This edition rightly acknowledges the enormous amount of good work that has been done by Anne Docherty for Callander over the last 30 years. I met Anne whilst working in the Visitor Information Centre. Anne was an essential part of keeping that facility open, as the town had started to welcome tourists again after the worst of Covid was over. She thoroughly deserves her recent award.

As I write this, much of Southern Europe is experiencing a recordbreaking heatwave with temperatures hitting the mid-forties centigrade. I certainly don't envy the thousands of fellow Brits that are holidaying there at the moment. I'ts 17^oC and sunny intervals in Callander today, fine by me! Southern Europe's difficulties bring home to us the serious problem that climate change is having on us all. We deal with how this can affect Callander on page 5 and page 9 of this edition. However, the hot, dry weeks of June this year culminated in a significant fire on the western edge of the Crags, quite close to houses on Tulipan Crescent and Leny Feus. The fire brigade spent much of the last Sunday in June putting it out. The Callander Resilience Group is looking at ways that such fires can be prevented. Callander's Unsung Community Champion Receives Top Award

At the Annual General Meeting of the Friends of Loch Lomond & The Trossachs earlier this week, Anne Docherty received a special Chairman's Award in recognition of her selfless service to the community of Callander for the past 30 years.

Anne moved to Callander in the 1990s, after retiring from a career in education, but immediately became involved in various local community groups and has never stopped working, until she recently retired from the role of company secretary of Callander Community Development Trust.

In her role with the Development Trust alone, she held the administrative and financial reins over a time of great achievements for the Trust, including the Community Hydro Scheme, the construction of the iconic Bracklinn Bridge, appointing and managing a town coordinator, and developing four Community Action Plans and a Place Plan.

She also led many successful projects such as setting up Creative in Callander and *Summerfest* in which she organised all the music events, bringing Phil Cunningham & Ali Bain, Dougie McLean, Scottish Opera and Scottish Chamber Orchestra and many more to Callander.

More recently she was instrumental in keeping the Visitor Information Centre open after Visit Scotland's departure and supported its day-to-day running by volunteers in many practical ways.

Anne previously was a Director of the National Park Community Partnership, edited the Ben Ledi View paper for more than a decade, organised Callander Chimes Handbell Group and still organises the Craigard Club, a weekly lunch club for senior citizens.

For many years she has also kept the public toilets open in the evening, as the local keyholder for Stirling Council.

James Fraser, the outgoing Chair of the Friends, said:

"Anne is a truly remarkable lady who has done so much on a voluntary basis over a prolonged period for the benefit of Callander residents and visitors and we were delighted to recognise her selfless efforts with a special award. She has enriched the lives of many thousands of people and over the years has strengthened the appeal of Callander as a visitor destination through her boundless efforts on many fronts. I am pleased she will be continuing to use her organisational skills to support the Craigard Club which plays an important role in the well-being of senior citizens in the Callander area."

Callander Community Council Update

The new Callander Community Council (CCC) was inaugurated on 12th June at a meeting run by Stirling Council, when the officers were elected. We then held our first public meeting on 19th June, where we were delighted to see a number of the community present. We now have 13 councillors, five of them being newly nominated.

Your community council members are: Ruth Barrie*, Paul Fraser*, Loucas George, John Kennedy* (Vice-Chair), Fiona Kerr*, David King, Robert Maclean*, David Moore (Secretary), Marilyn Moore (Chair), David Shearer, Olga Watkins, Ray Watkins, John Watson (Treasurer). (*New members)

We had an interesting and informative presentation from Lee Turnock, Group Commander for the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service, about wildfires, recruitment of new on-call firefighters (a national challenge) and fire statistics (reducing over last year). We are hoping that our Callander fire station will soon be up to strength again with some fresh recruits to support the town.

We introduced the new microgrant facilities available from the Braes of Doune Community Fund (formerly Airtricity) primarily for unconstituted groups or individuals who are involved in supporting the community in charitable or social enterprise events and need small amounts of money (up to £250) to help them in the organisation. Details are on the website here: https://incallander.co.uk/ccc_grants.

This facility is wholly managed by CCC and so there is no window for applications. They can be made at any time with a relatively short turnaround time. The normal fund is still available for constituted organisations with the next 3-month window opening for applications from the beginning of August.

