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A Warm Welcome to Callander

Callander's Visitor Information Centre had its busiest season yet since replacing VisitScotland's i-centre in 2019. One of a growing number of community tourism providers in Scotland and run by Callander Community Development Trust, its friendly team of volunteers welcomed 21,778 visitors in 2024, almost 3,000 more than in 2023. They came from at least 36 countries, 28 US states and from all over the UK.



All the usual questions were asked – where were the best local walks and cycle routes, places to eat and visit and of course where to find public toilets. But the questions are hugely varied and can cover the whole of Scotland, as Callander is a popular stopping point on the way north and west. You learn something new every day and meet interesting people from around the world.

Volunteers contributed 1,822 hours in 2024, so it really would not be possible without them. The team is taking a well-earned break over the winter, but preparations are already underway for re-opening on 26th March in time for the Easter holidays. 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Callander Community Council



s many of you are aware by now, the new Primary ASchool has been given planning permission, with some conditions. These mainly involve safe routes to school, so include a pedestrian crossing on Mollands Road and a Travel Plan to ensure safe access to school. The proposed pedestrian bridge has no fixed timetable as yet and is still at early stages of feasibility. There is wide public concern that, with the Creep not being safe or even usable in bad weather and always a problem for anyone with a buggy or a wheelchair and the pavement on the A81 not being wide enough for a parent with a toddler and/or a buggy or wheelchair, there is not much option but to use a car for travel to school.

The Community Council reflects the concerns expressed by the reader in the December/January BLV, that the pedestrian bridge by the library is not lit and in spite of requests to Stirling Council, this is not yet in their plans, unless the Travel Plan ensures this becomes a necessity. The bridge is dark and a hazard for anyone unsteady on their feet or with accessibility issues and is used by many children going to and from school. To add to the problems of the darkness, there have been incidents of dog faeces being deposited in the middle of the bridge, which if not seen, cannot be avoided. Another good reason for the bridge to be lit.

We have also been making enquiries as to when anything might be done about the pavements in Callander Main Street, Bridgend and other roads. Both Stirling Council (for local roads and A81) and Transport Scotland – BEAR (for A84) are responsible but money seems to be the overriding issue at the moment. Please report any issues to Callander Community Council (callandercc556@gmail. com) or, for local roads and A81, directly to Stirling Council via this link (https://www.stirling.gov.uk/roads-transportand-parking/roads-and-pavements/report-roadsidedefects/). Any issues reported to CCC will be forwarded on to the relevant agency and followed up if necessary.

Callander Community Council had an interesting talk at the meeting in

December 2024 from the new ranger, Hanna Rennie, of The Woodland Trust. She explained about a new project that the Trust was undertaking to create a new path on Venachar Lochside, parallel to Invertrossachs Road, to link up with the existing path network. The Woodland Trust acquired the fields in this area in 2022 as additional grazing land for cattle and sheep, but there are opportunities for recreation and environmental projects, as well as making the area fully accessible for cyclists and walkers. Phase one of the project is to create a path from Gartchonzie Bridge to Coilantogle, where it will join the Great Trossachs Path. This is still in an early design stage but will create an interesting new walk for local people and visitors alike.

Please note we hold Callander Community Council Surgeries in Callander Connect once a month on the Saturday before a Community Council meeting, which are on the third Monday of every month, except for January and July. The surgeries are usually between 11 am and 1 pm in Callander Connect, but times can vary to allow for different availability of residents. Exact times will be available on the OurCallander Facebook page and on other popular local pages. The next surgery is likely to be on 15th February.

If you wish to make contact in between times, please email *callandercc556@gmail.com* or speak directly to one of the councillors. There is a list with names and photographs of all community councillors in Callander Connect. The more that people are involved with the town, the more that can be done.

•ouncillor Martin Earl posed the following question at the 12th **December Stirling Council meeting:**

Question: With the approval of the planning application for the new Callander Primary School, the existing footbridge across the River Teith will become part of a key walking route for primary school age pupils. The bridge now urgently requires a full assessment to determine maintenance required and how appropriate lighting could be installed. Would the convener support this being prioritised?

