In the past two months, the Callander South Master Plan has been finalised and approved by the Planning and Access Committee at its meeting in September 2023. The report now provides formal planning guidance which can be used for all future developments in Callander.

The Master Plan has been evolving for several years and will be an ambitious plan for the development of the town to the south of the river. A public consultation was held to seek views on the draft plan and all of the responses were analysed and used to produce the final version.

One of the main features in the plan is a new pedestrian and cycle bridge over the River Teith linking the eastern part of the town with the new and existing facilities south of the river. Technical investigations will now be carried out to find the most suitable point for the bridge including stability of the ground, flood levels and existing buildings and roads.



Vehicle access to the Callander South area will also be created from the Mollands Road where the spur road (Hamish Menzies Drive) already exists. In addition to access over the bridge there will be a network of paths and cycleways developed to create safe access to the schools and links to existing routes.

Within the site there will be areas for housing developments as well as tourist / visitor facilities. Areas will be identified for

open spaces, a community growing space and an outdoor sports arena. Areas of environmental value will be conserved and all developments will take flood risk into consideration.



ur vibrant town witnessed a day of camaraderie, music, and celebration at the highly anticipated Callander Street Ceilidh 2023. The event, organised by The Community Friends of The Canmore Trust, brought together residents, visitors and local groups for a memorable day of events.

Despite a rainy start, the Callander Street Ceilidh on Saturday 19th of August 2023, transformed into a heartwarming event that showcased the town's spirit of togetherness. The day began with the Fundraising Stall & t-shirt collection in Ancaster Square, which experienced some dampening due to the weather. However, the clouds cleared just in time for "The Gathering," a networking event that highlighted local groups and organizations dedicated to promoting wellbeing within the community.

The event featured a captivating performance by Song Squad, whose rendition of "Bring Me a Little Water, Silvie" left the audience mesmerized. Throughout the early evening, local entities such as:

The highlight of the day was the 2023 Callander Street Ceilidh which began with a procession led by piper Conor Ramsay-Clapham. The procession, accompanied by drones flown by Chris Coull & Iain Carrie, marched through the streets of Callander before culminating in a spirited performance by the Glasgow Vets Ceilidh Band. Participants, both seasoned dancers and newcomers, enjoyed the traditional Scottish dances, creating an infectious atmosphere of joy and unity. In a heartwarming display of community support, locals guided

tourists through the dance steps, children took part in their first ceilidh, and participants of all ages revelled in the festivities. The energetic evening included various dances, culminating in a 10-minute Orcadian Strip The Willow that drew traditional gaelic applause from bystanders. The event concluded with a rousing rendition of "Auld Lang Syne," capping off a memorable hour of celebration.

The Street Ceilidh paid tribute to the late Cameron Gibson, who loved a ceilidh and the outdoors and whose legacy lives on through The Canmore Trust, founded by his parents John and Isobel Gibson, an organisation that focuses on creating safe spaces for lives impacted by suicide. The event saw an impressive turnout of over 350 attendees, who formed a "Sea of Blue" in memory of all lives lost to suicide.

John Gibson, Cameron's father, took to the stage to express gratitude and share the impact of The Canmore

Trust. He emphasized the organisation's role in saving lives through engagement and intervention, offering a supportive space for those affected by loss.

The event was made possible by the generous contributions of Empardio Limited and Kings Group Scotland, as well as the support of Stirling Council, Martin Earl, Callander Rotary, and Killin Mountain Rescue.

Looking ahead, plans for the 2024 Callander Street Ceilidh are already in motion. The organisers invite volunteer marshals, local groups, and interested individuals to join The Community Friends of The Canmore Trust, ensuring the Community Friends of event's continuous growth and success. Alex will be sorely missed, but his legacy continues in the work he accomplished and the lives he touched.





re-energise our town by getting involved in attracting new business opportunities as well as making the best of what we already, so making Callander a more successful and vibrant town.





RAY WATKINS I am a retired NHS Consultant in Dental Public Health. I joined the Community Council in order to serve the community.




OLGA WATKINS

We are currently awaiting feedback on whether we can visit St Kessogs with Stirling Council and the Ward Councillors, since it was recently discovered that entry to the building is problematic with doors swelling and locks not working. CCC would like to view the state of the building and hopefully have some discussions on likely future uses. As Callander's iconic landmark, it must not be allowed to deteriorate in the same way as the Eagle Hotel has, but this is not the best start, especially with the winter approaching.

CCC are interested in the outcome of the discussions on the future of the C60 bus route and understand that the service is likely to be maintained until March 2024. A new timetable was published at the end of October. This service is the only public service on the east side of the National Park and the only service linking our rural communities up to Killin where the NHS dentist is located for many people who used to attend the Callander dentist before it moved to only private treatment. The bus is a lifeline to students wishing to attend after-school classes and for people wanting to shop for food and other necessities. Whilst we can appreciate the need to reduce costs, it is all too often that rural services are cut in favour of city services. But the rural services are often lifelines and there is no other affordable option. We will need to ensure C60 stays open for 2024 and beyond.

