Talking of the surrounding area, I am delighted to see that the life-line C60 Bus Service to and from Killin has been given a 2-year reprieve by Stirling Council. The need to maintain and indeed improve public transport was strongly supported by the Community in the Local Place Plan and it is hoped that this can now be built on and perhaps expanded.

This is also the time of year when the myriad of voluntary organisations with which Callander is blessed seem to become more active and this is evidenced by the number of articles in the Community and Sports sections. Outside of that, the town has a real connection with St Kessogs, and the article and Call to Action on page 9 sets out a potential way forward.

#### New Seed Library Blooms in Callander Connect



A new project to support local gardeners and growers has taken root in Callander Connect. The Seed Library, managed by 'Climate Action Callander' and built by 'Wolf in the Trees', offers residents of Callander free access to a collection of seeds and gardening information. This project is generously funded by the 'FEL Climate Seed Fund'.

The Seed Library features drawers filled with alphabetically organized seeds, inviting the community to add, swap, and take seeds at no cost. You are encouraged to bring unused seeds to exchange for varieties you prefer. The library also provides several books and growing guides packed with valuable tips, covering everything from sowing schedules to plant care and harvesting techniques.

The creation of the seed library itself promotes climate friendly practices and reuse and circular economies. Here's a wee story about it from maker Gavin (Wolf in the Trees):

'The seed library was all made from recycled materials. The wood came from various places including an old bed frame, a neighbour's old garage shelving and some recycled wooden pallets. What a good way to create

#### **Callander Community Council Roundup**

The new Callander Community Council (CCC) surgeries on the first and third Saturdays' each month at Callander Connect are proving to be useful and have raised some interesting points for us to follow up on. It gives the community councillors a chance to talk to local people about the issues of the day and what particularly needs attention in the town.

Of course, one of the main issues is St Kessog's and we have a sub-group working on that. Stirling Council intends to sell St Kessog's and our group meets with them to try to establish details of the sale and any limitations on the use of the building. Detailed information is awaited. Meanwhile, the group is looking to put a financially viable project together to ensure that the building remains our icon in the centre of the town and will be chasing Stirling Council to ensure they maintain St Kessog's.

Last time we reported on the four priority projects which members of CCC and Callander Community Development Trust (CCDT) are jointly working on with a member of the community.

Regeneration of Main Street respect the Charrette – has already been in action which has resulted in a survey, the initial results of which were discussed at the last meeting of Callander Enterprise and other business owners in Main Street. Main requests were help with painting, and some repairs with cleaning the street furniture seen as other helpful improvements. Transport Scotland has been approached for the date when the pavements are due to be upgraded as the original date was last autumn. To maintain the current green spaces Greener Callander needs a much larger and younger volunteer base since Stirling Council has announced that flower beds will no longer be maintained by them. We have relatively few now – Greener Callander does all the rest, but cannot manage anything further.

Finally, Callander Community Council would love to have more councillors on board, particularly younger members of the community. We understand that with working and managing a

#### C60 is Safe for now

Stirling Council has agreed to launch an in-house pilot bus service to replace the C60 service between Killin and Callander for the next two years.

A 16-seat minibus will operate four return journeys from Monday to Saturday between Killin and Callander for an initial two-year pilot period. It will follow the same route as the C60 service, passing through communities such Strathyre, Lochearnhead and Lix Toll along the A84.

The new service will start as soon as the required permit is granted by the Office of the Traffic Commissioner, which can take up to eight weeks.

Councillors agreed to the decision from a suite of costed options that included not providing a service (given it's not a statutory service), retendering the service for a third time to external providers and exploring a Demand Responsive Transport (DRT) provision.

#### Trial Callander-Aberfoyle Bus Announced

News is just in that the National Park Authority has announced a new bus route between Callander and Aberfoyle.

The service is planned to run between July and September and will stop at a number of busy visitor locations including The Lodge, Ben Venue, Loch Katrine, Ben A'an, Brig O'Turk and Kilmahog/Ben Ledi.

It will run seven days a week, up to eight services a day and will tie into bus services to and from Stirling and Glasgow, as well as the Loch Katrine boat timetables. Ticket prices will be fair and in line with national policies, under 22s and over 60s will travel free.