We have a lot to do over the next few years. CCC has a joint initiative with Callander Community Development Trust to support the Local Place Plan (LPP) which is being validated by the National Park and Stirling Council. Callander was one of the first towns in the country to finalise its LPP and it contains the important projects that we would like to see fulfilled over the next few years. Callander Flood Group – Update on Flood Protection for Callander

n October 2019 Stirling Council informed the community that the Callander Meadows Car Park Flood Alleviation Scheme would protect only 10 properties (1 residential and 9 businesses) from river flooding, by constructing a flood wall across the car park. Over the past years the community has been campaigning for a more appropriate and inclusive flood protection scheme for all of Callander.

At a recent meeting with Callander Flood Group, Stirling Council stated that their preferred scheme was outdated, would create a barrier in the town and would be unsympathetic to the local environment. There was no indication that Stirling Council, had developed a new option for flood protection for Callander, would do so in the future, or would continue to work through the various other proposals put forward over the previous three years.

Callander Flood Group continues to develop links with Callander Community Council, Callander Resilience Group and Callander Enterprise, to represent the community in ongoing engagement with Stirling Council.

Callander Flood Group is looking for more residents and local businesses to engage with the group, either to have your voice heard or to keep up-to-date with information on flooding in Callander.

Local Place Plan Progress Update

B ack in December 2022, the Callander Local Place Plan was formally submitted to Stirling Council and Loch Lomond & Trossachs National Park for review, being one of the first in Scotland to do so. Conversations with both organisations are ongoing as each works through their validation process.

What is a Local Place Plan?

A Local Place Plan (LPP) is a plan for how a community wants to see its place developed. It is about the town, the land around it and most importantly the community that lives there. For us, this means Callander and its local environment. Further information about the work to date can be found at www.callandersfuture.uk.

What's Next?

It is now time to deliver the solutions identified in the Local Place Plan to ensure Callander is a thriving place to live, work and play in the future. To help with this next phase we are being supported by social enterprise Imagine If, founded by Chiara Fingland who has grown up in Callander and is back living in the area.

One of the first actions is to improve ways of finding out what's going on in the town. A way of communicating which has a physical presence in the town, can be easily updated, and doesn't rely on having a phone or laptop. A one stop shop where you can find out about Callander's groups/activities, upcoming events, town project updates (such as LPP) or live consultations on which you can have your say.

How can you help to shape this?

We are very keen that this is designed with and for the residents of Callander and would be grateful if you could help us shape this by answering a short survey (it takes less than 2mins, promise!).

Christmas Lights

The Christmas lights and decorations display in North Ancaster Square last year was very successful. The Christmas tree in the centre and the ones around the Square were covered in lights and we had the artificial trees on the St Kessog's steps and South Ancaster Square.

The evening when the lights were switched on was a great success with Santa's Sleigh parade along Main Street, brass band music, mulled wine, mince pies and cakes, fancy dress competition and two reindeer who eventually arrived. We have never seen such a big community gathering for the lights switch-on and it was so well supported that we completely blocked the road, giving some health and safety concerns.

This year, we are planning a wider display which we hope will extend around South Ancaster Square, along Main Street and down Bridge Street. The display will be strings of icicle lights and by the time this is published, we should have contacted all the shops and houses to see if we can hang lights over their windows and doors. The existing lights are good quality lights so will last many years, but we need to buy more for the extra display. At last year's switch-on we rattled buckets and raised £700, we had a fund-raising day in Ancaster Square when we raised £1100 and through on-line crowd funding we raised another £550. These funds will go towards the new lights and this year's event.

This year we also hope to have entertainment in the Square before the parade arrives, with carol singing and some 4-legged friends should be arriving.

Thanks again to all who help with the lights, Christmas tree, decorations, food and drink and everyone who has donated to this year's display.

COOK'S CORNER by Audrey Corrieri

Rhubarb and Marzipan Cake

Serves 12

INGREDIENTS

- 150g butter, softened
- 150g caster sugar
- 150g marzipan
- 3 medium eggs
- 50-75g plain flour
- 3-4 stalks of rhubarb
- 30g granulated sugar, plus extra for dusting the tin
- 10 sprigs of lemon thyme, rinsed and roughly chopped

METHOD

Preheat oven to 170 ⁰c/ Fan 150⁰c / Gas no 3

Cream the butter, caster sugar and marzipan together until smooth.