A joint event called Callander Connect was organised at the end of October between Callander Community Council and Callander Community Development Trust to involve a number of other local organisations mainly with a 'civic' hat on, such as Callander Flooding group, Callander Resilience group, Active Travel. The event was to relaunch the Local Place Plan as well as to have a few fun activities for everyone of all ages to enjoy. The successful event was held in both Ancaster Square and Callander Visitor Centre and a separate article will provide more photos of the day. Other similar events will be planned to show-case the work of the Community organisations and how the Local Place Plan is developing.

The next 3-month window of opportunity has just opened for the Braes of Doune Community Fund (BoD Fund). In Callander we are very lucky to have local funding support from two funds. The Braes of Doune Community Fund is managed by Callander Community Council, and still has a few years to run as a result of Callander being located within a certain distance of the Braes of Doune Windfarm.

The other funding support comes from the Callander Hydro Fund, arising from the profits of the Callander Hydro Scheme managed by Callander Community Development Trust. The BoD Fund has a regular income (so far, increasing each year and in 2023 was for £20,000) for us to award to applications from organisations managing events and projects for community benefit. Recent successful applications have been Greener Callander for a contribution to the new robust wheelchair-friendly surface in the Friends Community Garden in South Church Street, and hall hire costs for a group providing a social environment for elderly residents and younger members of the Community Hub. Killin Mountain Rescue - Long Serving Awards

Killin Mountain Rescue Team stalwarts have been honoured for life long commitment to Mountain Rescue in Scotland. Four of the team were awarded the Distinguished Service Award (DSA) at the recent Scottish Mountain Rescue annual general meeting. The award recognises a service and leadership spanning more than four decades. Awarded from the Mountain Rescue Community in Scotland, these were presented to:

TILLIN A

- Former team leader Billy 'Willie' Stitt of Killin
- Team Secretary and coordinator, Bill Rose of Callander
- Deputy Leaders Gus Cameron of Lochearnhead and
- Stewart 'Teddy' Inglis of Killin

All four have been members since 1975, fulfilling mountain rescue in the north Stirlingshire area including Killin and Callander. There have been many hundreds of rescues these gentlemen have been involved in and it is to their credit that many individuals have been rescued and returned to their loved ones.



As experienced mountain rescuers, these men have seen and experienced many tragic callouts. None more so than the night of the 1st of February 1987 when during a call out on Ben More looking for a walker, the team Coordinator, Harry Lawrie, was killed as the Wessex helicopter he was in tragically crashed into the mountainside. It is a day that devastated the team and the wider local communities in which they served. The incident also caused life-changing injuries to fellow team member, the late Iain Ramsay. Despite the grief at losing one of their own, it is these aforementioned men and the members of the team at that time, who the next day went out again to search for the missing person who also tragically died. It is that dedication that has ensured Killin Mountain Rescue Team has always been there for the thousands of hill goers in its area.

The foundation of Mountain Rescue has always been a team effort. It is not the individual that makes it work, it's being able to work together towards a common purpose. Bill, Billy, Gus and Teddy are rightly recognised for their long and distinguished commitment to mountain rescue.

Callander Flood Group - A Warning Message From Brechin

In the aftermath of Storm Babet and the flooding in Brechin, it is worthwhile considering what we, in Callander, can learn from those frightful flood events.

The Scottish Government has stated that, 'Scotland's weather has become warmer and wetter, and we have seen more extreme rainfall events. These trends are set to continue and intensify'.

The Brechin floods of October 2023 are a good example of this.

The Brechin Flood Prevention Scheme (2016), at a cost of more than £16 million, was designed to safeguard up to a 1:200 year flood event. The walls and embankments were to protect against a 3.8m flood. On 19th October water levels overtopped the flood defence wall, the result of which was the rapid inundation of the immediate properties.

At the opening of the new flood defences in Brechin, the Scottish Environment Secretary stated that this flood protection scheme would shield Brechin "for generations to come" The 'generation' only lasted seven years! If we cannot protect against every eventuality, did the overtopped flood wall in Brechin still offer a delay from the full impact of the flood and provide valuable time to prepare for evacuation?

The Callander Meadows Car Park Flood Alleviation Scheme was published in March 2018. In that report the aim of Stirling Council was to focus on more localised measures around the Meadows Car Park, "protecting to a lower but more practically achievable standard of protection".

Through four years of interaction (it never has been engagement) with the community, Stirling Council has not yet indicated any alternative approach, and has continued to press on with that initial aim to build a flood wall in the Meadows Car Park. This proposed flood wall would have been overtopped by the floods of February 1990, December 2006, December 2015, and possibly by floods in 2005 and 1994. The Justice Secretary stated in the Scottish Parliament on the 25th October, that, "Climate Change is not a far-off distant threat – it is a crisis that is here and now".