"We hope this will be just a first step in developing a more comprehensive National Park mobility network over time, which will deliver part of our new National Park Partnership Plan vision for the National Park as a thriving place that is nature positive and carbon negative" **NPA**

## Saving St. Kessogs: A Callander Community Call to Action

For centuries, St. Kessog's Church has stood as the heart of Callander, embodying our town's rich history and serving as a central hub for generations. However, in recent years, this iconic landmark has been closed, its future uncertain. Now, more than ever, your help is needed to save and revitalise St. Kessog's, ensuring it remains a vibrant part of our community.

#### A Historical Gem

St. Kessogs' origins trace back to the grounds of St. Kessog's Graveyard, where the original kirk was said to have been founded by St. Kessaig. The church has seen many transformations since the 1700s, with significant expansions and renovations over the years. Its iconic spire, added in 1860 by Robert Baldie, is a beloved feature of Callander's skyline, symbolizing the town's identity.

In 1985, St. Bride's Church and St. Kessog's Church amalgamated, leading to the closure of St. Kessog's as a place of worship. Ownership transferred to Stirling District Council in 1989. A government grant allowed the building to be converted into a tourist information centre and small cinema. When the tourist board moved out due to funding difficulties, Stirling Council offered to sell the building to the Clanranald Trust (for Stirling). However, due to disputes in closing and a burst water pipe, this deal fell through, and the building has stood vacant since 2018.

#### The Heart of Callander

St. Kessog's has been more than just a building. It has been the site of countless weddings, baptisms, and community gatherings. Its presence in Ancaster Square is a constant reminder of our shared heritage. However, without action, we risk losing this vital part of our town.

Callander, known as the Gateway to the Highlands, has the potential to be an idyllic place to live—a modern-day Camelot. But such a vision requires care and dedication from its residents. We need to come together to save St. Kessogs, making it a beacon of our community spirit once again.

#### **The Current Challenge**

Stirling Council has announced its intention to sell St. Kessog's. With an estimated £998K needed for refurbishment, the price tag may seem daunting. However, there are still avenues to explore. For instance, the Stirling and Clackmannanshire City Region Deal includes £700K funding for a digital hub in Callander, which could cover a significant portion of the refurbishment costs.

Despite the challenges, we believe that preserving St. Kessog's transcends mere financial considerations. It's about safeguarding the soul of our community.

#### **Callander Heritage Society**

#### "The Journey to the Asylum"

**O**ur March speaker was Dr Iain Hutchison who gave us a sobering account on a challenging yet thought-provoking subject.

Before the mid 19th Century there was no formal treatment for those suffering from mental illness. Treatment varied depending on status in society and the type of illness. Most towns and villages had one, or more than one, 'Village Idiot', some known for making pithy statements, some for behaving in very strange ways but generally tolerated by the residents. If they caused too much disruption they were shut up in the local Poor House which had a lunacy ward or put in prison. Here they were subjected to pretty awful treatment.

Families of wealthier people who suffered from mental illness were embarrassed by them and hid them away. If they could afford it there were privately owned madhouses where patients were looked after but there were no controls and treatment varied. Some asylums even allowed visitors in to look at the inmates.

In 1857 a network of asylums were set up. They were hidden away on the outskirts of towns or out in the country. For the rich they were a holiday in the country. For the poor the accommodation and food was basic.

#### "Ways out of the Glen – Roads, Raids and Refuge in the Glencoe Landscape"

At our April meeting, Dr. Michael Given from Glasgow University gave a fascinating insight into findings from recent excavations in Glencoe.

A team from Glasgow University has carried out a year long programme of excavations and surveys in Glencoe and Dr. Given shared some of their findings. The A82 is the main road through the glen. It follows the route of the old Military Road, built after the Jacobite Rebellions to allow the army to move quickly from Fort William to quell troublesome clans. This road follows tracks made over centuries allowing movement from central Scotland to the West coast and the Islands for trading and/or fighting.

