors and the sporadic group of fleeting race boats. It's really interesting all the people you meet, I

love the variety involved in this lifestyle.

We have been balancing recovery with boat building jobs for fellow sailors as they drop in and out... keeping our bank balance ticking over. Luckily Chris's boat building history has allowed him to do all sorts here from rigging checks/upgrades, engine diagnosis and multiple stainless steel jobs. It turns out, as soon as fellow sailors hear you have a TIG welder onboard they are all dropping by. I've painted the bottom of the hull of the odd boat and done a

> few cleaning jobs to help along the way too, alongside being the glamorous assistant for Chris. Last year Chris managed to secure the position of a roaming installer for Hydrovane; a Canadian company that produces self steering systems for yachts. A Hydrovane is a super impressive yet simple mechanical self steering system that mounts to the transom of the boat (the back) and steers using an auxiliary rudder steered via

a big (red) vane. A design I'm sure we nearly aced all those years ago with my Dad on a DIY raft race down the River Teith. So we had a lot of fitting jobs on an array of boats where I was always the one to crawl into the small places to to tighten the bolts up, where I'd end up a sweaty mess!

We installed our carbon fibre bowsprit onto the deck of Berzerk which we truly can't wait to try out once we set sail. It basically allows us to fly a few extra light wind sails when there is very little wind, which is quite common in the Med, so we are armed and ready as we certainly can't afford the diesel prices now.

And saving the best till last...We helped sail a 50ft Oyster Yacht on a three day trip to Cartagena, including a beautiful anchorage at Cabo De Gata. Sailing this boat was a real experience; the size difference creates for a much more stable ride in the swell and we certainly enjoyed the space it offered down below, especially for Chris's neck! So naturally our minds are whirring to work out how we achieve this size of boat for ourselves one day~ we hope to always watch the sunset on the ocean, a feeling you can't describe.


Steamship Sir Walter Scott.

It's taken a while but eventually the Steamship Trust has just about raised all the money required to complete the repairs and upgrades to the Steamship Sir Walter Scott. This was helped enormously by the announcement of a £130,000 grant award from the Heritage Lottery Fund in June this year. This award, along with the substantial sum raised from the ongoing public appeal and a series of smaller grant awards,



will enable work to begin in earnest to replace decking and the two cracked boilers on the historic Steamship.

Whilst we are still around £35,000 short of the £500,000 we will finally need, the grant has allowed us to move ahead and order the boilers and hope for delivery in August.




The new boilers are being supplied by Byworth Boilers in Yorkshire and have been designed to ensure the steamship can greatly reduce its carbon footprint with the use of a revolutionary hydrogen and vegetable oil fuel. Hydrotreated vegetable oil, (HVO), is a paraffinic diesel fuel that can be used as a direct replacement for both red and white diesel and is synthesised from 100% renewable raw materials such as vegetable oils, animal oils and fats, which reduces net CO2 greenhouse gas emissions by as much as 90%. Best of all HVO isn't affected by the congealing that previous vegetable based fuels

suffered from in cooler temperatures.

A band of enthusiastic volunteers from the Steamboat Association of Great Britain, have already been busy, skilfully stripping out old decking and rubbing down the wheelhouse, handrails, and seats as part of the preparatory work for the fuller £500,000 restoration programme which is anticipated to take three months and will hopefully be completed in September 2022



By the time of publication we will have moved towards a more blended way of working, with an increase in the number of face to face GP appointments. We will still be retaining telephone consultations along with the face to face slots. Our trained admin team will continue to signpost patients to the most appropriate care – this is not always the GP and we request that patients embrace this as we have a variety of staff available to deal with requests including Advanced Nurse Practitioners, Pharmacists, Mental Health Nurses and Advanced Physiotherapy Practitioners. These staff can all prescribe and work alongside the GPs in the practice.

In July we welcomed Dr Allana Cappiello to the Practice as a Partner. Dr Cappiello will be working 4 days per week in practice and brings lots of experience and knowledge from her previous roles.

The past two years have been very difficult for us all - patients, partners and staff. During the pandemic we have been very short staffed but have managed to continue to provide a GP service in the area. We are looking forward to a degree of "normality" returning. The Minor Injuries Unit at Stirling Health and Care Village provides treatment for a wide range of minor cuts, burns and suspected broken bones and is open 9am – 9pm, 7 days a week (including public holidays).