What is proposed by Stirling Council is insufficient and lacking for what has occurred in the past, what is happening at present, and in no way provides any protection against future, climate change impacted floods. Nor does it protect all at-risk properties.

To finish, at time of writing, all thoughts are with those families and businesses that have suffered in the aftermath of Storm Babet. Are we prepared here for such a storm?

Rotary in Callander

Readers may remember we reported previously that we were raising money to provide two defibrillators for Callander Police.

Following considerable support from our community at numerous fundraising events, on 9th Sept 2023 Rotary in Callander were thrilled to be able to hand over two mobile

defibrillators to be used by Police Scotland in vehicles based around Callander and the wider Loch Lomond & Trossachs National Park. Giving the police access to these defibrillators is expected to save lives, as response times are critical to addressing cardiac arrest. The presentation took place at the Kirk Hall and a good number of members of the public attended.

Rotary in Callander was delighted to partner with Sandra McKandie from Keiran's Legacy (keiranslegacy.co.uk), a Scottish charity focused on ensuring that defibrillators are available in police cars across Scotland. Sandra and her husband, Gordon, set up the charity following the traumatic event of losing their very fit son, who had a heart attack whilst in a remote Scottish location and the police who were first responders did not have the defibrillator equipment that could have saved his life.

Not only did Sandra source the two defibrillators for Rotary in Callander to present, but at the event she also gave a very informative demonstration of how to use a defibrillator and also showed how to manage the recovery position.





In the pictures of the handover of the defibrillators from Police Scotland are Andrew Bushell and Scott Kennedy who are based in Callander, plus National Park Ranger Team Leader, Suzanne Humphris, also based in Callander and finally Rotary in Callander's main coordinator for this fundraising Michael Kay and current President Jen Shearer.

Thank you once again to everyone in our community who supported our fundraising events that enabled us to purchase these two defibrillators.

In September, on the Saturday of the Jazz Festival, we held a very successful Bottle and Bric a Brac event in Ancaster Square including our first Golden Ticket event where the prizes were three very special bottles of malt whisky and gin. Three visitors to the town went home very happy! As a result

of the generosity of visitors and locals we were able to add over £800 to our Charity Account for distribution to good causes.

At the end of October we had a stall in Ancaster Square as part of the Meet and Make event organised by Callander Community Development Trust to promote local groups. You do not have to be a member of the Society nor an expert to participate in the Bulb Show, so please take a look at the schedule below to see how you can get involved. Some classes require advance planning with bulbs being planted in pots, but others can be put together from bulbs and shrubs you already have growing in your garden.

BULB SHOW SCHEDULE

Ben Ledi View

Cut Flowers

- 1. 3 trumpet daffodils;
- 2. 3 double daffodils;
- 3.3 tulips;
- 4. Vase of mixed spring flowers and/or flowering shrubs.

Potted Bulbs and Flowers

- 5. 5 crocuses;
- 6. A mixed pot of bulbs;
- 7. 1 pot spring flowers mixed or single variety (could include, but not limited to pansies, violas, forget-meknots, primulas, polyanthus, hellebores).

Anyone can exhibit at the show. A child is anyone under 14 years of age.

Some rules to be aware of: Classes 1 to 4 to be displayed in exhibitors' own vases or jars approximately 20cm in height. Classes 5 and 6 to be displayed in a bowl, pan or pot with maximum outside diameter of 20cm / 8 inches. Class 7 to be displayed in a bowl, pan or pot with maximum outside diameter of 30cm /12 inches. All cut flowers and exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor and have been in their care at least three months prior to the show, with the exception of the Floral Art exhibit. Please refer to website www.cadhs.co.uk for more information and the Final Schedule which will outline further timings for the day.

September

At our September meeting Dr Neil (Jurassic) Clark, Curator of Palaeontology at the Huntarian Museum talked to us about 'Tracking Dinosaurs in Scotland.'

The west coast of Scotland has a wide variety of rock types ranging from the very old to the new.

The fossils found in Scotland come mainly from the mid-Jurassic period. Not many fossils from this era have been found in the world.

Although many kinds of fossils had been found in Scotland, it was not until 1982 that the first dinosaur fossil was found in Scotland. A dinosaur footprint was found in rocks on Skye. Since then, many more fossils have been found in many places in Scotland but the majority have been in the Western Isles, Scotland's Jurassic Coast.

In one place on Skye, nicknamed the Dinosaurs' Dancefloor, more than 100 dinosaur footprints have been found. At one time this area was a lagoon and the footprints, which vary in size, show evidence of a family of sauropods walking across the mud.

The fossils found on Skye are from around the time that dinosaurs split into vegetarian and meat-eaters.

October

Dr. Murray Cook came to give us a topical talk on 'James VI and his Legacy of Witchcraft Trials.'

From his accession to the throne as a baby, there were always groups plotting against James. Naturally, James became paranoid about people trying to harm him. He was particularly worried about his enemies using witchcraft against him.