Answer recieved from council officers:

"The school will be putting a travel plan in place. The bridge is currently used by children walking to school. Should the bridge have added importance as a key walking route for primary school age pupils, it will be assessed as part of the development of the travel plan. The requirement for upgrading including the provision of lighting was not a material consideration relating to the planning consent. If upgrading work is required, a bid will be made to the capital programme. "



Callander Primary School Planning Approval

he new Callander Primary School has taken a step forward as planners have given permission for the new facility to be built.

The application to begin work on the new primary school was approved by the National Park Planning Authority on Monday 25th November 2024, with work due to begin early in 2025.

The new school will sit adjacent to Callander Nursery, McLaren High School and McLaren Leisure Centre, creating a new Callander Community Campus.

Last year, Stirling Council approved £23 million of funding to deliver a new state-of-the-art primary school as part of its capital investment programme.

Children and Young People Convener, Councillor Danny

Gibson said: "Residents in Callander will be eager to see spades in the ground and work commencing on the community's brand new primary school. The decision of the National Park Planning Authority brings this a step closer.

"I'd like to take this opportunity to thank everybody who took part in the public consultations as part of the process - your input will help ensure we deliver a modern, highquality school which will meet the needs of families in the area."

Callander Heritage Society Report

At our November meeting, George Peden, former Professor of History at Stirling University, gave a talk on 'The Making of Modern Callander'.

In the 18th Century, Callander consisted of small cottages clustered around St. Kessog's Church. The few houses were small, but the population was around 1000 because families were large. People worked mostly on the farms round about. Main Street was wide to allow the passage of cattle coming from the Highlands to market at Falkirk. There was a ford and ferry just off South Ancaster Square. In 1784, the Old Bridge was built over the Teith where the Red Bridge now stands. Many farms had been given over to sheep, resulting in fewer farm workers. They now moved into Callander and the population increased. More houses were built along Main Street. These houses had large gardens for growing vegetables and grazing rights on the Common land.

The 1791 census showed that most adult males were labourers but there were many people working at spinning and weaving in their own homes. There were also a few tailors and shoemakers.

There was a Parish School for children in Callander and the area round about. Church sermons were in originally in Gaelic, but after 1850 the sermons in Gaelic stopped. Gaelic was seen as the language of the lower classes.


The 1790's saw the beginning of tourism. The publication of Walter Scott's 'Lady of the Lake' brought tourists to the area. They flocked to visit the places mentioned in the poem. Many rich people escaped the diseases of the big cities by moving to the country for the summer and taking over houses. Large houses for the 'Summer Folk' were built in Leny Fues. Houses in Bridgend were also built for the summer visitors. Reverend Thomas Robertson used the compensation money he inherited from his brother's estate in the West Indies to build the houses.

The arrival of the railway in 1868 saw an increase in tourism and with the growth in trade came an increase in population, more shops and more and better houses. (Although Queen Victoria described Callander in her diary as 'one long street with very few shops, a few good houses but many poor ones.')

Two men were influential in the development of Callander. Donald MacLaren, a wool broker and trader, started the first bank, helped found St. Bride's Church and gave money and land to help build the High School. The other was Daniel MacEwan, a successful entrepreneur, who successfully pushed for Callander to become a burgh which meant it could make independent decisions to improve life in the town.

By 1900, Callander's population was 1500. Main Street had several shops and hotels. The railway and tourism provided many jobs. Improved road and rail links brought more visitors and a growth in health tourism saw the building of the Hydropathic Hotel. After World War 1, houses were built at Esher Crescent for disabled veterans and their families and in 1919 the Burgh Council built brick houses at Stirling Road. Cherry trees were planted along the roadside to create a 'good entrance' to Callander.