Orange Pudding Cake Makes 9 squares

Ingredients

- 100g margarine
- 75g caster sugar
- 1 egg, lightly beaten
- Finely grated rind and juice of half a large orange
- 1 tsp vanilla essence
- 75g self-raising flour
- 1tsp baking powder
- 2tbsp ground almonds
- Quartered orange slices to decorate

Method

Preheat oven to 180 C/ 160 Fan/Gas No 4. Line a 18cm square cake tin with non-stick baking paper. Beat together the margarine and sugar in a bowl until smooth. Beat in the egg until combined. Mix in the orange rind, orange juice and vanilla essence. Sift in the flour and baking powder, mix gently. Mix in the ground almonds. Spoon the mixture into the tin and spread level.

Back in oven for 30 mins or until the surface springs back when lightly pressed.

Cut into squares and serve straightaway, or turn out onto a wire rack to cool completely before cutting. Decorate with the quartered orange slices.

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

The aim of this was two falls to all. dementia to gather together. The aim of this was twofold: to allow those with the condition to get out, meet others, chat and do activities and also to give their carers, friends and family, a time to visit the town, shop and have no responsibilty for a while. Hence the name 'Town Break'.

In Callander, the group meets on a Thursday morning from 10.30am to 12.30am in St Andrews Church Hall. It is a really happy group, run by Lesley Milne, who is a coordinator for the Dementia Service. Some folks have their carer with them and some are happy to spend the couple of hours just with their friends at the group. Lesley provides an activity or theme each week, including fun things like a reminiscence game, pebble painting, a singalong, a strawberry tea etc. It is all aimed at stimulating cognitive wheels and helping folks to flourish in their own personal way and within their own capacity. This year there is to be a trip for a cruise on Loch Katrine!

In conversation, Lesley said to me 'It's not like coming to work, it's like coming to a party every day'!!

All the local groups met together the other week for a huge Jubilee party and in September there will be a 30th Birthday Extravaganza. There's no end to the fun!

The scheme is partly funded by Stirling Council, with an office in Springkerse, Stirling, but fundraising remains an important part of maintaining the service, along with willing volunteers to help out at each group. In the light of much more awareness of the progress and effect of dementia in people's lives and those of their loved ones, this service is undeniably crucial.

Ripple Retreat - Happy Fifth Birthday!



by Tony Kettle to merge into and reflect the rippling water of Loch Venachar was opened and ready to receive its first guests.

Very special guests – children and young people who are undergoing or recovering from treatment for cancer and their immediate family. Since then, over 120 families have benefited from the gift of a holiday, to allow them to relax together, as so often, there are long periods of separation during hospital treatment, when a child is away from siblings and parents.

Lynne McNicoll is the wonderful lady who has tirelessly driven this project from the beginning. She is a fundraiser 'extraordinaire 'and has been instrumental in finding the £3.5 million needed to establish the Ripple Retreat, and now continues with her team to fundraise, to maintain the £100,00 annual running costs. The charity 'It's Good to Give' was initially started to supply helpful and practical packs to families having long stays in hospital with young cancer patients. One of the greatest gifts was right at the beginning, when the Ferguson family donated part of their land to build on.

Ripple Retreat just embraces you in an atmosphere of safety and peace. So many special little touches have been added... from comfy seating and an all singing, all dancing TV, to musical instruments and books, to many lovely pieces of art work on the walls, each one lovingly donated with its own story, including two poems written by a young cancer patient, Finn, and his sister, Meg. There is a wonderful bespoke kitchen, specially designed by Kitchens International, with wheelchair accessible worktops and ovens and everything with a view on all sides. A very special feature is a large enclosed decking area where many an exhausted carer has no doubt basked in the sun in the sure knowledge that children can play safely and not wander off.

The three bedrooms all have floor to ceiling views and are simply, but beautifully decorated. Many of the small details have been suggested by some of the young trustees appointed to the team.

Lynne speaks so warmly of some of these young ambassadors.