Previously, in Scotland, there had been witch trials but very few of the witches had been killed. Usually the witches were women, many of whom had the reputation as healers. When there was bad weather, poor crops or illness it was claimed that witches were responsible.

In 1590 when James sailed to Denmark to marry Anne of Denmark, there were terrible storms. Officials blamed witchcraft. James wrote a book. Daemonolgie which showed his belief in witches and magic. It detailed examples of witchcraft, how to identify witches and how they should be punished. He fully endorsed witchhunts.

Women accused of witchcraft were arrested. They were deprived of sleep, gagged, tortured, their head and body were shaved and they were 'pricked' to make them confess. Pricking consisted of jabbing a thick needle all over the body to find a place which did not bleed or the victim showed no pain. This was the spot the devil had touched and proved they were a witch.

Most confessions were made under torture. Those found guilty were burned at the stake.

During James's reign hundreds of men and women, mostly women, were killed as witches.

Shakespeare wrote Macbeth especially for James VI. The witches match James's idea of witches. They are evil, causing storms and casting spells to harm or kill people.

There are no Society meetings in December and January.

Callander Resilience Group update

Stirling Council launched their Stirling Winter Volunteer Scheme in September this year following a successful pilot in Bridge of Allan and Killin the previous year. The Council will provide training and equipment to assist volunteers with gritting and clearing snow from footpaths outwith the Council's Winter Service Plan. Volunteers will help areas of the community the Council deem less of a priority and help residents do their everyday business. By the time this is published, you may have seen us out and about with shovels clearing snow if we've had a dusting. The resilience group is coordinating the local volunteers so we can work as a team to target different areas of Callander to effectively cover as many areas as possible.

The last time the resilience group was in BLV was as a response to the disruption caused by Storm Arwen nearly 2 years ago. In the meantime, we have surveyed the residents about Callander's current resilience, sought volunteers and asked what resources are available. We now have a list of

individuals offering anything from assisting in the search for a missing person to offering machinery to clear fallen trees from roads. We have also been mapping the town's assets and trying to locate the best place for a temporary community hub as a source of information, hot food and drinks and temporary accommodation should the worst happen. We have been forging links with other community groups, such as the Callander Flood Groups and Trossachs Search and Rescue, to support one another in the community interest.

The recent storms of Babet and Ciaran and the major flood event of early October have again highlighted the need for us all to be more aware of extreme weather events. This further outlines the case for community resilience volunteers to help and look out for community members who are more vulnerable and support their recovery from events.

Personal and home preparation are the first steps to being more resilient. If you can look after yourself and your direct family, why not consider checking on your neighbours to see if they require help? If we can all look out for one another, we'll be more prepared and able to recover from unexpected events.

We're always on the lookout for volunteers; we can all do a little to collectively make a difference, and any help is always appreciated. If you're interested in joining the Winter Volunteer Scheme or the Callander Resilience Group, please get in touch with us at callanderresilience@gmail.com.

he original Community Garden in South Church Street was built in 2013 on the site of a toilet block, demolished by Stirling Council. Greener Callander's Hilary Gunkel master-minded the project to a design by Jayne Whitehead of Ivy Maud Design. The garden was opened in September 2013 and has been wellused by visitors and locals for 10 years. Consequently, the gravel surface had worn so was loose, tended to migrate on to the pavements and badly scratched the stepping stones with Community group logos. While the hard landscaping features like the sett circles have weathered well, the

We started in July 2022 with replacement of the rotted bog garden and logs. The new raised bed was built from a Woodblocx kit which proved more difficult than expected, like a cross between a giant Jenga and wooden Lego! Funding was from the Callander Hydro Community Fund.

wooden planters and benches finally

surrendered to the Callander climate.

It was time for a restoration.

Over winter 2023 the barrel planters finally fell apart and in March were replaced with new ones supplied at cost by The Crafty Barrel Company then painted in the hope of longevity.

In August, with funding from the Common Good Fund, we were able to replace the three rotting wooden benches with new sturdy ones made from recycled plastic.

After a year of funding applications, successful and unsuccessful, we finally managed to raise enough money to start the restoration of the surface. Mowlawn, the selected contractor started work in late September, fencing off the whole area and removing the top of the old surface. The work was initially estimated at up to 2 weeks but Callander's weather had other ideas and a really wet spell caused delays but the fencing was finally removed in mid-October. After another 3 weeks for Greener Callander volunteers to return the barrels and refurbished planters by the sub-station wall and the garden was complete.

We must thank all of our funders: major funders are Callander Community Hydro Fund (64%) and the Braes of Doune Community Fund (25%). Smaller but essential grants

came from the Stirling Council Community Pride Fund, the Co-op Local Cause Fund (thank you to all of you who selected us as your cause) and Greener Callander's own funds.

Of course none of it could happen without Greener Callander volunteers who do the less-obvious jobs of emptying, painting, refilling and replanting of the containers along with regular pruning and weeding and recent sanding and oiling of the curved wooden benches.