Then add the eggs, one at a time, until combined

Fold in the flour and stir.

Meanwhile grease a spring-form cake tin 20cm dia with a little butter, then sprinkle the inside of the tin with some sugar so that it sticks all the way round. This helps the baked cake to slip from the tin and gives it a caramelised surface.

Pour the cake mixture into the tin.

Cut the rhubarb stalks into 1-2 cm chunks and place in a bowl. Toss the pieces in the granulated sugar, then spread the rhubarb on top of the cake mixture, pressing a few pieces down into the batter Sprinkle the lemon thyme over the cake and bake for 30-35 mins.

Remove from oven and allow to cool before serving.



The June Forest Fires – Any lesson learnt?

We had nearly 4 weeks without rain this June which was also one of the hottest on record. And with it came several small forest fires in the woods surrounding Callander. Massive thanks to the Fire and Rescue Service for their brilliant work to successfully contain those fires and keep us safe. But what lessons can we learn from this that will help Callander be more resilient to the risk of forest fires in future?

The risk of flooding can usually be forewarned by the SEPA Flood Alert system, but wildfires spread lightning fast, changing direction, jumping to and from other areas. So our first thought is that Callander should have a plan of how it will effectively sound the alert to warn people. We are wondering whether Facebook is sufficient for this purpose or whether we ought to return to a more noisy approach – sounding a recognised horn or church bell?

We can do more to remind people not to light any fires during dry periods, and especially visitors from urban areas who will have no experience of wildfires. For example, Callander could have its own set of signs ready to be installed at key locations. This could be supported by the National Park whose camping permit rules say "fires must only be lit when there are no active fire risk warnings issued by the Park Authority or other relevant bodies". But we are not sure whether there was an active fire risk warning in place in the National Park this June. Forgive us if there was, but we never saw any warning signs around nor were there any very obvious posts on social media.

It's no mean coincidence that all of the June woodland fires started on Friday and Saturday nights, when we had more visitors and more local parties. So have we done enough to educate ourselves about the risk of fire in Callander and the dangers of building dens in the woods in dry conditions? The photos show a burnt out den from the most recent fire on the Callander Crags. Perhaps we should be running another campaign on fire safety when schools return this Autumn?

There is currently a shortage of on-call fire crew volunteers in Callander right now and a national recruitment drive is underway. So maybe a Callander campaign on fire would help raise awareness and encourage people to think about volunteering?

In the longer term, should we be planning more fire breaks? Lovely as Callander looks with the houses tucked into the trees, maybe it's time to have a rethink about just how close those trees are and whether the fallen deadwood from Storm Arwen and on-going larch clearance could help fuel the problem.

We feel there is much we can do to better prepare ourselves in future. We are hoping this article promotes debate. There is a small group of us who are starting to think about making Callander more resilient to the impact of climate change and all those interested in this article are welcome to come and join us: Callander Resilience Group . The Greener Callander Train is in the Station!

allander's first railway station opened on 1st July 1858 on the Dunblane, Doune and Callander Railway. This was taken over by the Callander and Oban Railway, running initially to Glenoglehead then extended to Oban on 30th June 1880. However. during the 1950s, although summer tourist travel continued, local use of the line declined heavily so winter usage was low. Beeching's cuts

therefore included closure of the line between Dunblane and Crianlarich from 1st November 1965, the through traffic being diverted over the West Highland line and the Crianlarich connection to Oban. The last excursion train over the line was planned for 27th September 1965, but in the small hours a rock fall took place

in Glen Ogle. The blockage was considerable, and after engineering assessment it was obvious that re-opening for a few weeks was impracticable so it was closed immediately. (courtesy of Wikipedia).

Today the only trace is the name of Station Road and its car park where the station stood. However, Greener Callander gardening volunteers have

maintained a nod to its history. In 2015 George Walker rescued a wooden train from a neighbour's garden and restored it as a planter, filled with summer and winter bedding. Unfortunately, 8 years of Callander weather meant it had reached the end of the line, hit the buffers and finally fallen off the tracks!!

