Stirling Council appears to have dropped its ambitious plans to renovate St Kessog's as a library, a business hub, public toilets and a community hub. Hopefully, the Community Council can ensure that this iconic building is put to good use sometime soon. In a similar vein Stirling Council's flood prevention plans for Callander are up in the air after they have decided to have further multi agency consultations about what would be the best option for the town. With climate change bringing about increasingly extreme weather patterns the Community Council needs to ensure Stirling Council comes up with a practical and affordable solution soon.

On a more positive note, the new bridge over the Bracklinn Falls is now open. See our front cover if you've not had chance to visit it yet. Some people have criticised it for being austere and weather beaten. I think it's just what

All change in April!

ot only will we see a change in the weather in April – hopefully - but the Community Council is stepping down and a new **V** Community Council will be elected. There will therefore be no scheduled Community Council business meeting in April. You can apply to become a community councillor, either online or by sending your application to Stirling Council (SC), with the name of a proposer and seconder for your application. All three individuals must be reside in the local area and be named on the Electoral Register for the area. Nominations will open on April 3rd and close on April 17th 2023.

The general purpose of a community council is to act as a voice for the local community. This involves making known the views and concerns of local people in the area on a wide range of issues of public concern and making representations to the local authority, other public sector bodies and private agencies on such matters.

The present Community Council consists of 11 members -

Susan Holden (Chair), John Watson (Vice Chair), Olga Watkins (Secretary), Marilyn Moore (Treasurer), David Moore (Planning Officer), Ray Watkins, Bev. Field, David King, David Shearer, Moe Guertin and Loucas George.

Callander Community Council (CCC) holds meetings 9 times / year, on the third Monday of the month, avoiding school holidays wherever possible, The meetings are usually held in hybrid format, both in person and online, so that as many people as possible have access to the meetings. CCC is one of the few community councils in the area to hold hybrid meetings – we are still learning, so apologies if the meetings don't always go according to plan! Braes of Doune Wind Farm Community Fund (BoD)

The use of microgrants has now been approved by BoD and Foundation Scotland (FS) and allows individuals or groups from unconstituted organisations to apply for a grant of up to £250 (up to £2000 will be available per year for all applications to this fund). Decisions on whom to award the grants will be taken by CCC, usually within one month of the application being received and will not need to be referred to BoD for financial ratification. Any decisions about larger grants will still need to be ratified by BoD and FS within a quarterly window. Application forms can be found online via CCC website www. incallander.co.uk/ccc_grants . Applications can be emailed to cccbodfund@gmail.com, posted in the CCC post box at Callander Library or sent to the address given on the application form. This is a welcome development for the community and will enable small projects to go ahead with the necessary funding they need.

NHS Dental Services in Callander

The petition has now closed and has been presented to Forth Valley Health Board. In total, over 1370 households throughout the local area signed the petition, which is requesting new NHS Dental Services for Callander and the surrounding villages. The outlying villages dominated in the latter weeks, with signatures from all areas in the Trossachs including Aberfoyle, Thornhill, Doune and Strathyre. Well done to all who contributed to this worthwhile cause, which continues to put pressure on the Health Board to find a solution for rural NHS dental services in the area. The Health Board has recently stated that it is in talks with a group of dentists who are keen to take things forward – the negotiations are at an early stage at the moment, but signs are encouraging.

Renovations at Callander Youth Project

(CYP)

I e wanted to provide an update on the recent renovation work taking place at CYP. The primary aim of this project was to complete necessary upgrades to our toilets, especially to our accessible facility.



Thanks to this work, we now have a larger and betterdesigned accessible toilet, as well as having individual cubicles for the rest of our toilets (as a youth project, this is also far more suitable for our purposes). These improvements were only possible thanks to the generous support of the Scottish Government's Rural and Islands Communities Ideas into Action Fund and the Callander Community Hydro Fund. We're also extremely grateful to the Braes of Doune Community Fund for helping us to meet the cost of unexpected repairs that were only discovered during the final planning stages of the project.

As the work necessitated the closure of our function business for at least a couple of months, we also took the opportunity to lay a new floor in the function hall itself. The progress on our adjacent youth space is also nearing completion, so we're looking forward to having all of these areas open to the public in the near future (and hopefully prior to the publication of this article). As a final note, we'd like to thank the High School for welcoming our after-school youth clubs, allowing these to keep running during the previous school term.