Complimentary comments have been received from many passing residents and visitors and it is hoped it will now need little work other than keeping it clean but we need everyone's help to do this. It is extremely disappointing and frustrating that a small number of dog owners allow their pets to use the beds as a toilet, leaving disgusting packages for us to find when weeding. Even while I was completing planting in the garden, High School pupils walking through dropped chewing gum and pizza onto the new surface unacceptable!

Although we have no plans for more major tasks in the near-future, Greener Callander will still be looking after this and other gardens, along with planters round the two War Memorials, outside St Kessog's and in Station Road, including the new train unveiled in mid-June. Also growing on plants and planting up 45 hanging baskets. We also raise plants to sell at our annual

fundraising stalls in May. It is hard work but rewarding and very sociable. We meet on the first Monday of the month with a few extra sessions at busy times. If you appreciate the benefit that plants bring to the town and can spare a few hours then please think about helping from next March. Just contact me on mlhawkins@tiscali.co.uk.

What it's like being in the Editor Team at BLV

I am new to BLV having moved to Callander two years ago. I had read the BLV that was regularly delivered to my door. That got me interested to find out more of the history and whether there were older issues that might show what Callander was like 5, 10 or more years ago. First stop was **www.BenLediView.org** and yes there were some pdf copies of issues gone by. It seems the first issue was in May 1987 and has been going ever since, even through Covid. Quite an achievement for a 100% voluntary organisation.

Like Rosalind I too started by using Word documents, I think a lot of us have started there. At school I got interested in printing presses, as the school had two. You had to create lines of type from a font drawer, seperating each line with leading. Finally you put the type in the middle of a steel frame rectangle, lastly placing blocks of wood and lock the type within the frame with expanding metal expandable joints.

Nowadays software is used, which makes it so much faster. For many years now, I have created a simple family newsletter at Christmas time, 2 or 4 pages. Just to give news to family and friends over the last year. The first ones were very crude but they improved as I learned different techniques and graphic design principles. As Rosalind said there is some trial and error along the way. But that is how you learn. Now I pass my knowledge forward to others. I'm not perfect and I have a LOT to learn with Photoshop.

So if you are interested in finding out how an issue is put together and want to learn new skills, I'd say give it a go. We'll start you with simple tasks that you will be comfortable with. Gradually introduce new skills at a speed that suits you. There are volunteers happy to help you along the road.

What it's like being a Section Editor at BLV

This involves a bit of trial and error to get the pages looking right and also working out how to do what you actually want to do given the nature of the software. Although I may shout at the computer and complain when it goes wrong (invariably user error of course), I must enjoy it or I would have walked away by now. It is very satisfying when your section gets sent off and a good feeling to know you are helping people working hard to keep our wee town going and making it a good place to live.

E-bike share scheme – what is it?



Over the last few years e-bikes have become more popular. They provide assistance at various levels for the user, taking the sting out of the hills, which we have plenty of locally and add the fun back into cycling. No surprise that many report getting the e-bike smile after trying one!

Many members of Callander's successful social Callander Meanders Cycling Group have converted to e-assist bikes so if you need more information just ask one of them. Cyclists always love talking about their bikes.

So what is a bike share scheme? – quite simply it is any scheme where bikes or e-bikes are available to multiple users.

E-bikes can be quite expensive, they are often heavy and bulky so require easy access and secure storage, and like all bikes require regular maintenance to keep them running smoothly. A bike share scheme can help resolve many of those issues and are now fairly common in our cities.

A community bike share scheme usually works on a membership basis, where people join the scheme and agree to the terms and conditions. The bikes are then available to book, collect and return from an agreed location. This location might be a secure locker with a smart lock and code, thereby helping with the administration of the scheme.

Renovations

'he School Garden renovations are underway. Our aims are to increase the number of people using the garden area, to make the area productive, build up important skills, boost development and support wellbeing as well as encouraging biodiversity. Half the rotten beds have been fixed and we look forward to seeing the other half and the edges to the flower beds fixed this Autumn.

Gardening for the Future



The School Garden and Callander Youth Project (CYP) are working on a joint project entitled "Gardening for the future" to help with skills development for groups of our pupils,



including pupils from Katrine House and those who access the Learning Development room. Brian from CYP is working with members of our school to develop and maintain our School Garden. This weekly project helps our young people, supported by Support for Learning assistants and youth development, to use the garden as an additional learning resource. So far they have planted radish seeds and harvested strawberry runners. CYP have successfully accessed funding for us for this project from Stagecoach, allowing the purchase of tools, bulbs, and other resources, crucial to the success of this redevelopment and renovation. A huge thank you to them for this. The first delivery of equipment happened this week and it was like an early Christmas unwrapping it all. One of the pupils who attended gave this feedback - "That was awesome, I really enjoyed that". We are all really excited to see where this will take them.