We were therefore thrilled that Steve Willett responded to an advert for



'Wooden Train Engineers' to make a replacement. A bit like Santa, Steve had a secret helper for the construction phase before completing

the final build and painting. As a steam train enthusiast, details were observed, including the colour scheme of the Caledonian Railway. On 30th June we gathered for its formal

naming ceremony and, despite the dreich weather it was a fun event with the final unveiling of the engine name of Ben Ledi View. Appropriate to its location, this also recognises a financial donation from Callander's local news magazine. We are also extremely grateful to The Crafty Barrel Company for gifting the 3 barrels (Hoggins), recognised on the brass

plaque at the front of the engine.

Now you can tell its story to admiring/quizzical visitors.

The changing summer weather is proving challenging for hanging baskets and other planters, initially hot and dry with scorching wind followed by weeks of daily rain! Hopefully, our change to more resilient plants with better water wicking (hanging baskets lined with sheep's fleece) will work.

Watering of hanging baskets is contracted out to Empardio but many thanks to the individuals who have watered other containers during the hot weather.

Efforts to find funding to resurface the Community Garden continue but meanwhile are continuing to replace worn items piecemeal. In 2022 we

installed the new raised bed; in 2023 we replaced four barrel planters. Now we have procured money from Stirling Council's Common Good Fund to replace the worn three wooden benches with recycled plastic ones, hopefully in August.

Thanks to all who supported our fundraising stall on 20th May, donating prizes for the tombola, helping on the day and, vitally, spending raised will cover the costs

of plants, compost etc for the next year BUT we need more people to continue looking after so many beds and planters. We meet once a month throughout the year for a couple of hours for general garden upkeep plus extra sessions for planting summer and winter bedding. Forestry and Land Scotland - Phytophthora ramorum update



ver the last few years Phytophthora ramorum (P. ram), a fungus like disease which affects a number of tree and plant species, has been spreading throughout Scotland including the Trossachs. Once infected, it can kill larch (the tree species most badly affected) within a year. As it can't be eradicated,

the only way to slow down the spread of the disease is to fell the infected trees and those surrounding them, to stop the spores spreading and infecting other trees and forests.

We have recently identified some suspect larch trees in Coilhallan Wood and are awaiting further results from helicopter and ground surveys identifying new possible infections around the Trossachs. Lab testing will then be carried out and if the disease is confirmed we are then issued with a Statutory Plant Health Notice (SPHN)



requiring us to fell specific areas of larch within a defined timescale. The Trossachs currently falls into Scottish Forestry's Priority Action Zone so we have to act quickly to fell the infected trees, plus their buffer zone, in time.

We are currently working on a number of outstanding SPHNs around the Trossachs including finalising work plans for an SPHN issued near the Falls of Leny adjacent to the A84. This one in particular is proving complex and involves working alongside BEAR and geotechnical

engineers.

It is likely that we will be issued with more SPHNs later this year, once all the surveys and testing have been completed. The increase in felling activity may require new forest roads to be built and existing roads to be upgraded, as well as

harvesting facilities to be constructed. We appreciate this will have a big impact on the landscape and our visitor trails and facilities. Visitor trails and car parks will only be closed when there is no other option and will be reopened as soon as is practically and safely possible.

We will aim to update our webpages with any works which impact on our trails, car parks and visitor sites and appreciate your understanding during this time.

Callander Woodland Group Update

orestry and Land Scotland (FLS) has annouced the awful news that Larch Disease (Phytopthora Ramorum) has been found in Coilhallan Wood (see above) and felling has to be done before the end of the year.

The Callander Woodland Group will continue to hold volunteer days, working outside of the affected area as we have been doing previously in anticipation of this happening. Until machinery actually moves in, we will be able to take out non-native species and shrubs/trees in the wet areas along the path to the caravan park, to maintain a wet habitat for amphibians.

Once felling starts, we will also be able to work in the beech wood area along Mollands Road (designated for long-term retention in the new 10-year management plan), trying to keep it tidy for use by the Nursery. Also keeping open the well-used 'arboretum loop' to the north of the

main path. In the new 10-year plan, this area is designated for 'minimum intervention', mainly periodic thinning.