Callander Community Development Trust and CAB Outreach

St Kessog's Update

This project began in 2019, with the aim of redeveloping St Kessog's into a building for the relocated library, a business hub, public toilets and a community hub. Basing all this at St Kessog's meant that the old building had a future, rather than it standing empty and deteriorating.

In the December/January BLV issue, I shared with you a note from Stirling Council about the escalating costs and identification of additional external repairs.

We now have a bit more detail: costs to repair, refit and equip the building are now estimated at £5.1m, a rise of £2.5m from previous estimates. At the same time, the Economic Development team at Stirling Council has been unsuccessful in bidding for any additional funding to add to the £790,000 allocated to this project to build a business hub through the City Region Deal. That leaves a funding gap of £4.3M.

The working party has been told that Stirling Council is looking at other options- the most likely contender is refitting the offices above the library for use as a business hub and repairing the library building.

Whilst this gives us a new business hub, there will be no additional public toilets on Main St, no Community Hub and no plans for St Kessog's, still owned by Stirling Council and with a pending £1M repair bill.

Stirling Council has said it will discuss the plan with the Community Council and form a new working party. I hope CCC will fight for a future for St Kessog's and I'm really sorry that our work has come to nothing.

Meadows Money Madness

sat through a Teams meeting last Wednesday (1st March), organised by Stirling Council to announce its future plans for flood alleviation in the Meadows. The Council will now examine a long list of flood control options, alongside it's own preferred option of a car park wall.

A car park wall has never been a popular decision. The Callander community has, time and again, raised many objections, mainly that a wall will provide only a pathetic flood protection to a handful of buildings in the Meadows whilst ignoring the plight of other at-risk properties around and downstream of the Meadows. Even now, all Callander's pleas continually fall on deaf ears.

Of course a review, at last, of alternative options is laudable, but it would have been wiser for the Council to have embraced and examined (rather than dismiss) a range of measures right at the start, certainly before deciding unilaterally to press ahead and spend, so far, £800k on designing a wall. Times are hard. The cost of living is stressful for most of us, Council Tax will increase, Council services will be cut. And yet, Stirling Council has shamelessly now squandered £800k, and counting, on their remorseless obsession with a wall that they have been told repeatedly by the Callander community will be inadequate and unacceptable. Why, why do they persist, and why are they not (yet) being held to account for this debacle?

So now, Stirling Council proposes, in effect, to start again and spend yet more money on consulting with statutory bodies, multi-criteria analysis, and modelling of the long list of options, to arrive at, we hope, something that will give decent protection to all properties around the Meadows and that will be acceptable to Callander. For this, though, the Council will have to engage fully and openly with the community and heed its views and objectives. What are the chances of this, I wonder?

Trossachs Osprey Hide

The fish farm along Invertrossachs Road was built over 30 years ago, at the time to supply trout to the supermarkets.

Originally we had overhead strings to deter birds but when these no longer worked, we netted our ponds to protect the fish from herons, ospreys and other fish eating birds. We have also had to fence the farm to try and prevent otters, mink, pine martens and badgers getting in!

This year we netted the last ponds that we use, leaving two large unnetted ponds at the bottom of the farm.

Over the years we have put a few fish

into these ponds and watched ospreys and otters in particular, taking them out again! We also see Kingfishers, various ducks and other wildlife here. During the time that ospreys are in Scotland (Apr-Sep) we are normally visited at least 6 times a day by these iconic birds.

We have now built a low level hide overlooking the ponds which will allow close up encounters with wildlife and provide a bit of income for the farm.

Royal Zoological Society of Scotland Talks to Callander SWT

The Royal Zoological Society of Scotland, (RZSS), is a wildlife conservation charity best known for its two visitor sites of Edinburgh Zoo and the Highland Wildlife Park (HWP) near Aviemore. The speaker at our February Callander SWT talk was HWP's Jess Wise who very enthusiastically explained that the role of RZSS is more than just housing and breeding iconic species from around the world.