Biodiversity

Biodiversity is the variety of living organisms within an area. We have been assessing the biodiversity in The School Garden area to enable us to do a comparison for next year after the gardens have developed.

Royal Horticultural Society Gardening Award



The school has gained Level 1 of the Royal Horticultural Society school gardening awards. We will be working this year to achieve level 2 or higher.

Developing Ownership

The new beds have been named, after consultation with pupils, around native local animals. So we will have Red Deer, Osprey, Golden Eagle, Pine Marten, Fox, Badger, Squirrel, Rabbit, Dormouse, Stoat, Owl and Hare. Some of these have been divided to give individual pupils and groups their own individual areas to grow and look after. Pupils have applied for these beds, detailing what they would like to grow and how they will be responsible for the bed all year round. We can't wait to see what they will plant and how their gardens will develop.

Senior Workgroup

A group of senior pupils have been helping out with the renovations; removing weeds and overgrown plants in the beds. They have worked really hard to help prepare the beds for their new owners. A huge thank you to them all.

Callander Youth Project Community Update 2023

Welcome to Callander Youth Project's (CYP) Community Update for 2023. We want to share with the people of Callander what's been going on at CYP, to celebrate some of the achievements of our young people and the organisation and also some of the challenges we have faced.



Each year brings new challenges, and that is certainly the case again in 2023. Some young people suffered disproportionately from the COVID 19 lockdowns in terms of their education and ability to socialise, so I am pleased that CYP have been able - in a small way - to address this. To that end, we have been working with the staff at McLaren High School on a number of projects to support young people. We are currently supporting 19 young people, through a range of projects that include horticultural skills in the garden and Catering for the Future in our professional kitchen. The Youth Clubs have also continued to be very popular with both P6 and P7 clubs at their capacities. During the summer breaks we ran extremely well-received activity programmes, which included a city excursion to Edinburgh and paddleboarding on the Teith. The programme was attended by 66 young people both from Callander and surrounding villages. We have also recently opened our refurbished Youth Space where young people can meet, socialise, play games and interact with our youth workers.

Another area of success has been the continued development of our garden, both as an attractive area for our guests as well as a vehicle for youth work opportunities. The latter is mainly based around our fruit and vegetable garden, comprising raised beds and an accessible polytunnel. The garden serves as an outside classroom and the hard work of the young people and volunteers resulted in a number of class awards at the Horticultural Society show. An added bonus is that we've been able to share our harvest with the community via a fruit and vegetable display in the entrance lobby. We are also working with the High School to re-establish their raised bed garden and, having secured external funding, are pushing forward with this as a way of energising more young people. If you are a Co-op user, you might like to go online and support CYP/McLaren as your local good cause?

You will have gathered already that CYP is very conscious of its role in the wider community; we host the Craigard Club each week providing approximately 30 members with a 2-course meal produced and served by young people under the supervision of our chef. This also provides an excellent opportunity for inter-generational contact and additionally, we have been recognised as a Dementia-friendly venue from Stirling University. This was covered in more detail in the last issue of the BLV. A further example of community engagement is CYP acting as a base for the DVLA Driving Test Centre, which is a real benefit to people in Callander and surrounding communities. What many people don't know, is that CYP provides this facility to the DVLA free of charge!

As most of you will recognise, the Bridgend is an old building and as such, it is quite costly to maintain and run. Despite this, the Trust has been able to secure funds to carry out a number of improvements during 2023. At the start of the year, we carried out an ambitious project to transform our rather tired toilet facilities, and in particular the inadequate disabled toilet, in to a modern, warm and accessible facility. We would like to specifically thank CCDT's Hydro Fund and CCC's Braes of Doune fund for their valuable contributions to this project. At the same time, we also replaced the flooring in the rear entrance area and the Function Suite, redecorated the Function Room and put in new lighting and new curtains.

CYP is partially self-funded; the money to provide the facilities at Bridgend and pay for all the work we do, is generated by the Social Enterprise, consisting of the Hostel and Glamping Pods and the Functions business, together with finding and securing grant funding from both private and public sources. As anyone with experience of hospitality knows, the social enterprises take a huge amount of hard work from our staff, and I must once again thank them for all their efforts associated with delivering a first-class service.

Our Board of Trustees is a fantastic team of volunteers with a mix of professional expertise and I thank all of them for their dedication and hard work. Sadly, Mark Everett and Scott McIntyre stepped down during the year for personal reasons and I would like to thank them both for their very valuable service to CYP. We are actively looking for new Trustees and if anyone is interested, please contact myself or Patricia Kent, Manager at CYP!

Friends Wind Shift

The conservation charity, Friends of Loch Lomond and The Trossachs (FOLLAT), is changing its stance towards large scale renewable energy projects.



In the past it has steadfastly opposed large scale schemes which it felt might damage the special qualities of valued landscapes in the National Park. It may no longer necessarily do so.