Here is a summary of the various classes:

Bulb Show Schedule

Cut Flowers

- 1. 3 trumpet daffodils
- 2. 3 double daffodils
- 3. 3 tulips
- 4. A vase of mixed spring flowers and/or flowering shrubs

Potted Bulbs and Flowers

- 5. A pot of muscari
- 6. A mixed pot of bulbs
- A pot of spring flowers mixed or single variety, can include foliage plants

Floral Art

8. A spring wreath with flowers and foliage, capable of being hung

Children

9. A pot of one spring bulb or bulbs

10. An Easter card – two classes - 7 years and under and 8 – 13 years.

Anyone can exhibit at the show. A child is anyone under 14 years of age.

McLaren High School - World Challenge Expedition 2024 to Cambodia

Taking part in the World Challenge (WC) trip was the best thing that we have ever signed up for. The World Challenge is a non-profit provider of overseas volunteering opportunities in the Third World. In June 2024, a group of S5/S6 pupils from McLaren High School, two teachers - Miss Rolfe and Ms Allan - and Dave - World Challenge leader- travelled to Cambodia. Our aim was to work in Elephant Conservation.

Before we embarked on the trip, we had to fundraise. Each person had to raise £4,000. Much of this was to be invested in the Elephant Conservation fund. Everyone carried out different activities, such as running a ceilidh, organising tombolas and providing catering at parents' evenings.

Right from the start of the trip, we were assigned tasks each day. Although the teachers, Miss Rolfe and Ms Allan, were in the background, we had to navigate our way through the airport and later we had to organise a place to eat. All quite daunting when you arrive in a new country.

During our travels, we had a short stay in the magnificent Singapore airport which was great to experience. When we arrived in Phnom Penh after a long day of travelling, we were collected from the airport by our Cambodian tour guide who worked for WC and 'Mr Lucky' (our bus driver). The tour guide made us feel very welcome and he told us some local secrets and things we should look out for during our stay in the city and, especially, to watch out when we were spending money. The Cambodians are trying to move away from American Dollars to Cambodian Riel, so the change we received would be a mixture of American dollars and Cambodian Riel, all very confusing. In addition, the money disintegrates when it gets wet, so if there were

any rips or colour runs on the notes, they would not be able to be used. When it rains in Cambodia, it is a 'monsoon', so we had to be careful to keep our money safe.

We settled into our hotel, which was a lot nicer than we had initially expected. Later that day, we had the challenge of finding somewhere to eat. This was quite difficult, as some of us had allergies or other food requirements and no one was able to speak the local language. We ate a lot of rice and noodles and some vegetables. We were not sure about some of the meat on offer and what type of meat it actually was!



The markets were quite amazing. One of the places we found was a spider market, not something that everyone enjoyed. The photo left is of Harris holding a massive tarantula.

There were many highlights of our trip, but some of the main ones included visiting 'Pol Pot', also known as the 'Killing Fields'. This was a very upsetting day for everyone, as we were taken to the sites where 1.3 million people were wrongfully killed and buried between 1976-1978. Nobody was prepared for how graphic the museum would be. We felt it was good to show what had occurred, as it is important that a situation such as this should never be allowed to happen again. We found it difficult to understand how something so awful could take place without intervention from other countries. It is very interesting to be aware of a country's history and to see how far they have come from that time. We met one of

the very few survivors from the Democratic Kampuchea regime, who had written a book based on his personal experiences and he spoke to us about them.





Another highlight was visiting the 'Royal Palace'. The palace was very interesting, as Cambodia is a third world country, but the palace was made of gold and was very luxurious. None of us could believe the size of the Palace. During our stay in Cambodia, we saw many temples and

people who worshiped the Buddha. As Cambodia is still very poor, it was very interesting to see everyone giving their money to the Buddhas in the temples.



The main highlight was staying at the Elephant Conservation. When we arrived at the camp, we were greeted by 'Watt', our tour guide for the duration of our 3 day stay. During our stay at the camp, we trekked daily

through the jungle with the elephants and their 'mahouts'. We were able to get extremely close to the elephants in their natural habitats, which was just



amazing! We worked alongside the locals and helped to prepare the elephant and monkey food. After we did this, we took the food and fed it to the animals. The trekking was quite demanding and the monsoon rain made camping quite challenging. We really appreciated the comforts of the hostel at the end of the trek.

