

On page 5 of this issue, we give details of the upcoming AGM of the Callander Community Development Trust (CCDT). Many of you may not be fully aware of what the CCDT does and the important role they have in supporting projects that benefit the town and its environs. I read the article on page 7, about the Callander Community Hydro Scheme, with great interest. I didn't know that it was the first and largest fully community developed hydro scheme in Scotland. It's even more impressive when you consider it was proposed and established primarily by local volunteers and its ongoing maintenance is also performed by local volunteers. The list of local projects that it has given financial support to is lengthy. It's also great that it's a renewable source of energy given the climate crisis that we are currently in. The incidence of diseased trees in local forests is disappointedly large. Great swathes of trees have been cut down south of Coilhallan towards Cock Hill. Callander Community Council Update

Over the last couple of months, Callander Community Councillors have been settling into their new roles and starting to build the team. The role of the Community Council is not always known, so over the next few months we hope to update you on the work we do for the community.

As in previous years, David Shearer continues to monitor our community roads and pavements to ensure Stirling Council and Transport Scotland keep them in good order for the residents and visitors. He has now been joined in this by Robert McLean, who has been very useful in identifying accessibility issues. This year, with the weather having been so unpredictable, the hedges have grown massively so many of the issues reported by the community to David or Robert, as well as problems they have noted whilst walking round town, have been to do with overgrown bushes and trees restricting access and visibility. We are hoping this autumn to see some progress on upgrading the Main Street pavements, but we are still awaiting a final date. In the meantime, the drop kerbs are being improved along Stirling Road.

Our Planning sub-group has been busy reviewing local development plans alongside comments from residents. We also have representatives on the Callander Flooding Group and their activities are reported elsewhere in the BLV.

Other activities have included a joint meeting with the Development Trust on the Local Place Plan (LPP), at which we looked at possible solutions to issues identified by the community, such as how to establish a community hub, where local information could be disseminated in a format that was available to everyone. We have been following up options on this and hope to have definite news about it later in the year. In the meantime, we are investigating the use of a shop window to display local information on the progress of local plans, organisations and events, to provide a one-stop shop for 'Current Callander News'.

National Park

t is just over 12 months since the election for the National Park Board. This is a brief outline of what the Board has been involved in during that time.

After the first few months, where there were numerous briefings and training days, the work has settled down to a steady stream of commitments, including regular Board Meetings, Committee meetings, consultations and reviews. These cover the entire Park area but there are always opportunities to promote the role of Callander in the Park.

For Callander, there was the construction of the new Bracklinn Falls Bridge, funded by the National Park, which received a Gold Award at the Scottish Design Awards 2023. The year has also seen the completion of the Callander Landscape Partnership, with the National Park being the lead public body. The Callander South Masterplan is currently being updated by the National Park following a recent public consultation and this will give a framework for further developments south of the river. There has also been a consultation on the Callander Strategic Tourism Infrastructure Development, a study to look at improvements and new developments in the town and surrounding area. The Park has recently published its Partnership Plan for the next five years and within that is a commitment to a local National Park centre in the East of the Park, hopefully back in Callander.

As well as quarterly Board meetings, there are monthly Planning Committee meetings to handle major planning applications. When required, the Local Review Body deals with planning application appeals and the Futures Committee meets to take a strategic long term look at issues in the Park.

On the Board there are five community elected members from the five Wards. We have a good working relationship, and all promote the involvement of communities in all new developments. The community members are crucial in Board decisions, bringing local knowledge about a place and the people who live there. It is still very satisfying to see the role of the community members, as it was during the establishment of the Park, over 20 years ago, that Callander Community Council was instrumental in getting these seats on the Board.

As well as providing a quiet area for much of our 1-1 and small group work, the space is being trialled on Mondays after school as an open drop-in for S1-3 pupils. Our thanks to the Robert McAlpine Foundation, Awards for All and the Stafford Trust for funding this renovation.

More Recognition for CYP!

CYP has recently been assessed by the University of Stirling's Dementia Services Development Centre for its provision of an environment suitable for the particular needs of age-related users and / or those living with a disability.

The assessment was carried out on behalf of the Craigard Club who meet weekly in CYP and sing its praises, as do other local groups, and also visitors who book the high quality accommodation in its pods.

