I'm pleased that two of our elected representatives, Evelyn Tweed MSP and Cllr Martin Earl, are looking at how NHS dentist provision can be restored in Callander. ## Callander Community Council (CCC): December update

#### **CCC Meetings**

The meeting in October focused on three items of ongoing community concern. The discussions have identified details for follow up, which are being addressed in the November and December meetings.

- Public safety. The presentation gave an overview from the Police Scotland perspective. This provided an opportunity to ask questions and make suggestions. The general feeling was that it was useful, and should be repeated every few months, subject to police time constraints.
- Flooding. Written answers to the questions submitted to the SC Flooding Officer had been received. One of the questioners discussed the updated timescale, to be included in the November meeting with the Floods Officer present.
- Bracklinn Falls Bridge. Murray McKellar, LLTNP Project Manager, gave an online slide presentation which then led to discussion and requests for further ideas and comments. Again, these are being followed up at the November and December meetings.

We welcome comments and ideas - and your participation in December (see below).

#### St Kessog's Update

■here was no update in the last issue of the BLV, as despite trying to find out more several times, there was no new information. This month Stirling Council has sent the following update.

"The St Kessog's Community Working Group are continuing work on the design and costs for the re-development of St Kessog's. There has been a significant increase in the projected costs for the project, mainly because of the external economic conditions and the completion of the External Fabric Condition Survey - which has identified additional works required. As a result, we are working with all partners to look at additional funding and full options appraisal - which will be presented in due course. Steve MacDonald, Stirling Council"

When we get any definite information, we will share it. I can only apologise because I thought we were actually making progress and led you to believe that the re-development of our much-loved St Kessog's (owned by Stirling Council) would start next year. Clearly this is now in doubt.

#### **Local Place Plan**

y the time you read this, our Place Plan will have been delivered to the Park. If all goes well a full version will be available Bto read online or download at: https://callandersfuture.uk/ourplaceplan

In the past, Community Action Plans were published in print; but escalating costs mean that we must change the way we make information available. Thanks to funding from the Braes of Doune Community Fund we will still produce a small number of printed copies but these will be available only to those without online access from the library, and on a first come, first served, basis.

Our Place Plan sets out our vision of a connected, active, prosperous, resilient, cohesive community, and suggests how these aims can be achieved. Callander's residents have a strong sense of place and believe that the integrity of our natural and built environment should be protected without compromising the economic benefits of living in a setting of outstanding natural beauty.

There is now a structure in place for change over the next 10 years and a delivery plan highlighting our community priorities. As a note of caution, I should add that driving change will need a dedicated Development Officer. However, at the time of writing the funding needed for this post has not been secured or offered.

I have fulfilled my role as the Local Place Plan co-ordinator and will have stepped down by the time you read this. I'd like to thank everyone who took the time to participate in what must have seemed like endless consultations and focus groups. Your support and enthusiasm have produced the most detailed and far-reaching series of proposals since the Charrette.

#### **National Park**

he National Park office in Callander was an active community facility for many years and it also provided office space for staff. It is currently only used for staff office space and its future is being considered. The current office is not the best facility for the future. This is being reviewed and am pushing hard for a facility which will also serve the needs of the community as well as visitors.

Several strategic reviews are being carried out over the next few months including three which will be important for Callander. The Local Development Plan (LDP) will cover all communities in the National Park and will use previous LDPs as well as community consultations to develop an outline plan for the settlement. The Callander South Master Plan is closely related to the LDP and has been in development since the 2011 Callander Charrette. It is looking at new developments south of the river, what is needed by the community, businesses and visitors, infrastructure and the best locations for all developments.

The National Park will have to "take account" of the Callander Local Place Plan in the preparation of the LDP. Other matters which the National Park is considering include the "Climate" Emergency", "Nature Crisis", visitor management post Covid, sustainable travel and rural economic development.

#### **Community Project Funding**

Are you planning a project or activity that will benefit Callander? You could get funding from the Callander Community Hydro Fund. Anyone can apply - you just have to show how you will make a difference. The next deadline for applications is 31st December for a decision in early February. There is no set minimum or maximum amount and, at present, about £50,000 is available each year. Larger awards may be offered in instalments over a longer period, subject to funds being available. Grants offered in the last year included Callander Jazz & Blues Festival, printing Trossachs Trail leaflets, Callander Enterprise for Christmas tree lights, Greener Callander for refurbishing the community friendship garden in South Church Street, Stirling Citizens Advice Bureau to set up a Callander hub, and Callander Visitor Information Centre. Since December 2015, more than £300,000 has been awarded to a wide range of local groups and projects. The full list is posted on our website (link below).

The funds come from a hydro scheme in Stank Glen near Loch Lubnaig, run and maintained by local volunteers. The company gifts profits to the Development Trust who set up the Community Hydro Fund to distribute funds to community projects.

Think of our pets as inquisitive child-like beings, fascinated with all the new things in their environment and eager to investigate. Like young children, they lack the knowledge of what can do them harm but have the desire, ability and power to break and ingest objects during their investigations.