We also visited the local primary school during our stay at the Elephant Conservation. Each of us had time to teach the children some English, some simple maths, how to make a paper aeroplane and how to do some Scottish Dancing.



The children were extremely happy that we were able to teach them some of our childhood games.

On the face of it, things are moving on in Cambodia as they modernise and industrialise. However, the reality of Cambodia is mainly hidden, especially in cities such as Siem Reap. The main road has houses and hotels that are extremely luxurious, but if you go back a few streets, there is extreme poverty. Although there is gender equality, there is a huge difference in how people with different social status are treated. The porters on our trek, who carried the tents and equipment, had to defer to the Cambodian tour guide. We found this very hard, as the porters would have to wait until we had eaten, before they could eat.

Our trip to Cambodia made us realise how fortunate we really are, even for the 'small' things

such as fresh clean water and food. The range of food we have here is incredible. The World Challenge trip had us working in groups with people we didn't know very well to begin with. We quickly bonded and this bonding has continued since we returned home and we have built friendships that will last a lifetime. We were all there for each other whether we were sick in hospital, missing home or simply just not feeling motivated. It has opened our eyes to the possibility of further travel and to feel that the world is not a big scary place. We feel confident about taking on our own adventures in the future.



Where are our swifts, swallows and house martins?

....sensibly in Africa and not in Callander on the cold, icy December evening when the local SWT group met to listen to Steve Willis of British Trust for Ornithology (BTO). It is impossible to include all the fascinating information here, so links are included if you want to find out more, such as

Up to the end of the nineteenth century, it was believed that swallows hibernated in mud at the bottom of ponds or tucked into river banks. Charles Morton even made the startling 'discovery' that swallows went to live on the Moon! Now we know that they migrate to Africa for winter and return in early summer, shorter but still an amazing undertaking. Swifts are extra impressive and may fly continuously for 3 years after fledging until they nest,

because, if grounded, their legs are too short to take off again. Unfortunately, all these species are in decline to a greater or lesser extent across the UK with climate trends impacting food supplies and breeding success.

Bird migration information is principally obtained from bird ringing and recovery. Data from the start and end of migration routes provides Swallow trends in arrival and departure dates and several data sources are combined to give a full picture.

Bird Track is the BTO app www.bto.org/our-science/ projects/birdtrack recommended to report UK bird



sightings directly. Data quickly reaches local recorders and feeds into other databases. In 2024, sand martins started arriving in mid-May and more than usual stayed to the end of August. House martins peaked in Jun-Aug.

Swallows were slightly down on average and left a bit early. Swifts arrived in May and stayed later than usual with a high peak in Jun-July but that was not reflected in breeding numbers; many birds were seen on the wing but weren't spending time at nests. However, they are longlived birds and can recover if future summers are better than the cool, wet 2024.

E-Bird is a popular US version of Birdtrack and allows users to identify birds and songs plus keep a personal record.

The EU bird portal eurobirdportal.org/ebp/en/#home/ HIRRUS/r52weeks/CUCCAN/r52weeks/ collates 法间 wider ringing and recovery data, including the BTO Ringing Scheme.

The Bird Migration Atlas migrationatlas.org/node/1756 collates ringing and recovery data along international flight routes. For swallows it showed UK birds migrating to South Africa, whilst those from Denmark wintered in Spain. House martins are difficult to catch and ring, so their

wintering grounds remain a mystery. Swifts have been seen in Spain and as far away as in Mozambique. An interesting article on Swift tracking is on www.bto.org/ sites/default/files/u49/BTO_299_16-17Swifts.

BTO's Breeding Bird Survey has been running since 1995, so provided distribution

and population trends. Sand martins have increased from 1995 to 2023, but house martins have been decreasing since around 2005. Swallows had dropped significantly up to 2010 but are now showing a promising upturn. Unfortunately, swifts have shown a continuous decline by 66% to 2023. Lots of data/trends can be seen on Bird Atlas Mapstore *app.bto*.