The assessment examined six awareness categories. How CYP:

- promotes ability (signs, space, furniture)
- helps clients maintain independence and personal identity (access, navigation, doors)
- provides for carers' requirements (furniture, space, environment)
- becomes familiar for clients (function, orientation, comfort)
- promotes interactions with others (access, training, social)
- accommodates preferences (ighting, acoustics, space)

The building provides a safe venue in the function room, looking out to welldesigned and maintained gardens with seating areas. There is easy access from the street and from the car park with blue badge parking space, the doors are wide enough to accommodate wheelchair access, a ramp with rail leads from ground level to the function room, and toilet provision is excellent.

Staff are professional in the services they offer, and adapt to individual requirements with ease. They are quick to react to instances where physical help, emotional support and practical assistance are required.

The Craigard Club is delighted that its assessment submission has been successful. CYP is now a Stirling University accredited Environment for Ageing and Dementia Design.

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Generating Cash for Callander

A conversation in the pub on a rainy day led to a group of locals building a hydro-electricity scheme that now generates cash for projects to benefit Callander.

The 425-kilowatt Callander Community Hydro Scheme, the first and largest fully community developed hydro scheme in Scotland, is in Stank Glen above Loch Lubnaig. It is a run-off-river scheme, in which water is diverted from a river, piped down to the generating



turbine then returned to the river. It cost £1.65m to build and is expected to earn £3m over its first 20 years. It will continue to generate electricity after this, but the Government subsidy (feed-in tariff or FIT) will end and income will be reduced.

It has been generating electricity since September 2014 and has consistently performed ahead of forecasts with very few periods of dry weather affecting energy production. In its first summer alone, it produced four times its predicted output for July.

Callander Community Development Trust owns the scheme and allocates the profits to projects and activities that will benefit the people and community of Callander. Recently it set up a hardship fund in partnership with Stirling Citizens Advice Bureau to support some of our most vulnerable residents. Around £50,000 a year also goes to the Callander Community Hydro Fund. Anyone can apply to the fund – the important thing is that projects should benefit Callander.

Since late 2015, more than £350,000 has been drawn down from the Community Hydro Fund to support a wide range of projects, from festivals and youth work to hanging baskets and toilet refurbs. Many have attracted significant match funding from other sources to benefit Callander.

Here are just a few of the projects that the fund has enabled:

- · Camp Place playpark improvements
- Callander's annual Jazz & Blues Festival
- Callander Landscape Partnership
- Callander Covid Response Group support and meals to vulnerable residents
- Stirling Citizens Advice Bureau outreach worker in Callander since 2017
- Indoor soft play in community-run McLaren Leisure Centre
- · Christmas lights in Ancaster Square
- Callander Youth Project youth club activities and fully accessible glamping pod
- McLaren High School Pipe Band coaching
- Greener Callander floral displays and community garden
- · Craigard Club lunch club for elderly residents
- Primary School playground benches and outdoor gym equipment

Frank Park, Chairman of Callander Community Hydro Ltd and Callander Community Development Trust, said, "It all started back in 2008 with a conversation in the pub about harnessing the rain for the benefit of Callander.

"A small group of volunteers, set up in 2010, spent the next few years measuring river flow, sourcing loans, agreeing contracts with the bank and Forestry & Land Scotland's predecessor (the landowner), completing more than 30 studies, getting planning permission then appointing a project manager, technical specialists and a hydro construction company. In the warm sunny summer of 2014, the scheme was completed within four months.

"We were determined to pay back the loans that would limit the funds available as soon as possible. So, we're very pleased to have paid off more than half of the 15-year loans already."

The hydro scheme is maintained by another team of trained volunteers who regularly go up to the site to check that everything is working as it should. It's thanks to all of these local people that funds are now able to support so many community projects.

Obituary - Susan Holden -

October 1941 to July 2023

After a long illness, borne with dignity and fortitude, Susan Holden, the previous Chair of Callander Community Council passed away on 21st July 2023. Her funeral on 18th August was held at Stirling Crematorium and online, followed by refreshments at Callander Youth Project. Friends and colleagues from all round her world of publishing attended via the Internet link and family, friends and many of her Callander colleagues came in person to say their farewells.

Her professional role as a leading figure in the world of English as a Second Language was significant, as many of her friends and colleagues testified, but few of us in Callander were aware of her eminence in this field as she was a private and modest person.

Whether she was working professionally or as part of a community organisation, she was very focussed and took the same care and consideration in all that she did.