From September, once bird-nesting

has finished, we hope to start clearing out the five enclosures along the loop. These were planted with tree species from five continents (not Africa and Antarctica) in a Community project between FLS and McLaren High School almost 20 years ago. However, without maintenance, the specimen trees are now hidden by birch trees and other self-seeded species. If achievable, this could become one of the more ambitious but rewarding projects to provide points of interest and educational benefit along a posted route.

Of course all plans rely 100% on getting enough volunteers, expertise not essential, just stamina. If you are willing and able to join in, please get in touch via

Callander Heritage Society

May Report

At our meeting on May 17th Dr Peter McNiven talked about the Formation of 'The Earldom of Menteith.' This was made up of the lands around Aberfoyle, Callander, Doune, Kilmadock, the Perthshire part of Kippen, Port of Menteith, Blairdrummond and Kincardine in Menteith.

The Earls were invested by the Bishop of Inchmahome. Their main residences were at Inchtalla and Doune Castle. The ancient Earldoms or Mormaerdoms were Pictish titles. They were created to help support the Crown by collecting taxes and leading armies against raiders and rebels.

Although it had probably been in existence long before then, the earliest mention of the Mormaerdom of Menteith is in a charter of 1164 when Gille Crist (Gilcrist) was



made Earl of Menteith. The Earl of Strathearn had been punished for rebelling against King Malcolm IV by having part of his earldom confiscated to create a separate earldom of Menteith.

Probably the best-known Earl of Menteith was Robert, Duke of Albany, grandson of Robert the Bruce. He gained the title when he married Margaret, Countess of Menteith. Their main residence was Doune Castle which Robert had extended and modernised. For many years Robert was Regent of Scotland while James I was imprisoned in England.

On his death the title passed to his son Murdoch. On his return to Scotland, James had Murdoch executed and in 1427 James made Malise Graham the Earl of Menteith. The Grahams continued to hold the title until 1694 when William Graham died without heirs and the title became extinct.

June Report

At our meeting on 21st June, society member Peter Mehta gave a most interesting talk on 'Clocks and a link to our Heritage.'

As a hobby, Peter repairs and restores clocks. He enjoys researching the makers of the clocks he works on because by taking a closer look at old clocks we can find out a lot about the past. The earliest clock Peter has repaired dates from 1695. He has also repaired clocks from the 18th and 19th Century and researched their makers. There were many local clockmakers in Dunblane, Stirling, Alloa and St Ninians. He has repaired many clocks for local people helped by Ann Thompson, a local clock dial restorer.

Peter told us that the oldest clocks were water clocks and sundials as used by the Egyptians and Romans. At the foot of South Church Street there is the sundial given to Callander by Lord Esher of the Roman Camp, in memory of the soldiers who died in World War1. The sundial was made in 1753 and restored in 2001. A plaque beside the sundial shows how to use it.

Christian Huygens, a Dutch scientist and inventor, introduced the pendulum clock to London in 1695. Early clocks only had one hand showing the hour, minutes were not regarded as important. These were introduced later when more accurate timekeeping was needed. Early clocks were difficult and expensive to make. They were treasured possessions and passed down through the family.

Originally everywhere had 'Local Time' which varied across the country. The coming of the railways and the introduction of railway timetables meant the end of 'Local Time.' 'Railway time' was introduced in 1847 and GMT adopted nationwide in 1880.

The first public clock in Callander was on St Kessog's Church in 1860. Time was taken from church clocks on Sunday and then used to set house clocks.

There are no meetings in July and August. Our meetings resume in September when Dr Neil Clark will talk on 'Tracking Dinosaurs on Scotland's Jurassic Isle'.It's on September 20th in the Masonic Hall, Callander 7pm for 7.30pm.

A peaceful place where the family could be together. Fast forward to today and the Ripple Retreat allows families some very special time together in the most beautiful surroundings – a place of peace and beauty. The feedback we get from families reassures us we are getting it right. I attach a quote below from a recent family: "We loved the house well, just as ALL those who created and care for Ripple Retreat have loved us well too. Thank you for all of it, you loved us so well."





It takes a lot of people to look after the Ripple Retreat and keep it in the most pristine condition. (Remember too that some of our young guests are immunocompromised so our standards of hygiene are very high indeed). We are fortunate indeed to have good housekeeping, maintenance, and gardening teams to help us achieve our aims.