RZSS's bold vision is 'a world where nature is protected, valued and loved' with a pledge to reverse the decline of at least 50 species by 2030 and to enable more than 100 communities to better protect nature. However, habitat and species conservation is rarely just a local issue eg our summer migrants suffer if they cannot feed and drink en route, so the support of the worldwide community is needed.

A major aspect of RZSS's role is education and making nature more accessible because people protect and value what they love and understand. The income from zoo visitors, members and animal

adopters is an important funding source. Whilst many captive animals are in breeding programmes across an international network of zoos, only about 25% are released into the wild. However, whilst iconic species such as polar bears, Amur tigers and giant

pandas attract paying visitors, they also reinforce the need to protect animals and their environment which reads across to more local issues.

Edinburgh Zoo has the UK's only zoo-based conservation genetics lab and is involved in 23 projects, mainly providing the scientific lead and training other institutions. A genetics lab has been established in Cambodia

with Flora & Fauna International training staff in the techniques eg to determine whether ivory comes from Asian or African elephants and identifying hybrids between the 'relaxed' Siamese crocodile and the vicious salt water crocodile. In Uganda, the Budongo Conservation Field Station is

combining cutting-edge research with practical action to study and protect a community of nearly 700 wild chimpanzees and their habitat. In the Brazilian Pantanal wetlands, RZSS has been supporting the Wild Animal Conservation Institute (ICAS) for 10 years to safeguard

endangered armadillos and giant anteaters and their threatened habitat. Decisions on breeding and release programmes are left to individual countries. Lots more information is on https://www.rzss.org.uk/conservation/.

Closer to home, the RZSS genetics





While insects may not be everyone's favourite, they have a vital role in the food chain and in habitat development. Pine weevil larvae feed

on rotting wood in the centre of old trees but there is now not so much wood left on the ground after felling and the weevils have not been seen in the wild for a decade. The unique breeding programme has been very successful and 3000 larvae were released in Autumn 2021 and again in

Spring 2022 into a Cairngorms site.

More widely recognised and loved is the Scottish Wildcat.

Although there is a healthy population

population has reduced to the point of near-extinction. Persecution and habitat loss have played their part but hybridisation with feral cats has been a major factor. RZSS ran a genetics programme to identify the 'purest' animals captured from the wild which have been used in a very successful breeding programme. From mid-summer '23 it is planned to release the 22 kittens born in 2022 into areas of the Cairngorms National Park where feral cats have been trapped,

Particularly aimed at educating children, the Highland Wildlife Park is building a new Scotland's Discovery Centre, incorporating a learning hub and conservation centre, opening by the end of 2023. Scotland's Amphibians - why they need our help

The Callander SWT talk in January was given by Rosie Walker of Froglife and yet again was a tale of reducing numbers.

Amphibians in Scotland include frogs, toads and newts; simply described as cold-blooded, no scales and living partly in water and partly on land. They start life as eggs/spawn in water (clumps for frogs, less obvious strings for toads), develop into tadpoles and then grow four legs to turn into tiny froglets, toadlets or newtlets.


Newts keep their tales while frogs and toads lose theirs. They then live mainly on land, in damp and secluded places but return to water to hunt and breed.

Common frogs have a smooth brown/ green/red skin with variable markings and a distinguishing dark patch behind the eye. They move by hopping. Common toads have a warty green/brown skin, no black patch, distinguishing golden eyes, shorter back legs and walk rather than hop.

If you put them in a bucket to transport to safety, toads sit still and squeak while frogs quietly try to climb out! The natterjack toad is rare and found only in 2 sites on the Solway Firth and distinguished by the yellow stripe down its back.

The palmate newt is the most common in Scotland, recognised by its yellow underside, pink chin, no spots and the male has webbed back feet. The smooth newt is more common in England, has a pigmented chin and a small ridge on its back. The Great Crested Newt male has a big crest along its back and tail with a red, spotted underside: as a protected species they can only be handled under license. I

On our local Toad Patrol we find frogs,



toads and a small number of newts (not easy in the dark).

Reptiles are scaled animals that live on land, starting life as eggs or live young. They are secretive and fast moving, preferring quiet and secluded areas when not basking in the sun. In Scotland we have common lizards, slow worms and adders.