For Callander, she led the Community Council from October 2020 to April 2023 when the previous CC stood down. As Chair, she held the CC together during the time of COVID lockdown, when numbers had dropped below the standard number required for a CC to function.

She was an active director of Callander Community Development Trust from January 2017 until her death and instigated the joint meetings to improve communication between these two key organisations in town, all for the betterment of the local community. She will be much missed.

I will miss her wicked sense of humour, delivered with a sparkle in her eye and her ability to always see the funny side of things.

Callander Community brings a little sparkle to the Primary School Playground

t started as a throwaway comment that it would be nice to brighten up the Primary School playground and ended up as a wonderful community project that has brought endless smiles to the children at the school.

With the new Primary School building firmly on the agenda, it was easy to overlook our existing playground which had become a little tired due to weather and wear. There was a drainage issue that was causing much of the space available to become unusable. It also meant that much of the wooden play equipment had become rotten. Overall, the playground was in need of a bit of an upgrade but with only two years to go until the new school became a reality it was hard to justify a large scale renovation.

Fortunately for our young learners, Emma King had a vision and rallied an extraordinarily supportive Community to bring the much needed 'spruce up' to reality.

Emma works with young people and has lots of experience of making outdoor spaces fun and engaging. She designed a plan that would cater for all ages and make playtimes fun. However, resources were needed, and funds were tight.





A 'Go Fund Me' page was set up and within hours hundreds of pounds had been raised. Parents, teachers, local businesses and even family members who live far from Callander all contributed to a fund which ultimately reached over £2,000.

The gravel and bark to solve the drainage issue was generously donated by Cambusmore Estate. So, we had the vision and the resources now!

The implementation was led by parents Michael King and Steven Dunion, along with the team from Cambusmore Estate and a group of very enthusiastic parents.

If you happened to walk by the playground during the summer holidays you would likely see diggers, tractors, wheelbarrows and a paintbrush or two being put to good use.

It was a joy to watch the new playground emerge. The process brought together families, friends and a few dogs too and many new friendships were formed. Although the extent of the hard work could hardly be quantified, we lost count of how many hours had been spent after we got over 300!

The reward really came on the first day of school when we saw how the children chose to play in their new environment. Emma's ideas have brought out many opportunities for the children and their smiling faces and reluctance to leave the playground at the end of the day speak of the great success it has been.

The children have their own opinions, of course, and we asked some of them to tell us what the playground means to them:

Callander Woodland Group update



n the last BLV there was an article from Forestry and Land Scotland about larch trees infected by Phytophthora Ramorum, explaining that once the disease has been confirmed, they have only a short time to fell infected trees and others in the surrounding area. Unfortunately, Coilhallan had infected trees confirmed in July and it is very obvious that felling started early in September. It is expected to continue to the end of the year. While larch felling is underway, non-native trees like Sitka Spruce will also be removed. This amounts to a large proportion of trees from the west end of Coilhallan and access to the

car park and paths will be restricted – see photo map below.

This will have a dramatic visual impact with the loss of so many tall trees but, trying to be positive, it will open up amazing views and the wood will be re-planted with mixed broadleaves and conifers with an emphasis on native species.

In September, thinning to re-space self-seeded trees happened at both west and east ends of the wood as part of general woodland management for healthy trees. It currently looks very messy

but the felled wood will provide some wildlife habitat and, as the wood rots down, it will support insects and their predators.

This disruption is limiting where the woodland group can work, but we are hoping to start clearing out the arboretum enclosures so that the trees representing the five continents will become visible and eventually form part of a tree trail. Of course, how much we can do depends on how many volunteers we get. If you are interested and willing to get 'stuck in' then please get in touch on callanderwoodlandgroup@gmail.com.

COOK'S CORNER by Audrey Corrieri

Butternut Squash, Ginger and Garlic Soup

Serves 4

INGREDIENTS

- 1 butternut squash, peeled, deseeded and diced
- 1 litre vegetable stock
- · 1 tbsp crushed garlic (fresh cloves)
- 2 tbsp crushed ginger (fresh root)
- Seasoning
- Cream and sprigs of flat-leaf parsley

METHOD

Put the squash, stock, garlic and ginger into a large saucepan.

Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer for about 15 mins until the squash is soft and tender.

Transfer to a food processor and whizz until smooth, or use a handheld blender.

Return to the pan, reheat. Season with salt and pepper.