However, there were lots of other tracks into and out of the glen, used in different ways. Many tracks led from the bottom of the glen up to the sheilings where the animals were summered to leave the good land for crop growing. There were paths to the places where peats were cut then carried back for use as fuel. There were tracks over the passes to neighbouring glens. Useful for raiding neighbouring clans and bringing back the spoils. Of course, these worked in reverse as well and were used by the neighbouring clans to raid the Macdonalds. The pass over from Glen Etive was a Coffin Road. At the highest There were no activities and some patients were permanently shackled to their beds. Sometimes inmates were abandoned by their relatives.

Stirling District Asylum, was established at Bellsdyke, Larbert in 1869. An inspection in 1879 found it well run but were worried that pauper lunatics were being cared for too expensively. The asylum had 70 acres of land where inmates could help with growing food for the kitchen, and 20 acres for social activities – gardening, games, walks.

By the 1900s more attempts were being made to treat the inmates and help some to recover. By 1948 improved medicines were being used to help control illness. Over time asylums closed and treatment became hospital based.



point are the cairns where the coffin was rested on its way to the Macdonald burial ground on Eilean Munde in Loch Leven. Tracks across Rannoch Moor were used by cattle drovers. There was good grazing on parts of the moor. There were also good hiding places where the Macdonalds could ambush the drovers, steal cattle and hide them to be sold later on.

From his house at Achtriochtan, Maclain could control movement through the glen. When the group excavated the ruin of the house they found it had been a fairly large stone built house with stone flags on the floor and a fireplace in the end wall. Family and favoured guests were seated near the fire and warmth. The farther from the fire the less important you were. Many pieces of pottery were found, aome made in Scotland, others from Germany and France eg. Bartmann jugs and a Beauvais vase. These showed trade between Scotland and Europe. Under the hearthstone of the fire a pot, containing a number of gold and silver coins from all over Britain and Europe, was discovered. The premise is that Maclain hid the coins when the Government troops were billeted with him before the Massacre of Glencoe. MacIain was killed during the Massacre of 1692 and his house set on fire.

No one who knew the location of the horde survived and so it lay unclaimed until its discovery in 2023. The Horde is to be displayed in Glencoe Folk Museum.

Our next meeting is on June 26th when Dr. Murray Cook will talk on the Kilmadock Pictish Stone.

There are no meetings in July or August. Talks resume in September.

#### **Rotary in Callander**


The club has held two successful fund raising events since the last report.

#### **Butterfly Conservation**

Butterfly Conservation is a UK-wide charity covering the Conservation of butterflies, moths and their environment. Founded in 1968, it now has over 40,000 members, thousands of volunteers and David Attenborough as President! In addition to practical conservation and promotion of scientific studies, it encourages public enjoyment of butterflies and moths.

Butterflies and moths belong to an order of winged insects called Lepidoptera whose three main features are scales that cover the body, large triangular wings and a proboscis for siphoning nectars. Worldwide there are 180,000 species of which 59 butterfly species are resident or regular migrants in the UK with just 35 breeding in Scotland. However, let's not ignore moths which can be equally beautiful and the UK has over 2500!



Over the last 50 years there has been a 50% decline in UK butterflies, especially the habitat specialists. For example the Common Blue butterfly needs flower-rich grassland with Bird's-foot Trefoil, but 38% of suitable sites have been lost in the last 50 years in Scotland. However, in Scotland the wider countryside species are actually increasing, possibly due to climate change. For example, Orange-Tip numbers have doubled in the last 10 years while the Wall Brown, Holly Blue and Small Skipper were said to be 'romping' up the east coast.

Larger (macro) moths have also declined by 30% since the 1970's across the UK although their northern movement is increasing by 5km per year, especially woodland and grassland species – known from the 24 million moth records from research scientists and volunteers.

The causes of decline in overall insect numbers are familiar: agricultural intensification (including pesticides), woodland management changes, climate change, light pollution and rural and urban habitat loss. The UK has lost 98% of flower-rich meadows, 200,000 miles of hedgerow and 40% of broadleaved woodlands, including 20 million Elm trees and more species now under threat.



So why is it important to conserve butterflies and moths? Both have an important role in ecosystems and the food chain of many birds, small mammals and amphibians both day and night. They are specialists in pollination of wildflowers and crops that need a long proboscis or that flower at night. For example many orchid species rely on moths for pollination.