The common lizard is small, brown with stripes and spots on its back and can often be seen basking on the boardwalks at Flander's Moss. If predated it can lose its tail which wiggles around to distract its predator but will regrow. The slow worm is actually a legless lizard, can grow up to 50cm long, has a glossy, golden brown skin and its head merges into its body.

Scotland's only snake, the adder, can grow to 150cm. It is readily identified by the dark zig-zag pattern on its back with a V or X on its head. It is venomous but for most people a bite will be similar to a bee-sting. The leatherback turtle is included; though not native to our shores it does visit west coast waters to eat jellyfish – often mistakenly ingesting plastic bags.

Populations of all amphibian and reptile species are in general decline. Toads have declined by 60% over the last 30 years and slow worms, natterjack toads and great crested newts are on the threatened list. Threats are the same for many species:

diseases, predators and habitat degradation/ fragmentation, much of which is due to humans eg intensive farming practices and land development leading to water pollution, filled-in ponds and new roads which cut across habitat and isolate populations. Rising temperatures due to climate change also affect habitat and breeding success.

How can we help? One third of ponds in the UK have been lost over the last 50 years and 80% of the rest are poor/very poor. Gardens can include breeding ponds, shelter, foraging and over-wintering habitats such as log piles. No spawn, tadpoles or adults should be transferred between sites as it can spread viral and bacterial diseases.

Ranavirus mainly affects frogs, leaving them emaciated and lethargic with red, sore skin. Chytridiomycosis is a fungal disease which mainly affects toads, damaging skin tissue which leads to reduced water uptake and respiration.

When the railway tunnel under the road at the end of Tulipan Crescent was blocked, animals migrating from the Crags to the Meadows were forced to cross the road. Locals tell of the smell of dozens of dead animals along a stretch between Leny Feus and Station Road. Angela and Robin Harvey took on the task of helping them across the road for many years before formally registering with Froglife in 2012; numbers were already







reducing.

Since 2018 when the Callander SWT group took over the patrol, that decline has continued – see the graph of annual numbers of rescued frogs and toads on page 10.

The discussion on potential causes included the effect of changing sodium to LED street lights in 2017/18 and FLS felling in the Crags in 2014/15 but no direct correlation is obvious. Climate change is leading to wetter winters and the flooded river can wash predatory fish into ponds or sweep away adults/spawn/tadpoles which would otherwise return to breed in their birth pond. Animals move after dusk when the temperature is above 6C and historically frogs appeared from mid-February with toads 7-10 days later. However, recent winters have included prolonged cold spells; in 2022 most of February was 0 to 8C which may have led to many animals delaying breeding or development. It is likely a combination of factors has led to a depressing decline in local numbers over the last 11 years as shown in the graph.

To end on a positive note, there are very few road kills. Every spring there is frogspawn in Coilhallan Wood and recent observations of more frogs remaining in the Crags woods. Maybe we should be creating more permanent ponds rather than patrolling?

Our group is working with Forestry Land Scotland (FLS) to ensure your views are represented in the 10 year Land Management Plan which is up for renewal this year. It will cover Coilhallan, Upper Crags and Easter and Wester Torrie woodlands.

There will be a public meeting/ drop-in session once a draft plan is ready - another opportunity to get your views across.

However, we cannot ignore the rapid spread of larch disease. It is highly likely that the disease will reach our

woods in the next couple of years (it's already in many surrounding areas) and then FLS will have a statutory obligation to fell the larch and this will have to take precedence over all other work.

Our group also works practically in the woods. We have a volunteer team who meet up once or twice a month and clear encroaching vegetation from paths and improve drainage. Hopefully, if you walk through Coilhallan, you'll have noticed our work and if you feel inspired to join us (no previous experience required) please email us at <u>Callanderwoodlandgroup@</u> gmail.com.

New homes for tawny owls

n collaboration with Katy Anderson (FLS Habitats Manager) and her team, three nest boxes for tawny owls have been put up in Coilhallan Wood.

The trunks of the trees are wrapped in pond liner to prevent pine martens climbing up to the box.

FLS has installed one with the intention of being able to show owl chicks to the school children. The other two have been bought by the Scottish Wildlife Trust Callander Group which also installed seven small bird boxes last year with another 4 in 2023.