Serve in bowls, finished with a swirl of cream and sprig of parsley.


equally importantly, it raised awareness of the work that Start Up Stirling does in supporting those



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Andrew (Andy) Anderson 1935 - 2023

Andrew, Andy, Dad or Papa was born on the 8th of April, 1935 in Balniel, near Colinsburgh, Fife. Brought up in Kilbrackmount, he went to the local Primary School. He could recall, at the age of 6, watching the German Luftwaffe bombers flying over in 1941. No doubt en route to bomb Clydebank.

Secondary school was Wade Academy in Arncroach, where Mum also attended.

One week short of his 15th birthday in 1950, Dad left school and initially worked on a farm. He then got an apprenticeship, with Dobbies in Largoward, as a joiner and wheelwright. He loved going to the dancing at weekends where he began to compete for Mum's eye. During this time he decided to cycle around the North of Scotland, some of it with his uncle, staying in hostels or camping as they went. He would send Mum the occasional postcard. The courtship had begun.

Mum moved to Callander from Fife in 1956, Dad coming up to visit. They got engaged at Christmas 1957 and married in St Kessog's Church, Callander, on 29th March, 1958. Mum was 21 and Dad 22. Their marriage was to last 63 years. They started their family in 1963, completing it 4 children later in 1969.

Dad worked with Ingram's Joiners from 1958 to 1969. In 1969, with £12 cash in hand and Mum by his side he started his own business as a Joiner and Glazier. His first workshop was behind Cameron's Hardware, Main Street.

Later he purchased his own workshop on North Ancaster Square. It was there that he started chatting to Johnny Duncanson and when Johnny retired Dad took over the funeral side of his business. Andrew Anderson & Sons expanded. As a Joiner/Glazier dad worked all over, acting as a man contractor for larger jobs. He also trained many lads as apprentice joiners. Many went on to have successful businesses themselves.

As if that wasn't enough, Dad was also a part-time fire officer, gaining his 20 years' service medal on retiral from the service in 1987. You would always know when Dad was driving the fire engine. He was the one with the lit cigar hanging from the side of his mouth!

His first hearse was a second-hand Volvo Estate which he resprayed black and made the wooden platform for inside. This hearse was in a BBC documentary programme 'Voyager' which was shown on a Sunday night. Dad spent all day up at Trossachs Church filming a burial scene. One Sunday night we sat down to watch his claim to fame – it lasted 20 seconds! No Hollywood for Dad.



When he did have spare time Dad enjoyed bowling. As a member of Callander Bowling Club for many years he won the Championship, and was also President of the club on several occasions.

Working side by side with Mum, Dad worked very hard to build up an excellent family service to Callander and the surrounding area. It didn't matter what time of day people called; Dad would be there to help when they needed him most. He took time with them to listen about their loved one's life. Time did not matter.

As young children, and into our teens, family holidays were spent caravanning in Scarborough or Great Yarmouth, where lots of fun was had and great memories made. Their first holiday abroad in 1987 gave Mum and Dad the bug for travelling and they were fortunate to have many holidays all over – visiting 19 States of the USA as part of them. Latterly, Dad was happy going to Dornoch, Thurso, Ullapool and doing the NC500 (with a quick 1-day trip to Orkney). Sitting back in the car telling us stories of the roads he had travelled as a young lad on his bicycle or of the people he had helped when their loved ones had passed.

He learned to bake at the age of 85, Facetiming my sister Tracy in the USA each week, enabling her to spend quality time with him from afar. He would watch cookery shows and then provide interesting dinners for my two girls when they stayed over each week. We reckon he thought he was one of the Hairy Bikers. (continued on Page 24)

When Mum and Dad retired at the age of 78 and 79, Dad took on the role of carer. When Mum passed away in 2020 he missed her terribly but put on a brave face, how could he not miss her after 65 years together? During Lockdown my daughter Kirsty stayed with her Papa and the antics and laughter will stay with her forever.

Dad was a very hard working, kind and caring person with many stories that could fill a book. He would always give you his best. He has helped so many families over the years. Many letters, old and new, prove to us what he has done.

They made many friends from all over, touching many hearts with their kindness. In their home of 54 years, many a party was had with friends and family.

Dad's legacy of hard work, respectfulness, honesty and generosity will never be forgotten as he has instilled them into us and his grandchildren. He was extremely proud of Ross carrying on the family business and knew he would continue to do so.

We wish him eternal peace back with his beloved Nancy and as a family we will continue to 'Stand Sure'.