Most of these tasks are carried out on Thursdays and that also allows us to have visitors by appointment on a Thursday – individuals or businesses who may be considering supporting our charity for example.


The Silver Award also saw a great uptake, with the added bonus of inclusion of a group of pupils from Balfron High School to the team.


These candidates await their final qualifying expedition, which is scheduled for the 2nd last week of term, but have already worked hard across a similarly varied range of activities in the other sections of the award.



Dr Graham Strang M.B., Ch.B., D.R.C.O.G.. Glasgow 1983

As you will know, Graham has retired from Callander Medical Practice after 30 years serving the people of Callander. As well as being one of our local doctors, he has also been a trustee on the Youth Project and a member of Killin Mountain Rescue Team.

At his invitation, we put 20 questions to Graham about his career and other matters and this article is based on his answers.

Graham is a Glasgow boy, brought up in the West End and then the Southside, as his father whom the older members of our community will remember as a Callander GP, moved practices in and around Glasgow. He was schooled at Glasgow Academy, both junior and senior school, and did his medical degree at Glasgow University.

In his younger days, his ambition was to be a pilot in the Royal Air Force, but due to being a sufferer from hay fever he was deemed to be medically unfit to be a pilot, so this was not a possible route. He could have been a navigator, this did not have the same appeal and Medicine beckoned. Not having been a pilot is probably his big regret in life.

He originally did surgical orthopaedics, but found that working full time in a hospital and studying for the necessary qualifications to be a surgeon was too much and a rethink was necessary. After time mulling over his future he took a temporary position working in Radiography and found that he enjoyed the patient interaction, which you don't get as a surgeon, and decided to follow in his father's footsteps and become a GP. He did his GP Rotation (required training for a GP) which requires the trainee to have experience in a number of different disciplines in Oban,

Monklands, Hairmyres, Bridge of Earn and finishing of with six months in obstetrics and gynaecology in Stirling Royal Infirmary. The soup at Hairmyres and the fly fishing from the back of Bridge of Earn Hospital are particularly well remembered.

His final year of GP training was carried out with the GP practice in Tarbert in Argyll and Bute. By then his father had moved to running a one doctor practice in Callander which by then warranted another half time doctor, He joined the practice in 1991 as a half time GP, filling his time with various posts within the Health Board. His father was keen, as was he, in developing a new Medical Centre and amalgamating the two practices in Callander, and had been promised that this would happen. With these promises in mind, he came to Callander. It took rather longer than he thought to get the Health Centre built and with two practices joined, but it did eventually happen.

We asked what was the biggest difference in the job was now from when he joined the practice and he thinks it is that they can treat conditions now that would have just been left previously, as they were considered untreatable. Practices are a lot more proactive on more conditions now and more self-sufficient in treating rarer conditions. When working in a small town, and therefore in a small practice, you get to know people better: you know family history- and have a more holistic approach. There have been changes in the community over the years – a wider age range with the new housing - but it has happened gradually and therefore it has not been difficult to adapt.

There are disadvantages to a small practice in that the practice is paid relative to the number of people registered with it but a small practice has the same overheads as a large practice i.e practice manager, nurses, receptionists etc. This means that money is much tighter in a small practice. This is a problem which is specific to rural practices and which has been raised with governments on a number of occasions, and means that small rural practices are more difficult to make financially viable.

His biggest frustration in the practice was computers, a necessary evil, and patients coming in with more than one problem for a single appointment which causes delays for other patients. His biggest joy was seeing newborn babies for their first check-up. Although computers were a frustration they were also a large step change in the way GP practices operated. As far as the doctors are concerned the loss of night work, by the setting up of out of hours, was also a great step forward. He himself wrote off his car when overtired on a night call-out and knows the dangers this causes (GPs supply their own car, fuel etc.) – It was therefore an expensive 'night call'.

One of the big pluses of having a practice in a small town is that it made things much easier to deal with events such as Covid as everyone seemed to understand and follow the rules to try to get through it. The way that the volunteer services came together to assist during the epidemic was very good and was an excellent example of a community pulling together. The epidemic also brought forward the use of telephone consultations, which he believed was a good thing and which he hopes will continue and expand.