There is a range of potential hazards around outside and in your home at this time of year and you should be aware that tasty foods, food waste, presents, interesting decorations and new plants can be hard for curious animals to resist.

Please make sure you are informed of what is harmful to them. Please keep them out of reach of your pet when not supervised. Please know how to contact a vet especially over the holiday period; that includes when visiting friends, family and outwith working hours.

It is easy to become preoccupied with family and friends during the happy outdoor time or during the celebrations and we don't always keep track of what our furry friends are up to. If you find that your pet has eaten something they shouldn't have, whether you think it is harmful or not, follow these basic steps:

- 1. Stop your pet from ingesting more.
- 2. Contact your vet for advice immediately and be ready to provide information on what was ingested, when, where and how it occurred, as well as quantity consumed.

#### **Resilience Leaflet for Households in Callander**

By the time you are reading this article, the Climate Change talks at COP27 will have just finished and we will be 12 months on from the devastation caused by Storm Arwen.

Both of these prompt questions around Callander's resilience to the potential adverse weather impacts and storms that lie ahead, if climate action isn't taken now at a global and local scale.

Callander Community Development Trust currently has a small amount of National Lottery Funding from the "Together for Our Planet Programme", to help reinvigorate the Climate Change Action planning in Callander that was first undertaken in 2012. As an initial step in this project, and in time for any bad winter weather, the project has produced a small resilience leaflet for households in Callander. The leaflet provides some useful summary guidance on how to help yourself in bad weather which we hope will help start wider conversations on resilience and climate change planning in Callander.

There is plenty of existing guidance to



help households develop their own resilience plans. These three websites caught our attention: The Scottish Government - <a href="https://ready.scot/">https://ready.scot/</a>, Stirling Council - <a href="https://www.stirling.gov.uk/emergencies-and-emergency-planning/">https://www.stirling.gov.uk/emergencies-and-emergency-planning/</a> and Red Cross UK - <a href="https://www.redcross.org.uk/get-help/">https://www.redcross.org.uk/get-help/</a> prepare-for-emergencies/heatwaves-uk/wildfires

Our leaflet aims to provide a handy summary of all this guidance together with emergency contact information, in a format that can be easily "stuck on the fridge". It also invites people to think how they could volunteer to support a more resilient Callander. We'd be grateful if you could take a few minutes to fill out a couple of questions by scanning the QR code in

this article, which will take you to the online survey. (Alternatively, you can complete the tear-out slip in the leaflet and drop into the library).

The project is being led by Marilyn Moore, Carol McGowan and Chiara Fingland who would love to hear from you if you would like to join the project. There is currently funding for a self-employed project officer to hold conversations with groups

in Callander about Climate Change and develop the website.

#### **Small Bird Migration**

he Scottish Wildlife Trust Callander Local Group, which includes villages from Doune to Crianlarich, held its first live meeting for two and a half years on 13th October, filling St Andrew's Church Hall.

Mark Wilson (BTO) gave a fascinating talk on 'Where Do Our Wee Birds Go?' Breeding Bird Surveys over 1995-2012 show wide variations in the success of birds which

breed in the UK but winter in Africa; turtle doves show a huge decline while blackcaps have increased. Why? Is it due to their migration route, where they overwinter, climate change or a mixture of many factors?

Six species of small passerines which breed in Scotland were studied; wood warbler, willow warbler, whinchat, garden warbler, tree pipit and spotted flycatcher. Caught in mist nets and/or perch traps, they were fitted with a combination of coloured leg rings for identification of individual birds. Micro-trackers, weighing 0.35 - 0.5g

(3-4% of the birds' body weight) were also fitted to many, like a tiny backpack with leg loops. The active component is a light sensor which gives a reading every minute. These allow calculation of latitude from day length and longitude from solar midday. Its accuracy is + 100km, sufficient to track migration routes over the 13 month battery life. However, they cannot be read remotely so birds still need to be caught to retrieve them.

Initial results show that birds which winter in Africa's humid zone are decreasing faster than those which winter in arid zones. They cannot leave Africa until after the rains so they can

feed up. However, climate change is leading to a mismatch between their arrival and the emergence of their food in the UK. Therefore the later spring in Scotland may be a benefit, now 2 weeks behind the south of England and only an extra day's flight.

There may also be a benefit from the harsher winters in Scotland which take their toll on resident birds while milder southern winters allow better survival of resident birds, leading to more competition for food and nest sites and potentially more predators. Who would have thought Scottish weather would be a good thing!

Data interpretation is complex, so is ongoing. Only a small number of trackers have been retrieved to date, so the emphasis next year will be on retrieval.



# Bilingual interpretation panels installed to promote Gaelic heritage of Callander



New signage is in place in Callander to help preserve locally important Gaelic words and place names and to promote the use of Gaelic as an active living language.