Callander Heritage Society

Wednesday, 22nd February, saw the Masonic Hall packed as more than 50 people came to hear our first talk after a break of three years. Our advertised speaker had had to cancel but, at three day's notice, chair Sue Mackay put together a very interesting talk on 'Recent Discoveries of Never Seen Before Images of Callander.' The photos were found when the Society was preparing to digitise its archives.

There were many photos of Callander Main Street in the late 19th/ early 20th century and much discussion took place about the exact location of the buildings and what shops are there now.

Old football photos brought reminders that the first recorded football match in Scotland took place in Callander between Rob Roy and Callander Thistle. Also, William McBeith, one of the founders of Glasgow Rangers, was born in Callander, and the club's first match was against Callander Thistle.

Early maps showed that, until the bridge was built in the late 1700s, there were no houses in Bridgend. Once the bridge was built, it became THE place to reside in Callander. The Robertson family owned many of the houses. These were built using money inherited from a relative who had died in the West Indies and for a time the street was known as Jamaica Street. Given the date, there is the possibility of connections to slavery. Further research is needed. Two of the Robertsons, father and son, were ministers of Callander Parish Church. The family grave is in the cemetery at Bridgend.

world's first business computer, was an extraordinary
one. It was designed and manufactured, not by one of the electronic giants,
but by J Lyons & Co, better known for their teashops and corner house restaurants. Lyons felt automation was necessary for their business and after just
two years' development produced LEO (Lyons Electronic Office) in 1951. It was
a trip down memory lane for many of us. We reflected on the technological
progress made in the last 70 years and what the future will hold.

In his fascinating, illustrated talk 'Why Iran?', Peter Ireland described a tour of Iran he had enjoyed in 2009. After a brief visit to the north west of the country, he visited Shiraz, Yazd, Isfahan and other places. Of particular interest was Persepolis, a great palace built in the 5th Century BC and destroyed by Alexander the Great. At all times Peter found the Iranians welcoming and pleased to see visitors to their great country. The domes and tiles of Islamic art were of outstanding beauty. Peter has a wealth of knowledge and we were delighted he could share his experiences with us.

In March, 'The Tragedy of Fritz Haber', is the title of Paul Braterman's lecture, a tangled tale of unintended consequences. Haber was a fervent patriot but his Nobel prize-winning invention brought ruin to his country and he died in exile. Sounds intriguing!

amilies caring for young disabled adults at home are being offered help to improve quality of life.

Faced with three times higher costs to bring up disabled children, the continuing cost-of-living crisis is placing families in financial jeopardy. It is therefore even harder to afford the things that improve their disabled young adult's day-to-day living.

National charity Family Fund is now urging families with a disabled 18-24 year-old living at home to apply for wideranging grants through its **Your Opportunity** scheme.

Set up four years ago, to help young disabled adults lead more fulfilling lives and realise ambitions – the scheme offers grants to support the transition to adulthood and includes technology, training and leisure activities. Your Opportunity has supported over 1,200 families across the UK in the last 12 months and immediate funds are now available to help many more.

Family Fund is the UK's largest grant-making charity for families living on a low income, raising disabled and seriously ill children and young people. Last year, it provided over 170,919 grants and services worth over £37 million to families across the UK.

Cheryl Ward, Family Fund's Chief Executive Officer, said:

'We continue to see families with disabled or seriously ill children and young people increasingly struggling to afford the most basic household essentials such as food and heating as costs rise and many face mounting debts.

Raising a disabled or seriously ill child is three times more expensive than raising other children and this financial cliff-edge at 18 can be very tough for parents and carers of young adults. With the cost of living continuing to increase, we're urging families to apply to us for grants as soon as possible, through our 'Your Opportunity' scheme.'

'Your Opportunity' grants include:

- computers or tablets to support young people with further education, online hobbies and the overall building of independence;
- transport costs for bus fares for appointments, or to support independent travel to clubs or hobbies;
- help with the cost of membership fees, season tickets, computer games, and music systems to promote recreation and days out;
- help with the cost of buying a provisional driving licence, and other learning materials to support driving ambitions;
- white goods to help with independence, or help make mealtimes easier for carers;
- sports, or lightweight, wheelchairs to enable participation in sport activities, or access to activities that would not be possible with a day-to-day wheelchair.