His proudest moment was when as a member of BASICS (British Association for Immediate Care) he, along with the GP from Doune and the ambulance from Callander, was called on and was amongst the first responders to the terrible shooting at Dunblane Primary School. This is something he still thinks on and he always attends the annual memorial service

On a personal side, his main interest is motorbikes, especially classic motorbikes. He has been the proud owner of a number in the past and still has a Kawasaki 900 which he has owned for 47 years so far. He is in the process of building a 'special' from various makes. This has taken 2 years and more so far and it is only half built! And it is likely to be even longer before it is finished as his two grandchildren are now occupying more and more of his time. His father was a classic car enthusiast and liked restoring them and he has owned a 1969 Corvette, but his real interest is in motorbikes.

His other interests are flyfishing for trout, although this has been a couple of years since last active, and he used to enjoy fishing at Cambusmore and on Loch Tay where his father had a cottage. He does own golf clubs, but that is about as far as that goes.

His holiday ideal is to immerse himself in the local scene, to get out and meet the local population and to become as much as possible a local for the time he is there, and he has a couple of holiday places of choice where he can do this. One is in Tenerife and the other is on the Greek island of Poros where his knowledge of Greek and Spanish comes in handy, although he tells me he is better at French and German. Other than that, it is to set off with his pals on a motorcycle tour over Europe and up the west coast of Scotland. He enjoys Europe for his holidays with no great desire to head for the far east.

I asked if he had a 'bucket list'? He said he has a sensible car, but he would have loved an Aston Martin DB7 and he has a sensible motorbike but would love a Kawasaki Z1. They are not so much of a 'bucket list' as a 'wish list'.

Being a GP has opened many doors for him, has brought him to Callander, has enriched him and made him a more tolerant and less selfish person.

His plans for retirement are to finish his 'special' motorbike, take more trips abroad and go to South Africa, where his wife was brought up, and take 'The Blue Train' From Johannesburg to Cape Town.

His impression of Callander is that the folk are very kind, welcoming and generous, and he would like to thank them for the many messages of support and the gifts he received on his retirement. He, however, will be back as he will be doing locum work for one day/week for Dr Scott.

The Ben Ledi View, and I am sure all the inhabitants of Callander, would like to thank Graham for all the work he has done over the last 32 years keeping us healthy. This, although at times it may have not seemed so to him, has always been appreciated. We wish him a long and happy retirement and hope that he gets on his 'Blue Train' trip and gets his 'special' motorbike finished. We hope to see you one day riding it up Main Street, Graham



Book club review

his issue's book review title is The Satsuma Complex by Bob Mortimer (Gallery Books UK: 2022).



Most people of a certain age will be familiar with the author of this month's book review title. Bob Mortimer has been a steady presence in UK popular culture since the 1980s. He is most noted for his television work; his comedy duo with Vic Reeves; being a regular guest on numerous gameshows, and more recently, as presenter of a BBC programme about fishing. His memoir in 2021 became a bestseller of that year. I've not read it myself, but it won many awards for best non-fiction. The Satsuma Complex is Mortimer's first novel.

The book is from the perspective of main character, Gary Thorn. Gary is a legal assistant with a firm of solicitors in South London. He is a forgettable conformist who wears drab, ill-fitting suits, lives alone, is dullishly ordinary and has very few friends. He has also not had a girlfriend for some time.

So, when a Doc-Martin'd attractive female strikes up a conversation with him at his regular pub, he can hardly believe his luck. He is instantly smitten. Even her fast exit cannot deter him and he sets out to find her and declare his love. However, there are many obstacles to overcome along the way, including fake police officers, violent ex-boyfriends,

missing colleagues and an unencrypted dongle.

The old adage 'write what you know' really applies to this book. Mortimer was a defence lawyer in the 1980s prior to becoming a comedian. He also lived in and around the estates of South London, where this book is set. Unsurprisingly, Mortimer's characters all have a surreal quality, including the main character, Gary, having regular in-depth conversations about his love life with a squirrel. I'm unsure why this was in the novel, though it wouldn't have been out of place in an episode of Shooting Stars.

I regret to say that the plot of *The* Satsuma Complex is a bit flimsy, but fans of Mortimer may enjoy the comedic value of the book, which certainly is unique - just like its author.