Outside, many willing hands have created and continue to maintain the expansive grounds. It is a perfect wonderland, running down to the water's edge and leading to a jetty stretching over the loch. The outdoor play equipment is such a blessing because so often cancer patients are unable to join their siblings at the playpark, and here they can all be together with minimum risk to health. There are also high quality paths and flower beds scattered with decorative sculptures which have highly personalised designs connected to some of the guests.



The visitors book (wonderfully shaped as a letter R) contains the words that come from the hearts of those who have stayed. As an example:

'It was so good to remember what normal life can be..'

'The most magical, wonderful, beautiful, tranquil, peaceful, luxurious, amazing place, with stunning views, facilities that are out of this world and somewhere very, very special. When the waves of life seem to be crashing in with great strength, this ripple of love is real soul food. Forever grateful...'

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

The Chris Corcoran Trio are a dynamic instrumental Blues outfit.

Delta Fuse - an energetic, cut-throat Blues Rock trio from Northern Ireland, Delta Fuse style has been described as 'brothel blues', with all the dirt and grime you would expect from old-school R&B, but their influences extend further, through 50s Chicago and 60s psychedelic blues to the smoother, soulful sounds of BB King. The band remain immersed, however, in the music of John Lee Hooker.

Mark Pontin Group - since releasing his debut album in 2013, Mark has firmly established himself in the UK Blues/Rock scene as an artist to take notice of. A multiple blues award nominee and stalwart guitar player and vocalist, Mark is one of the best guitar players in South Wales and his band are definitely worth a watch! Expect power trio style jamming with funk, blues and soul elements.

Tommy Bentz Band - Van Morrison meets the Allman Brothers....that's one way to describe the sound of the Tommy Bentz Band. Tommy hales from Wisconsin in the US and has been a regular and firm favourite at the festival over the last few years. The band's latest album release showcases the mix of blues, rock, folk and jazz with soulful vocals and a message of positivity and unity.

The Revolutionaires - established within the 'hotbed' of the North East of England music scene and led by exuberant front man Ed Stephenson on guitar and vocals, The Revolutionaires power out jumpin' hot rhythm & blues in their own indomitable hard hitting style. 

Book club review



This issue's book review title is *The Pavilion in the Clouds* by prolific author Alexander McCall Smith (Polygon: 2022). Most people will have heard of McCall Smith who is a popular writer, particularly renowned for his *No.1 Ladies' Detective Agency* series and *44 Scotland Street* novels. I did go through a phase of reading many of his books (and there are more than 50 to choose from), however that was a couple of decades ago, so I was keen to get reacquainted.

The Pavilion in the Clouds is a standalone novel. The story takes place in 1938 on a tea plantation called Pitlochry up in the green hills of Ceylon. Henry Ferguson is the Scottish owner of Pitlochry, preoccupied with the day-to-day operations of running a fragile trade in a diminishing British Empire. Meanwhile, his wife Virginia spends the days playing tennis and discussing books with other expatriate wives, whilst daughter Bella is tutored by governess, Miss White. Bella is a precocious eight-year-old. She has few friends and time on her hands. This, coupled with an overactive imagination, causes Bella to begin to view her governess with suspicion. What are her intentions? Why does she laugh with her father? Will she upset the family's idyll? The young girl decides to act, not realising the far-reaching consequences of her actions.

Fans of McCall Smith will not be disappointed, as The Pavilion in the Clouds has all his typical trademarks. McCall Smith has first-hand knowledge of the Scottish expatriate experience (he was born in Zimbabwe and educated both there and in Scotland). Whilst not knowing the extent of factual accuracy of the book, the Scots did have an important presence in the tea plantations of Ceylon whilst it was under British rule up to 1948 (in 1972 Ceylon changed its name to Sri Lanka) and this was interesting to read in this fictional context.

McCall Smith has an ability to create multi-faceted characters whose thoughts and traits, both positive and negative, he carefully unpicks and lays bare. His writing style is so unique and also recognisable. Reading this latest book was like curling up with a warm pussy cat – comforting, clever, but unpredictable.