The Friends Chairman, John Urguhart said:

"Global warming is creating new imperatives. As a conservation charity, we have a duty to react. I have no doubt we have an important role to play in addressing the issues which are being created at our local level, so "thinking globally and acting locally". Last month our trustees agreed the following;

- 1. Tackling the interconnected crises affecting energy, climate and nature defines the current period and influences every facet of the national park.
- 2. We all have an individual responsibility to help in the process of tackling climate change. In the past the Friends have supported small scale community based renewable projects, such as the hydro-electric projects at Callander, Lochgoilhead and Arrochar. Now we need to reconsider our position in relation to larger schemes.
- 3. Due to its upland glaciated topography, high rainfall and proximity to Scotland's major centres of population, the National Park area possesses a unique combination of advantages for renewable energy production, storage and distribution
- 4. As it is the cheapest and most rapidly delivered technology, the rapid roll out of land-based wind power and energy storage systems are essential measures in decarbonising the atmosphere and improving the country's energy security situation.
- 5. Decarbonising the atmosphere is essential to the resolution of the climate and nature crises which threaten the special qualities of the National Park.
- 6. FOLLAT believes very large wind turbines and photovoltaic schemes as well as energy storage facilities such as pumped storage schemes and battery installations, sited in appropriate locations on the edge of (and perhaps in certain special circumstances, in carefully selected areas, even within) the National Park need not be unduly detrimental to the Park's special qualities.
- 7. Bodies benefitting financially from energy production, distribution and storage and other related installations which may impinge one way or another on the National Park have a duty to contribute towards the preservation of the Park's special qualities.
- 8. FOLLAT believes a share of income from such developments can create substantial benefits and opportunities for visitors, communities and nature. One example of this might be support for the rapid introduction of a modern low carbon park wide public transport system.
- 9. FOLLAT should be adopting a leadership role in recognising the critical importance of renewable energy and storage systems and should therefore be actively encouraging and facilitating their development on appropriate sites within and around the Park.

Without doubt this is a radical departure for the Friends, but the trustees believe the current circumstances give them little option. Nonetheless, for some, it remains a controversial matter, so we have asked our members to make sure we have their backing. To date, only 5% have voiced dissent.

The Friends was set up almost half a century ago to fight plans for a pumped storage hydro-electric installation which was to be built inside Ben Lomond (Much the same as was done around the same time at Ben Cruachan further west on Loch Aweside). Their campaign was successful and the Ben Lomond scheme was never built. Nowadays energy planners would give their eye teeth to have such a facility.

Ironically Scottish and Southern Electricity is proposing to partially convert their Sloy hydro-electric installation to pumped storage. How ironic that today the Friends will be enthusiastically supporting this project!

COOK'S CORNER by Audrey Corrieri

Mincepie and Cranberry Brownies

Cuts into 16 squares

INGREDIENTS

- 175g unsalted butter, chopped, plus extra to grease
- 175g dark chocolate, chopped
- · 250g caster sugar
- 3 medium eggs
- 50g cocoa powder
- 75g plain flour
- 4 mince pies, approx 225g, roughly chopped
- 4 tbsp cranberry sauce

METHOD

Preheat oven to 180°C / 160°C Fan / Gas No 4.

Grease and line a 20.5cm square tin with greaseproof paper.

In a large pan over a low heat, melt the butter and chocolate until combined. Set aside to cool for 10 mins.

Stir in the sugar, followed by the eggs. Sift in cocoa powder and flour and mix to combine.

Stir through most of the chopped mince pies, scrape into prepared tin, smooth, then scatter over remaining mince pies. Using a teaspoon, dollop on the cranberry sauce.

Bake for 35-40 mins until firm to the touch.

Cool completely in the tin.

To serve, transfer to a board and slice in to 16 squares.







Book club review

This issue's book review title is Landlines by Raynor Winn (Penguin Books: 2023). Landlines is Winn's third book, following her



best-selling memoir *The Salt Path.*Landlines begins in the middle of 2020 when the UK is emerging from the first lockdown. For many months, Winn and her husband, Moth, like most of us, have had

their lives reduced to a 5-mile radius. They tread the same fields daily and walk in the same parks, whilst ensuring they give everyone they meet a wide berth.

Moth's health is not good. The Salt Path had revealed Winn's partner had a degenerative illness and Landlines starts with a sense of despair that there is a continuation of his inevitable decline. Winn thinks back to their 600mile walk on the coastal path of south-west England. Whilst the couple were confronting homelessness and uncertainty, the daily treks over several months had seen a significant improvement in Moth's health. Winn knew they needed to get back on the trails.

As borders within the UK re-open, they head to the tip of north-west Scotland to begin their journey on the Cape Wrath Trail – a 200mile trek across some of the UK's most remote land. It's fascinating to read and remember the world during the pandemic and immediately after the first lockdown. The NC500 is

jam-packed with camper-vans, cars, cyclists, motorcyclists, yet the walking trails are deserted. Villages are sparse. Provisions are limited. Doors are still closed, as all visitors are treated with suspicion.