So what is Butterfly Conservation doing to stop or reverse this decline? It works with farmers and local authorities on a landscape-scale to restore habitats, protects the most important sites, encourages species reintroductions, provides gardening advice for homes and councils, creates new wild spaces in towns and cities, promotes the joy of butterflies and moths, educates children through 'Munching Caterpillars' and supports volunteers to monitor species.

To focus resources, Butterfly Conservation's strategy for 2021-26 will concentrate on 5 butterfly species, 13 macro-moth species and 9 micro-moth species, working across 19 landscapes. In central Scotland and Stirlingshire the landscapes are "Central Scotland Peatlands" and "Loch Katrine". In order to help these species they will be finding out more about what some species need, carrying out more surveys and monitoring, testing and undertaking management.

Cheesy Lentil Lasagne Serves 4

#### Ingredients

400g cottage cheese

Oil

2 onions, finely chopped

2 red peppers, deseeded and finely diced

3 cloves of garlic, crushed

380g passata

400g can chopped tomatoes

2 tsp balsamic vinegar

4tsp dried oregano

2 carrots, grated

2x 400g cans puy or green lentils

8 dried lasagne sheets

20g fresh parmesan cheese,grated

#### Method

Preheat oven to 200°C, 180°C Fan, Gas no 6

Put cottage cheese into a food processor, whiz until smooth, season, set aside.

In a non-stick frying pan heat a little oil over a medium heat. Stir fry the onions, peppers and garlic for 6-8 mins until softened.Add the passata,tomatoes,vinegar and half the oregano.Season and simmer for 10 mins.Take the pan off the heat and stir in the carrots and lentils. Spoon half the lentil mixture into the base of a deep baking dish and top with 4 lasagne sheets.Spoon over the remaining lentil mixture, then top with 4 lasagne sheets.Pour over the cottage cheese, evenly scatter over the parmesan and top with the leftover oregano.

Bake for 35mins or until golden and bubbling. Serve.

The light hearted side of young life and later marriage is well presented by Emma Fraser as Carrie Pipperidge. She handled her romantic idealism for Mr Snow confidently. Her enthusiasm in singing 'Mr Snow' and her comic



intentions, signified to us by the caressing of his knife. The more optimistic side of life is presented by Angela Dickinson in the role of Netty Fowler. She caught the busy, common sense nature of Nettie in her singing of 'June is Bustin' Out All Over', in the organisation of the picnic and also in compassion as she treated us to the well sung and emotional 'You'll Never Walk Alone'.

Other principals presented capably, such as John Isgrove as the strait-laced Enoch Snow and Charlotte Wood as the envious and vindictive carousel owner, Mrs Mullins. #### **Book Review**

his issue's book review title is Karma: My Autobiography by Boy George (Blink

#### Publishing, 2023)

I'm not a big reader of autobiographies, however, I was drawn to *Karma* out of curiosity. As probably one of the most well-known faces, certainly in the UK (dare I say worldwide) it seemed astonishing that Boy George (born George Alan O'Dowd in 1961) had reached 62 years old before writing an autobiography. It turns out he had already written one in 1995, but nearly 30 years on, he argues that people, perspectives and values can all radically change.

Boy George describes his youth as chaotic and this certainly comes across, as the book moves messily through his early family and school life during the 1970s. O'Dowd was part of a large family with several siblings. They accepted his idiosyncrasies and blatant gay sexuality at a time when society really did not.

Becoming famous was never a question of 'if', but 'when'. Most folk of a certain age will recall Boy George's first appearance on Top of The Pops in 1982, as lead singer to band Culture Club. O'Dowd recalls the derogatory media frenzy after that appearance. From there on, the media onslaught never really relented. Whilst Culture Club came and went (splitting up by 1986, although they have since reformed twice), Boy George has remained a fixation of the British media and a constant in public life.

*Karma* recounts O'Dowd's difficult years of drug-addiction, arrests in the US and Britain, and a stint in prison. The book is definitely entertaining, although the chapters, crammed full of names, events and venues could be hard to follow. His stint on *I'm a Celebrity* is funny and insightful, whilst describing the recent death of his beloved mum is honest and touching.