Callander Woodland Group

ver the last 2 months the Callander Woodland **Group Volunteers have** continued to clear path edges in Coilhallan Wood. Walking the arboretum loop is now a pleasant experience rather than a prickly encounter with overhanging gorse. In the last 3 sessions, vegetation has been removed from the sides of the main spine path, starting at the Invertrossachs car park. Tree seedlings by the path and in the ditches have been taken out and invasive species have also been removed. The next few more sessions will include the path towards Ben Gullipen and down to the A81 entrance.

We have removed many bags of invasive pirri-pirri burr but there is an alarming amount still to be tackled. This New Zealand invader spreads rapidly, crowding out native plants. It is a low growing, creeping plant ~4" high but its

fruiting flowers are sticky burrs which stick to clothing and animals. If you notice your dog has burrs in its coat, please do not just pick off and drop them in the wood but, if possible, remove and take home but DO NOT put in your own compost heap, use your brown bin, its contents will be composted at a high

enough temperature to kill it . Even better would be if you were willing to carry a bag and remove it from along the sides of the paths or in ditches whenever out for a walk.

More volunteers to join the very friendly group for practical sessions are always welcome but we urgently need more people to help feed community views into the next Forestry & Land Scotland Land Management plan for Callander woodlands. This is an excellent opportunity to feed into the plan from the

beginning: no use complaining after the event!

Update on Larch Disease

In the July Callander Woodland Group meeting, the representative of Forestry and Land Scotland (FLS) gave an update on the local situation with larch disease (Phytopthora ramorum). This disease affects European, Japanese and hybrid larch species commonly used by FLS. Unfortunately, eight suspect cases have been seen in the woods from Bochastle to Corriechrombie at the head of Stank Glen. These were identified by helicopter surveys and confirmed by walking the area. Sampling is underway to confirm the cause but is is fairly certain it is phytophthora and compulsory felling is expected to start in early August. The disease appears to be spreading northwards. This outbreak possibly came from one in Leny Woods four or five years ago and it has taken until

now for the impact to become visible. The area will be replanted but not including larch or ash.

Greener Callander says Thank You

le hope you are enjoying the colourful summer flowers around Callander, flourishing despite the challenging weather. Around the centre of town Greener Callander volunteers have planted forty-three hanging basket, beds & barrels outside St Kessog's, two 3-tier planters near the War Memorial, twelve baskets on the railings beside the two pedestrian crossings, the bed and train outside the Station Road toilets and four of the Council's large wooden planters in the car park. Tubs in the smaller War Memorial Garden at Esher Crescent are also being maintained by one of our members.

As always we have relied upon help from many others in the community to achieve this: thanks to Tricia and the 'boys' from CYP for doing the daily watering of our embryo plants and baskets in their polytunnel, Janet Greenwood and Dick Revie for fostering plants and to John MacIsaac for bringing on 30 planted baskets in his greenhouse. Once again installation of the baskets and watering throughout summer is being sub-contracted to Liam Burnett of Empardio.

Further thanks go to those who helped out on the plant and bric-a-brac stalls on 28 May, those who donated and those who bought. The takings of £1,000. will ensure maintenance and planting for the next twelve months. Also special thanks to several individuals who have made very generous cash and 'in kind' donations.



We will be back in the Square in May 2023 when we will again be sharing it with the Callander Horticultural Society.

In addition to regular maintenance of the beds in the Friendship Community Garden in South Church Street we are looking at how we can restore the garden to nearer its 2013 glory. Unfortunately, there are few affordable options for the worn gravel surface and it is proving difficult to find subcontractors when landscapers and builders are so busy. We have therefore decided to replace the most worn features, starting with the rotted bog garden. In an admirable show of strength, Keith Corrieri and Clare Luti rapidly removed the rotten logs and the willow tree then removed them from



the site – a priceless help to start the rebuild. With further invaluable help from Charlie Donald and Alan Davidson we overcame the mental challenges of fitting together the Woodblocx kit (like a giant Lego-cum-Jenga) and in a long, hot day managed to rebuild a very smart octagonal raised bed which will be replanted with mainly native bog plants.

This couldn't have happened without the grant from Callander Community Hydro Fund which is much appreciated.



Finally, a thank you to Stirling Council which has again planted up the bed and baskets at Lagrannoch plus baskets at the end of Tulipan Crescent.

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
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