Winn recounts these extraordinary times with her own stylistic mix of travel writer, social commentator, and nature lover. She combines a whole host of important topics with wry humour, tenderness and sadness. Her description of land and nature, animals and humankind, is unique and unforgettable.

Winn's writing is beautiful and inspiring. On finishing *Landlines*, I was filled with the urge to put on a pair of boots and walk. She is a gifted observer and notices the intricacies of mankind. And somehow, she gifts this to the reader, as her observations, and the gift of noticing, go with you – long after you've turned the final page.





The first talk of the Callander SWT Group's 2023-24 season was on tree-roosting bats by John Haddow. John has worked with bats and their conservation for over 40 years and is a founder member and current chair of the Central Scotland Bat Group. He has Auritus Wildlife Consultancy which specialises in bat surveys.

Many people associate bat roosts with houses but there are nine bats in Scotland that would naturally roost in trees; common, soprano and Nathusius's pipistrelles, brown longeared, noctules and Liesler's bats along with the myotis (little brown bats), Daubenton's, Natterers and Whiskered Bat. https://www.bats.org.uk/aboutbats/what-are-bats/uk-bats. The most frequently seen small bats are the common and soprano pipistrelles which are hard to differentiate except by their echo-location frequencies at 45 and 55 Hz. These tiny mammals are only 25-35 mm long with a wingspan of 200-235 mm and weigh in at 3-8g. The Noctule bat is the biggest in Scotland at 37-48mm body length, wingspan 48-58mm and weigh 18-40g, still not huge! Daubenton's bats are often seen flying over the river, dipping close to the water to catch insects.

Bats use different roosts throughout the year which are all legally protected. From November to March they hibernate but can wake up if disturbed or if the temperature rises, however, this wastes energy and they can die if woken too often before food is available. Clustering in large roosts helps to maintain a stable temperature and humidity. Pipistrelles will roost in small cracks in walls while Brown Long-Eared bats move underground.

By March/April they are starting to emerge and move between roost sites. By May they are fully active and feeding. Females start forming maternity colonies and look for suitable nursery sites while males roost alone or in small groups. In June the females give birth to a single pup, having delayed fertilisation and egg implantation until food is available. By August the 6 week old pups begin catching their own insects so the summer maternity colonies begin to disperse, males start to attract females (some 'sing') and may move to mating roosts. September and October are dedicated to feeding up and mating:

the females mate with several males, only the sperm from the last one being used. https://www.bats.org.uk/about-bats/a-year-in-the-life-of-a-bat.

All UK bats are insect eaters and even tiny pipistrelles can eat up to 3000 midges per night – what's not to love? To attract bats to your garden you need to attract their food and flowers that release their scent in the evening are a great way of attracting moths. https://www.wildlifetrusts.org/actions/how-attract-moths-and-bats-your-garden.

Since 2010 John has been studying Leisler's bats in the Cree Valley and Glen Trool near Newton Stewart in Dumfries & Galloway. The study involved catching individuals in high mist nets then, if not a juvenile or pregnant female, a tiny radio transmitter with aerial was glued on to a shaved patch between the bat's shoulder blades. The battery is the size and weight limiter and 0.35 to 0.45 g meets the guideline of <5% of the animal's body weight. Batteries last ~10 days but may fall off or, during mutual grooming, they could be removed or the aerial chewed! Each transmitter has a different frequency, tracked by hand-held aerials. Each transmitter costs £150 and very few are retrieved, so it is expensive data. The transmitter aerial lies along the back of the bat and the detected signal strength varies with orientation so also gives information on the bat's activity and flight path.

In addition to identifying where bats were roosting and feeding, it was shown that Leisler's bats are widespread in SW Scotland and Northern Island but not in the east where they are replaced by noctules. Old trees with suitable holes or slits are preferred which generally means not pines although an old Norway Spruce with a suitable crevice was used in Culzean Country Park. However, if suitable old trees aren't available then bats can turn to buildings with suitable undisturbed warm locations. Likely places are shown in https://www.bats. org.uk/advice/living-with-bats/ where-might-bats-be-roosting-in-myproperty.

If you think you have bats, don't panic: they are small, don't bite or get tangled in your hair! For advice,

Phytophthora ramorum update

Felling in Coilhallan to remove infected larch trees has progressed well. The harvesting team has also tackled the regeneration of invasive species and managed to retain the majority of the native and hardwood species. The trails will reopen once timber extraction has finished after December. This coupe is due for restocking in 2025 when it will be replanted with broadleaves. Once the felling work is finished there will be some thinning to open up the canopy in the wood.

An infection at Runacraig, south of Strathyre has been confirmed and a work plan is being developed. The removal of infected trees near the Falls of Leny, adjacent to the A84 is proving challenging as the terrain here is very steep.

We will aim to update our webpages with any works which impact on our trails, car parks and visitor sites and appreciate your understanding during this time.