Boy George states strongly from the outset of *Karma* that he is now a completely different person. I'm not so sure people can change so completely and why would he want to? Despite his daily chants and the headline referring to Boy George these days as being a Calmer Chameleon, this music icon remains sharp, funny, reflective and true.

#### Beware these local Summer perils - take extra care with kids and pets

#### **Giant Hogweed Warning**

#### This pesky plant is back for summer. Take extra care to keep children and pet's away.

Visitors and residents in Stirling should keep aware of Giant Hogweed and the potential health impact of exposure, warns Stirling MP Alyn Smith - as the plant continues to spread across gardens, derelict land and waterways



in Stirling.

An invasive species, Giant Hogweed grows up to 3.5 metres tall, with each plant head potentially containing as many as 50,000 seeds. If sap from the plant is in contact with the skin and the skin is then exposed to sunlight, a painful, unpleasant rash may occur where the sap has been on the skin. The rash usually clears up within a week, if the sap is avoided. Occasionally the rash will blister and these blisters may become infected. Contact your GP if you are concerned about the rash.

Whilst Stirling Council is responsible for controlling the plant if found on Council land, elsewhere it is the responsibility of private landowners to take steps to eradicate this plant.

#### Stirling MP Alyn Smith said:

'Warmer weather will increase the likelihood of Stirling visitors or residents coming into contact with Giant Hogweed. I'd urge members of the public to remain vigilant, stay away from the plant and report any sightings of it on Council land. Anyone impacted should seek urgent medical advice.' ## Ticks - how to avoid and how to treat

We're lucky in Callander to have so much beautiful walking-country on our doorstep and with the good weather upon us, it's tempting to stride off into the hills and woodland in nothing but a pair of shorts and a t-shirt. But be warned - there is a tiny terror lurking in that long grass and they are on the hunt for their next host.

Ticks can pose significant health risks to both humans and pets, so it's crucial to take preventive measures and know how to handle them. To avoid ticks, wear long sleeves and trousers when in wooded or grassy areas,

After spending time outdoors, thoroughly check yourself and your pets and kids for ticks. Pay close attention to warm, hidden areas like the scalp, armpits, groin, and behind the ears. For pets, check around the ears, neck, and



between the toes.

If you find a tick, remove it promptly with fine-tipped tweezers. Grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible and pull upward with steady pressure, avoiding twisting. Clean the bite area with antiseptic. For pets, follow the same method, and consider a tick removal tool designed for animals.

Regular checks and prompt removal can prevent tick-borne diseases, ensuring the safety of you and your furry companions.

#### NHS Pharmacy First

**y** using Pharmacy First you can help relieve some of the B pressure on appointments at the Medical Centre. If your ailment is minor you can very likely get the advice and treatment you need faster and without needing a visit to the surgery or even a phone call with the doctor.

#### What is it?

Pharmacy First is an NHS service provided by your local community pharmacy. If you have a minor illness, a pharmacy is the first place you should go to for advice. Your local pharmacist can give you advice and provide medicine if needed; they can also refer you to other health services if they think this is necessary.

#### Who can use Pharmacy First?

You can use this service if you're registered with a GP in Scotland or if you live in Scotland. You can go to any pharmacy and you don't usually need an appointment. Even if you don't live in Scotland you can still ask for advice.

#### What sort of conditions can the pharmacy help with?

You can get help and advice for a wide range of conditions including cold sores; constipation; cystitis and urinary infections; diarrhoea; emergency contraception; headlice; hay fever; pain; shingles; thrush; conjunctivitis; and some skin conditions. Some pharmacists have an



additional prescribing qualification that allows them to prescribe a wider range of medicines.

#### How do I use the service?

When you go the pharmacy and ask for advice, the pharmacist (or one of their team) will ask for some information, including your name, date of birth and postcode. They will ask you about your symptoms and give you advice on your condition. They will also set up a Patient Medication Record to make a note of any advice and treatment they give you. This record isn't shared with anyone else. You can ask to use the pharmacy's consultation area or room if you want to speak in private.