Collecting detailed tracking data along



migration routes is more

expensive, using a tiny geo-locator tag, temporarily attached on the back of the bird. This records sunrise and sunset times which give location and the time between locations gives information on flights and resting/feeding stopovers. Flying heights can be varied to avoid disruptive weather and swifts can fly very high at night, allowing them to snatch short sleeps, keeping half of the brain active and opening eyes spasmodically. This sleep pattern is common in nature; humans are the only animal that sleeps deeply for prolonged periods.



Since 2019, the Dunblane Wildlife Group has done a lot of work on swifts, putting up and recording nest boxes which swifts readily use dunblanewildlife.com/swifts/

So what can you do to help? Join or donate to BTO, record sightings on Birdtrack, volunteer to monitor a square for the Breeding Bird Survey, put up nest boxes (and encourage developers to do the same) plus garden



without chemicals and put out fresh water. www.bto.org/



COOKS CORNER

One-pan Penne'n'Cheese



Serves 4

Ingredients

250g penne (or any other pasta)

200ml whole milk

1 head broccoli, cut into florets

150g grated Cheddar cheese

80g finely grated Parmesan cheese

80g mascarpone or cream cheese

1/2 tsp grated nutmeg

To serve: pancetta slices and chopped chives

Method

Put the pasta,500ml water, milk and broccoli into a pot and cover with a lid. Cook over a medium heat for 10-12 mins, stirring occasionally until the pasta is ready.

Cook the pancetta slices in a dry frying pan until crispy. Set aside.

Once the pasta is cooked, stir in the Cheddar, Parmesan, mascarpone or cream cheese and nutmeg until all the cheeses have melted and the sauce is smooth.

Serve straightaway, with the crispy pancetta and the chopped chives scattered on top.



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
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presents: THE MUSICAL

ade in Dagenham is a change in both style and content for CAOS. A glance at the list of shows we have performed over the past 40 years conjures up names from the heyday of Broadway musicals - Rodgers and Hammerstein, Cole Porter, Gershwin, Berlin etc. Indeed, last year's show, *Carousel*, was premiered on Broadway in 1945 but based on an original play from 1909. Made in Dagenham is much more recent. The original film came out in 2010 and the musical followed in 2014. The unlikely setting for the action is the Ford Motor Company factory in Dagenham, Essex in the late 1960s. Rita O'Grady (played by Lorna Stevens), an 'ordinary' housewife and working mother, is reluctantly persuaded to lead the fight for equal pay, supported by her 'unskilled' sewing machinist colleagues but opposed by just about everybody else - the corrupt Ford Management, the Labour Government under Harold Wilson, their own union officials and the 'skilled' working men, including her hapless husband, Eddie (Freddie Bowen-Bate).

This gritty drama covers the whole range of human emotion - it is funny, it is sad, it will make you laugh out loud, it will make you cry (at least if you are like me!) Above all, it is a hugely entertaining show with brilliant music and lyrics – you won't be bored. Will Rita overcome her fear, can the might of Ford America be defeated, will her marriage survive? There is only one way to find out!

Tickets for Made in Dagenham are now on sale and are readily available online (www.c-a-o-s.org.uk/order-tickets). If you prefer to buy in person, tickets are on sale at Callander Connect, 43 Main Street Callander, on the following days and times: Wednesdays 1pm to 3pm; Fridays 12 noon to 2pm; Saturdays 10am to 12 noon. Tickets will also be available at the door before each performance, but seats are numbered so buying early will give you more chance of guaranteeing your favourite place. Prices remain the same as last year: adults, £15; seniors and students, £12. (Please note only full price tickets are available for the Friday performance).

As pointed out above, this is a gritty and down-to-earth show, incorporating both the strong language and adult humour of the setting and times into its lyrics and script. Because of this, it is rated as suitable for those over the age of twelve. Parental guidance is advised for all ages.

As usual the venue is McLaren High School and show dates and times are as follows:

Wednesday 19th to Friday 21st March - 7.30pm (doors open 7.00pm)

Saturday 22nd March – 2.30pm (doors open 2.00pm)



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
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