Families are eligible to apply if the young person lives at home with their parent or main carer. If you would like to make an application, go to www.familyfund.org.uk/grants/schemes/your-opportunity

The 'Your Opportunity' scheme was initially set up in 2019 by Family Fund, with funding from Edward Gostling Foundation, Pears Foundation and funding raised by Family Fund.

COOK'S CORNER by Audrey Corrieri

Cinnamon and Brandy buttered Apples with Whipped Vanilla Cream

Serves 4

INGREDIENTS

- 3 medium dessert apples
- 60g salted butter
- 1tsp ground cinnamon
- 100 ml brandy (optional)
- 3tbsp hot water
- 300ml whipping cream
- 3tsp vanilla extract

METHOD

Slice the apples into quarters, leaving the skin on, and remove the core from each apple part. Cut each quarter of apple into 4 slices.

Melt the butter in a nonstick frying pan and when bubbling add the apple slices. Let the apples brown on one side and flip over. Scatter the cinnamon over and pour over the brandy (if using) and the water. Cook for 7-10 minutes until soft.

Meanwhile whip the cream and vanilla extract together until thick in a large bowl. Store in the fridge until needed.

Serve the cooked apples straightaway with dollops of the vanilla cream on the side.

he McLaren Duke of Edinburgh group is delighted to have resumed activities over the past couple of years, following a hiatus for the dreaded pandemic, which made all activities a significant challenge. This session we have a group of 36 youngsters from our Third Year signed up to the Bronze Award, building on the success of 30 Bronze participants who attempted the award last year. Many of those youngsters, now in Fourth Year, are tackling the Silver Award currently, however this is now the limit of our entries following the difficulties thrown up by the global shutdown which affected everyone. The one silver lining to the pandemic cloud was that, based on an initiative started and organised by a group of McLaren pupils, we did manage to get 5 youngsters to complete their Gold expedition last summer. One of those pupils, Rachael, who is now in S6, summarised her Duke of Edinburgh experience saying: "Completing the stages of Bronze and



Silver Award without being able to do expeditions was good, but actually getting out and about with tents and rucksacks made our Gold Award even more special. We all found that the expeditions added some real independence to the other experiences we've shared through the programme. Volunteering as well as developing skills and physical challenges have taught me lots about myself and the wider world, but the expedition really rounds the whole experience off!". We really look forward to seeing the current candidates progress towards completing the highest levels of the programme again over the years ahead.

With limited opportunities for youngsters, our kit had been sitting all but unused for a couple of years and when brought out to use for training purposes last summer, was clearly starting to show its age. Using funds including the generous donation of £500 from the Ben Ledi View, we were able to start the process of upgrading expedition gear with some minor repair purchases. This session, Expedition Manager, Mark Richardson, has taken the plunge and ordered a complete restock of expedition kit, which we look forward to taking delivery of over the next few weeks. When we caught up with Mark, he told us: "The Duke of Edinburgh Award is offered to all students at McLaren High School regardless of background. Thanks to the generosity of our supporters in and around the community of Callander, we have managed to secure lots of new equipment which needed replacing for the Expedition section of the award. I am delighted to say that all participants will benefit from the use of this equipment for the next few years." The best of our existing gear was donated to the appeal organised by the My Dessert House in Stirling following the

recent earthquake in Turkey and Syria. Expedition Season 2023 is now not far away, with training and qualifying trips already in the diary for the Summer Term, so we'd invite anyone reading this article to keep fingers crossed for some good weather and fun travels for the McLaren DofE squad!

As you will understand, maintaining the quality of our expedition kit in particular is an expensive business. As well as rebuilding engagement among our pupils, we are also looking to reinstate our parent fundraising group, and would welcome any offers of assistance with ideas and volunteers to organise and run some events to assist with this important work. Book club review

his issue's book review title is Case Study by Graeme Macrae Burnet (Saraband: 2021). The fourth book by the Kilmarnock-born writer, Case Study takes place in London in 1965. A young woman's mind is in turmoil following the death by suicide of her older sister, Veronica. She discovers that Veronica was attending appointments with a psychotherapist, Collins Braithwaite. Regarded as dangerous, on account of his unconventional ideas about psychiatry, the sister believes Braithwaite to be complicit in her sibling's death.