We are very proud to say he was our Dad/Papa. He is our hero and legend and will never be forgotten.

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





Book club review

his issue's book review title is Young Mungo by Douglas Stuart (Piccador: 2022)



It seems only yesterday, I wrote a review for *Shuggie Bain*, the 2020 Booker Prize winning title, and debut novel, by Douglas Stuart. It was a great first book. So much so, I felt nervous when I saw his new novel just a couple of vears later.

I didn't want to do a comparative

review, although there are so many similarities between Mungo and Shuggie. The location is Glasgow, it's the early 1990s. The children of a dysfunctional family struggle with poverty, an addict mother and an absent father. In society's hierarchy, we're below the lowest of the working class. Stuart, again, has written about what he knows.

Mungo is the youngest of three siblings living in chaotic circumstances with their alcoholic mother (Mo-Maw). His older brother, Hamish, insists that Mungo joins him for gratuitous violence against gangs in surrounding streets, whilst his sister, Jodie, tries to give Mungo love and stability. Particularly when Mo-Maw disappears on another of her three-day benders.

Mungo loves his mother deeply, despite the chaos and her neglect of the family. He is a sensitive boy and as he approaches his mid-teens, his otherness becomes more and more stark. Yet, his surroundings won't

allow him to explore this. Until he meets a boy, James, who Mungo recognises as different. James spends hours in a doocot he built near their housing scheme and is an expert pigeon fancier. The boys fall in love and plan to escape this life once Mungo turns sixteen.

I very much enjoyed Young Mungo. Stuart is a great talent and an important writer, bringing to the fore the complexity of working-class communities. His writing can be quite beautiful and is highly readable. Whilst the timeline did get a bit confusing, this is a minor gripe. Mostly there is humour, tenderness and even optimism between the poverty, doom and despair. No spoilers, but expect some dark turns and a shocking finale. I'll leave it there.



A Visit to His Majesty's Prison & Young Offender Institution, Stirling the way forward.

rom the moment we entered the spacious reception area at the new facility which has replaced HMP & YOI Cornton Vale, there was an atmosphere of hope. It simply did not feel like a prison. Yet this is to be the home of a hundred women with a custodial sentence who present the most challenging and complex needs/ risk to the public. Some may spend a considerable time in residence here.




The strategy of the facility, which has been a decade or more in establishment, is based on rehabilitation, is trauma informed, gender specific and reflects the needs and risks for the vulnerable women held in custody. It works in collaboration with healthcare partners, the criminal justice system, social work and the family help hub to assess needs and change the life opportunities for all the women held in Stirling.

Decorated in calm colours, with an emphasis on the natural world, the building has lots of glass, with natural light, outside views and is built around a central outdoor space with grass and trees and recreational areas. There are no bars on any windows, no gates, and the security system around the perimeter fence and within the buildings is discreet. However, it is a prison, and women are locked in

their rooms overnight and for an hour at the end of the day. Apart from that, there is a full programme of education and activities, where the women may learn and gain useful qualifications to use upon their release and they also socialise in an atmosphere of safety and relative normality.

The individual bedrooms are in different sized blocks, where women live according to their personal progress and incorporate an open communal space for each group of rooms. There are also 'safe' rooms for women at risk of self harm and accessible rooms for disabled residents. The blocks are all named after Scottish flowers, chosen for their meanings by the present residents of the old prison: Thistle, Myrtle, Wintergreen, Begonia, Iris, Heather, Bluebell and Primrose. There is an assessment unit and a mother and baby unit, where a baby may remain with his/her mother for up to a year.

Technology at the prison is state of the art, with facilities for virtual court hearings, parole hearings and case conferences. Reception for incoming prisoners includes an non-invasive scanning system for body searches and secure holding areas for distressed or aggressive women.





A sad fact within the prison system is the lack of visitors for women. Often mothers do not want their children coming to a prison environment, and male partners are less likely to visit. To address this, the new building has a really welcoming visiting area, with comfy seating and a play area for children. It all feels more like a cafe setting, though obviously security is maintained. There are plans to have social events to encourage families to visit in the future. Virtual visits are also available, soon to be available from the privacy of the room.

All in all, this is a very special project and there can be much rejoicing on its completion, albeit somewhat later than planned! It would seem that it offers much potential to turn around damaged lives, prevent re-offending and end dangerous cycles of abuse for the women who find themselves there.