The new bilingual panels were commissioned by Callander Landscape, following a funding award of £3000 from Bòrd na Gàidhlig through their Gaelic Language Act Implementation Fund (GLAIF) scheme. They will also provide reference in the Gaelic language for local volunteers, helping them to lead guided walks on place-name trails around Callander. One of the panels is in the Visitor Centre and the second is at Bochastle Car Park

#### Loss of hotels in National Park a cause for concern

This Charity is worried about the dilution of tourism and drift towards dormitory towns and villages

Friends of Loch Lomond and The Trossachs has expressed concern about the growing number of small and medium size hotels being lost to private residential accommodation and other uses, which is accelerating the trend towards creating more dormitory settlements and reducing local employment opportunities.

There are currently three applications before the Park Authority in Callander, St Fillans and Kilmun for change of use of hotels and this follows on from the loss of a raft of hotels in recent years due to the impact of COVID 19, major increases in running costs, staffing difficulties and owner lifestyle changes with conversion to private residential or self-catering holiday accommodation being more profitable and less demanding.

However, we can state that no dentist is required by law to see NHS patients. They have the option to de-register from providing NHS treatment if they so decide. This has led to issues for people across Scotland who have then had to seek out a new dentist. Clearly, this is even more problematic for people living in rural areas like Callander.

If people need to source a new dentist they should go to the NHS Inform website: https://www.nhsinform.scot/

They can search for an NHS dentist by going to the Find a Dentist button and then giving their postcode area.

If anyone is not registered with a dentist and requires treatment they can also contact NHS Dental Services (Forth Valley)

#### **Salted Chocolate Cookies**

Makes 16

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 375g icing sugar (sifted)
- 100g cocoa powder (sifted)
- 1 tbsp cornflour
- 1 large egg plus 2 large egg whites
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 175g dark chocolate chips
- Sea salt flakes

#### **METHOD**

- Preheat oven to 180<sup>o</sup>C, 160<sup>o</sup>C Fan, Gas No 4.
- Line 2 baking tins with baking parchment.
- In a large bowl mix icing sugar, cocoa powder, cornflour and 1tsp salt. In a jug combine egg, egg whites and vanilla. Mix egg mixture into dry mixture and fold in the chocolate chips.
- Space heaped tbsps of dough 5 cm apart on the lined baking trays.
   Sprinkle over a little sea salt.
- Bake for 14-16 mins until puffed up and cracked. Cool on the baking sheets. Remove using a palette knife.
- Store in an airtight container.



The photos of her mural that is in our entryway with Pamela herself are shown. She does watercolour,


mosaics, all kinds of things. Now, she can add 'Muralist' to that list! We feel SO fortunate that she has made our home even more special than it already is.

#### Claish Farm wins top Affordable Housing award

housing development in Stirlingshire that has brought 50 new affordable homes to the local area has won a national award, with the partners behind the plans believing it could be a blueprint for other parts of Scotland.

Built by Lovell for Rural Stirling Housing Association, Claish Farm, just outside Callander, won the Scottish Chartered

Institute for Housing (CIH) award for "Excellence in Development for Affordable Housing" at a ceremony last week. The development consists of 1, 2, 3 and 4 bedroom family and specific need homes with a mixture of bungalows, terraced and semi-detached houses. The now completed development saw its last resident move in to their home in December 2021.

Last year, the development won Silver in the Lovell National Health & Safety Awards and was praised for accessibility and use of paving, as well as its safety procedures during Covid and building good relationships with neighbouring businesses.


#### 2022 Callander Families Conkers Championships

#### **Book club review**

This issue's book review title is *One Day I Shall Astonish The World* by Nina Stibbe (Penguin: 2022)


I wasn't familiar with the author but was intrigued by the title of this book and, as Stibbe has won a few prizes, it seemed promising.

One Day I Shall Astonish The World is a story about friendship told from the first-person perspective of main character Susan about her 30-year friendship with Norma.

Susan and Norma met as young adults whilst both working at a haberdashery shop in the early1990s. Susan is smart and destined for an academic career. Norma is less smart, but devious.

She is from an affluent family who own the shop where the women work. Her background gives her a sense of entitlement and she utilises Susan's brains for her own selfish gains.

When Susan becomes pregnant at a young age and marries Roy, her career hopes are dashed. Meanwhile, Norma continues to move forward and to thrive in the professional world. This competitive relationship comes to a head 30 years later when they both work for the University of Rutland and are vying for the attentions of the Vice Chancellor.



Like all first-person memoirs,
Susan's account of her life and her
relationships is partial. The reader is
given Susan's view of the friendship
with Norma, and Norma doesn't
always come across particularly well.
However, Susan similarly comes across
as high maintenance and often quite
narcissistic. The friendship is multilayered and complex.

Stibbe's style is quite unique – amusing, fast-moving, dense, but highly readable. This was an entertaining book where the author manages to capture the essence of the decades well, with cultural references that were nice to recall. The book also charts technological changes, from an era before mobile phones to the current day.

The book is quite intense with the franticness of Stibbe's writing feeling like an assault on the brain. Maybe this was intentional, as a feature of Susan's manic personality. Or maybe it's Stibbe's style. In honesty, I won't be rushing to read another of her books to find out, but maybe one for a beach holiday.

The next BLV book club review will be *Butterfly* by Yusra Mardini (Bluebird: 2022).