Case Study moves between five notebooks written by Veronica's sister, as she takes on the persona of Rebecca Smyth to gain access to Braithwaite (and to hopefully reveal how her sister died). The notebooks are written to provide evidence, should anything happen to her in the course of her 'investigation'.

But Macrae Burnet's books are never what they seem. In the preface, GMB details how the notebooks were sent to him by an anonymous reader. GMB outlines that he had an intention to write a biography of Braithwaite's life and to intersect parts of Braithwaite's own controversial tone into this, with client case studies applying the psychotherapist's unconventional methods (one case study of which was Veronica).

For the reader, the line between fact and fiction becomes a little blurred. Who is GMB? Is Braithwaite real? Did an anonymous donor really provide the notebooks? Did this all really happen? I confess to tapping events into Google a few times, such was my belief that the description of incidents in Braithwaite's life did actually take place.

Case Study moves between the five notebooks, to patient

case studies, to GMB's biography of Braithwaite. It's clever. Sometimes a bit too clever for a weary mind when it doesn't want to think too hard (although the critics love this enigmatic narrative turmoil).

But in honesty, the reader doesn't



have to think too hard, as the writing is so brilliant. The notebooks are compelling and balance well next to the droll factuality of GMB's biographic and Braithwaite's eccentric mutterings.

This is only Macrae Burnet's fourth book (the award-winning *His Bloody Project* being his second). He has nonetheless had a huge impact on the literary world. *Case Study* (also on the Booker long-list) was much anticipated. It didn't disappoint.

The next BLV book club review will be *Lessons in Chemistry* by Bonnie Garmus (Doubleday: 2022)


New Bridge at Bracklinn Falls is now Open



'he replacement bridge across the Keltie Water at the Bracklinn Falls is now open to all walkers again. The £209,000 metal bridge replaces the wooden structure which was deemed to be unsafe in 2021. This allows the full circuit around the Falls to be completed again.

The bridge that it replaced was wooden and stylish, but unfortunately not up to the Callander weather. It had not been in place for all that many years when it had to be condemned . The replacement is not stylish, and certainly does not have the looks of the old one, but is made from weathering steel, which will look better after a few months and should last for many more years than the previous one did.

The Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park, which financed the replacement, tells us that over 70,000 people visit the Bracklinn Falls each year, and that the replacement will now allow them to get the full benefits of their visit by opening up the opposite bank and the circular route again.

Killin Mountain Rescue Team Update (MRT)

ast year was one of the busiest on record, and the team attended 44 separate incidents across the area. 2023 is already shaping up to be a busy one, and to date, the team have attended 11 incidents so far!

A break down of the incidents we have attended so far in 2023 are as follows:

- 02/01/23 Male climber fell on Ben Lui, resulting in a serious injury. Rescue 199 also mobilised, and they located the casualty quickly as the team were deploying and uplifted the male and flew directly to hospital.
- 03/01/23 Called out to a male walker who had become lost on Ben Ledi. Team members deployed into a number of groups and searched the hill, and eventually located the male and returned him to his vehicle, uninjured.
- 15/01/23 Two climbers fell on Ben More and luckily were uninjured. They were however cragfast and required a technical rescue to recover them to safety.
- 22/01/23 Male walker became lost on Beinn Chabhair due to poor visibility. Team deployed and when he was located, he was found to be cragfast so a technical rescue was required.
- 28/01/23 Team deployed to Ben More after a report that a male had fallen. Sadly, the male was found dead and the team assisted in recovering him.
- 05/02/23 The team were called to Beinn a' Chroin for a male suffering cramp. Whilst we were deploying, we were updated that the male had met with other walkers and was managing to get off the hill slowly. The team remained at the bottom of the hill until he was off safely.
- 10/02/23 The team received a request for assistance from a farmer in Balquhidder after he located a sheep stuck in a deep gorge and he was unable to get to it. The team carried out a technical rescue to recover the sheep back to safety.
- 16/02/23 Called to Falls of Dochart after a female had fallen on rocks and broken her ankle.
- 16/02/23 Notified by police of a male requiring assistance on Ben Vorlich. One of our team leaders made contact with the male and it was ascertained that it was the Ben Vorlich in Arrochar MRTs area so call passed to them.
- 26/02/23 Called to Beinn nan Eachan after reports of a male who'd fallen after slipping on ice. Rescue 199 was also mobilised and as the team were deploying, they located the male and recovered him before flying him to hospital.
- 27/02/23 Team deployed to Ben Vorlich after a male had become lost in the mist. Quickly located as he provided his location and he was escorted off the hill.

In addition to the callouts, our members have continued with regular training sessions. Each month, our members attend a number of training sessions, which include a monthly first aid night, a full day on the hill, as well as one evening training session.

Our members will also attend national training courses and in February we had a number of team members who attended a Casualty Care course and passed successfully. These members are qualified to provide a higher level of medical care and administer various medications to our casualties when required.

NHS Dentist for Callander?

t appears that a group of local dentists are in serious talks with NHS Forth Valley to open an NHS Dental Practice in Callander. This would fill the void left with us when Infinity Blu Dental Care and Implant Clinic decided to stop treating NHS patients over 18 years of age and to focus on their private patients.



This follows work done by the Community Council and specifically councillor Ray Watkins in this area and the result of a community petition which gathered over two thousand signatures.

The work on this is in its early stages, but is looking positive. The Medical Centre has said that it would be prepared to consider allowing part of the centre to be used to set up an NHS Dental Practice.

Hopefully this will be realised fairly soon, on account of the number of Callander people that cannot afford to pay for private dental treatment and are in the situation of having no means of getting to a dentist who is prepared to accept NHS patients. At the time of Infinity Blu making this decision, no dentists in Stirling and the surrounding areas were taking on new NHS patients.



The Flying Scotsman started out as a 4-6-2 steam locomotive designed by Nigel Gresley and built at Doncaster Works on 24 February 1923, for the London & North Eastern Railway (LNER). It was numbered 1472 and cost £7,944. The train's job was to be a passenger locomotive for the journey from London, Kings Cross to Edinburgh, Waverley.

LNER decided to prepare the train as its exhibit for the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley. It was during this preparation for this exhibit that it was given its nameplate "Flying Scotsman".

The Flying Scotsman's Achievements:

- 1) It appeared at the Wembley Exhibition between 1924 & 1925.
- 2) It was the first engine to regularly work the London to Edinburgh route non-stop.
- 3) It became the first "star vehicle" in the world of "talkie" feature films.
- 4) It attained the first officially authenticated run of 100 mph under steam power in 1934. It was later bettered by the Blue Mallard (a streamlined version of the Flying Scotsman) with a recorded speed of 126 mph in 1937 (a record that still stands today).
- 5) The Flying Scotsman ended its long British Rail service in 1963.
- 6) In 1969 it went on a promotional tour for British Industry in North America, finishing as a static exhibit in San Francisco at the Fisherman's Wharf.

The Flying Scotsman then sat quietly due to bankruptcy proceedings, owing to money due to the American IRS. In 1972 Sir William McAlpine (Director of the construction company Sir Robert McAlpine) was approached to finance a plan to rescue The Flying Scotsman back to the UK. On 23 January 1973 the Flying Scotsman set sail for Liverpool, England via the Panama Canal.

- 7) The Flying Scotsman is the only steam locomotive to have circumnavigated the globe.
- 8) In 1988 The Flying Scotsman travelled via the Cape of Good Hope to Australia, setting another world record, by being the first working steam train to do a non-stop journey of 442 miles.

In 1993 Pete Waterman OBE (English record producer, song writer and keen railway enthusiast) bought 50% of the "Flying Scotsman Enterprises", from Sir William McAlpine.

In 1996 The Flying Scotsman was bought by Dr Tony Marchington (Biotechnology entrepreneur) and underwent the most expensive overhaul yet.

In 2004 it was sold again to work on the "Scarborough Spa Express" and was again overhauled at an even greater expense.

The Flying Scotsman now resides at the National Railway Museum in York, being let out to do excursions and recently a national touring of the United Kingdom.

During The Flying Scotsman's lifetime it had 17 different boilers and 9 different tenders. The name "The Flying Scotsman" conjures the spirit, the excitement and the pushing of limits of both engineering design and speed. This means this well-travelled train, The Flying Scotsman, will always be remembered with fondness and pride.

Scottish leagues:


